

MINUTES OF THE FIFTY - NINTH ANNUAL CONVOCATION
OF THE

MISSIONARY DIOCESE OF HONOLULU

Monday, February 6, 1961

Holy Communion in St Andrew's Cathedral preceded the business meeting of the 59th Annual Convocation of the Missionary District of Honolulu. The Bishop, The Right Reverend Harry Sherbourne Kennedy, D D, was Celebrant, assisted by The Very Reverend James S Cox, The Ven Charles T Crane, The Ven Gerald P Loweth, The Reverend Norio Sasaki, and The Reverend Jacinto Tabili. St Andrew's Priory Choir sang for this service.

Breakfast was served in St Peter's Parish Hall.

The business meeting of Convocation was held in Tenney Hall. The Bishop presided as President, and called the meeting to order at 9:33 A M. The President appointed The Rev Canon Wai On Shim Secretary pro tempore.

Following the Invocation, The Rev Canon Wai On Shim called the Roll of Clergy Delegates. The Roll of Lay Delegates was called by the Reverend Norman C Ault. A quorum was declared present by the President.

It was moved by The Rev Robert Sheeran that The Rev Canon Wai On Shim be nominated as Secretary of the 59th Convocation, and that a white ballot be cast in his favor. Motion was seconded, and passed.

It was moved by The Rev Robert Sheeran that the courtesy of the floor be extended to The Right Reverend Anson Phelps Stokes, Jr, D D, The Right Reverend Nelson M Burroughs, D D, and Mr Chester A Rude. Motion was seconded, and passed.

It was moved by The Rev Robert Sheeran that messages be sent to: The Right Rev and Mrs S Harrington Littell, Bishop Retired, The Ven James Walker, The Rev Canon William Heffner, The Rev Canon Charles P Gilson, Chaplain Kenneth D Perkins, The Rev Canon Evans D Scroggie. Motion was seconded and passed.

The Rev Robert Sheeran called a roll of Island Delegates in the following order: Hawaii, Kauai, Maui, Molokai, Oahu, Guam.

The President introduced new clergy who had arrived in the District since last Convocation as follows: The Rev William H Aulenbach, Jr (Holy Nativity), formerly from Calvary Church before entering Seminary; The Rev Joseph H Pummill (St Mark's), and Mrs Pummill, originally from Santa Barbara, California; The Rev Covy Edward Blackmon (St Barnabas'), and Mrs Blackmon, former members of Good Shepherd-Maui; The Rev Grosvenor M Needham (St John-the-Divine-Guam), and Mrs Needham, originally from Chicago, The Rev Jacinto Tabili (Philippine Independent Church-Islands of Hawaii and Maui), from the Philippines.

Mrs Eliza Spencer, Delegate from St James' Mission, Papaaloa, Island of Hawaii, was asked to stand and be recognized. Mrs Spencer has been attending Convocations for 32 years.

The Bishop then delivered his Annual Address.

Bishop Stokes was introduced to members of Convocation. He prefaced his remarks by stating that he had made several speeches and preached before this morning's meeting. He stated that it was wonderful to be here, and to observe the phenomenal growth of the Church, and of churches since his residency here. He spoke about the Red Cross occupying Tenney Hall, of the Cathedral extension, during the war years, and of the 13 men now at seminary from the State of Hawaii - this he said was indeed most heartening.

Bishop Burroughs was introduced. Bishop Burroughs brought greetings from the Province of the Mid-West, from Bishop Tucker, and from Bishop Gordon of Alaska. Bishop Burroughs spoke briefly about the 13 dioceses which make up the Province of the Mid-West. These are included in 5 states.

The Bishop's address, and the visiting Bishops greetings were received with standing ovations.

The Rev William Grosh made the following petition:

"To the Bishop and Delegates of the 59th Annual Convocation of The Missionary District of Honolulu, meeting in Honolulu, Hawaii, February 6, 1961:

"The Communicants of Emmanuel Episcopal Church, formerly known as Maunawili Mission, have established an Episcopal congregation in the Maunawili District of Kailua, Oahu. Presently the congregation is utilizing the facilities of Maunawili Elementary School for worship purposes.

"The Bishop's Committee and The Rev Iver J Torgerson, Vicar, have been guiding the affairs of the Mission since its inception. The Committee members presently are delegates to this Convocation.

