Individual hygiene items include lotions, shampoo, conditioners, soaps etc.. Toothbrush & toothpaste now counted separately.

ACCW Board of Director Notes:

Our BOD has been hard at work ensuring that we take the proper steps to root in an enduring and sustainable mission outreach:

- ➤ Our ONE baby step of expansion in 2014 has been to partner with the St. Joseph Catholic Church of Makawao's monthly feeding and outreach Ministry called, "Breaking Bread". This vibrant program serves the poor in the East & Upcountry Maui area by preparing a hot meal on the Third Sunday of every month from 3:00 pm to 4:00 pm, for the poor or needy. They also send their clients home with a bagful of groceries. Our ACCW Van will make the monthly trek to Upcountry and serve their clients with other needs.
- > Our Volunteer Bookkeeper Lea Voss with the Help of John Decker and Mary Lou, has created a simple and clear monthly financial statement for ACCW. The financial statement will be posted monthly (after BOD approval) on the Hawaii Episcopal Church Website tab. (under Ministries).
- We continue to "seek out" a Vice President for ACCW, a person with passion for the poor, who can take the reins of leadership 2 years from now.
- Run Leader Deb Lynch will be joining our ACCW Board of Directors. She will be assisting in the task of creating our "Volunteer application form".
- We continue to work on a Larger Supply Room.
- We continue to work on ensuring that all of our volunteers have the mandatory Episcopal Church trainings completed and updated.