"Therefore, as representatives of this new congregation, we submit this petition requesting recognition of Emmanuel Episcopal Church as a Mission of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands by the delegates of this Convocation."

It was moved by The Rev Mr Grosh, seconded by The Rev Robert Sheeran and approved that Emmanuel Episcopal Church be admitted as an organized mission of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands.

The Chair asked The Rev Mr Torgerson and Messrs: Harold Morley, Jon J Tuning and Robert A Plaus to come to the President's table and be introduced to Convocation Delegates. Introductions were received with a well earned round of applause.

The Rev Wm Grosh made the following resolution:

"WHEREAS, the Missionary Diocese Honolulu is preparing to celebrate in 1962 the 100th Anniversary of the Anglican Communion in the Hawaiian Islands; and

"WHEREAS, a major goal of this Centennial Celebration is to achieve major progress toward self-support as a Diocese in order to assume our just share in the world-wide missionary task of the Church; and

"WHEREAS, all missions in this Missionary Diocese have been asked to assume greater self-support and to make special effort in assuming a greater portion of the salaries of their clergy; therefore, be it

"RESOLVED, That the Fifty-Ninth Annual Convocation of the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu especially recognize and commend All Saint's Mission, Kapaa, Kauai and St George's Mission, Pearl Harbor for voluntarily accepting all of their clergymen's salaries."

Resolution was accepted as read, and approved.

Next, The Rev Mr Grosh read the following Certificate of Erection of Epiphany Episcopal Mission into a Parish:

"WHEREAS the members of Epiphany Episcopal Mission, a duly organized mission in the City of Honolulu, Missionary Diocese of Honolulu, acting by and through their Vicar, Warden, and Members of the Mission Committee, have duly made application to me, as the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu, to be constituted a self-supporting Parish; and

"WHEREAS the Priest-in-Charge has been duly appointed and is canonically qualified and authorized to act as a Minister in the Church, and the Warden and Members of the Mission Committee are members of this Church and regular communicants of the Mission, and have been duly appointed in accordance with the Canons of the Church and of this Missionary Diocese; and

"WHEREAS the said Mission, through its Priest-in-Charge, Warden and Members of the Mission Committee, has acceded to the Constitution and has promised obedience to the Canons, and conformity to the doctrine, discipline and worship of the Church; and

"WHEREAS due proof has been made to me that the said Mission, upon becoming a Parish, will be able wholly to support a Rector; and

"WHEREAS I am satisfied that the granting of the aforesaid application will be for the best interests of the said Parish, this Missionary Diocese, and the Church at large,

"NOW, THEREFORE, KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That I, Harry S Kennedy, Bishop of the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu, by virtue of and pursuant to the power and authority vested in me as said Bishop and the Ecclesiastical Authority of said Missionary Diocese, do hereby make and constitute said EPIPHANY EPISCOPAL MISSION a Parish of this Missionary Diocese under the name of EPIPHANY PARISH, with all the rights, privileges and obligations of a duly organized Parish, effective on and as of February 6, 1961.

"IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this  $\underline{6th}$  day of February, 1961.

The President asked the Rev Burton Linscott to come forward together with delegates from Epiphany Parish, and the following were introduced: The Rev Burton Linscott, Mr Wilfred Richardson, Mr William Richardson, Mr James O Yapp, Mr Edward Hanohano, Mr Robert Nakamura, Mr Charles Kippen, Mr Guy Goodness, Mr Richard Tsugimura, Mrs James Morton, and Mrs Andrew Yapp. The President thanked these people for their devoted efforts in making this achievement possible.

The Rev Reginald Rodriguez made the following resolution:

"WHEREAS, the Rev Philip T Fukao was Ordained to the Diaconate in 1911; and

"WHEREAS, he has been canonically resident in the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu continuously since 1911; and

"WHEREAS, he started the work and was the first Vicar of Holy Trinity Church, Honolulu; and

"WHEREAS, he has given outstanding and faithful service in bringing the Gospel to the Japanese people of Hawaii at Holy Trinity, Good Samaritan, and throughout the Hawaiian Islands; and

"WHEREAS, he has continued to offer his service and fellowship to the Church in this Missionary Diocese during the long years of his retirement; and

"WHEREAS, in 1958 he received The Bishop's Distinguished Service Cross in recognition of his able and devoted service to this Diocese; therefore be it

"RESOLVED, that this Fifty-ninth Annual Convocation of the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu express respect, gratitude and Aloha to the Rev Philip T Fukao on this occasion of his fiftieth Convocation and the Fiftieth Anniversary of his Ordination to Sacred Orders by a rising ovation; and be it further

"RESOLVED, that we remain standing while the Bishop offers prayers suitable to this occasion; and be it further

"RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be given to the Rev Philip T. Fukao."

The Bishop asked The Rev Mr Fukao to come to the speaker's table. Prayers were offered, and a standing ovation was given by delegates and guests present. The Rev Mr Fukao was given a copy of the above Resolution.

The Rev Mr Rodriguez then submitted the following Resolution:

"WHEREAS, this Church as a visible segment of God's Grace is committed to uphold and promote the Gospel of Jesus Christ and the general welfare and well-being of the society in which it operates, and

"WHEREAS, it is the announced intention of groups within and without this particular society to introduce legalized gambling into Hawaii, and

"WHEREAS, gambling in its legalized form or otherwise is contrary to man's need to fulfill himself in the sacred nature of honest and thrifty labor, and

"WHEREAS, those who participate in said gambling activities and games of chance lend support to the false assumption that it is proper to gain "something for nothing", and

"WHEREAS, this gambling is an appeal to human weakness for material gain and is a misuse of man's proper stewardship of his finances, and

"WHEREAS, we believe the introduction of legalized gambling in any form would change the wholesome character of these Islands and lead to the moral and spiritual degeneration of its society and culture making it not unlike other centers of legalized gambling and other morally wrong activities which are supported by gambling,

"NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the 59th Annual Convocation of the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu, convening on the sixth day of February, 1961, oppose the introduction of legalized gambling in Hawaii. And

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that petitions expressing this opposition be circulated by the Church members and forwarded with signatures to the Hawaii Citizens Committee for the Prevention of Pari-mutuel Gambling, 1154 Bishop Street, Honolulu, Hawaii. And

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that individual Church members be requested to write to their legislators and representatives informing them of their opposition. And

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be sent to the Governor, Mayor of Honolulu, and to both of the Houses of the State Legislature. And

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT ALL Members of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands work to the furtherance of this resolution.

A motion was made, seconded and passed that this Resolution be approved.

The Rev Mr Grosh, Resolutions Committee, prefaced the introduction of the next Resolution concerning Displaced Persons, and introduced Mr William Wolff who was sponsored by Calvary Church. He expressed his gratitude to the Church for interest in him and his well-being. Mr Wolff is Dutch-Indonesian and is employed by a local business organization. Public Law 86648 is enabling

thousands of displaced persons to come to the United States, and it would seem that several who have come to Hawaii no longer want to return to their native homes.

The Rev Richard A Kirchhoffer, Jr, came to the speaker's stand and introduced Mr and Mrs Machiel Verhoeve, and son, Tony Green. Mr Verhoeve expressed his appreciation to the Church for enabling him and his family to come to Hawaii. Mr Verhoeve is now with Moanalua Dairy Farms at Waianae.

The following Resolution was made by the Rev Roger M Melrose, World Relief Secretary:

"WHEREAS, millions of people of the world are rootless and homeless and refugees from their home country and need to find a new start in a receptive land, and

"WHEREAS, the public law of the United States allows two general classes of immigrants to enter, one based on a percentage of national origin in this country as of the 1920 census and the second by special law pertaining primarily to Dutch nations from Indonesia; and

"WHEREAS, Hawaii has been blessed by God with a warm Aloha for people of all races and ought to respond in thankfulness by receiving into her land these refugees; now, therefore be it

"RESOLVED, that the parishes and missions of the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu undertake a vigorous program under the direction of the Christian Social Relations Department to open their hearts and doors to the Dutch Indonesian refugees who need our help; and, be it further

"RESOLVED, that a sum of \$500 be taken out of the Contingent Fund for 1961 to assist parishes and missions in the initial costs of settling families upon arrival; and be it further

"RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the World Relief and Inter-Church Aid Secretary of the National Council to inform him of our intent."

Motion was seconded by the Rev Robert Sheeran. The Rev Edwin Bonsey also asked to add his second to this motion. Motion carried.

The Rev William R Grosh made the following motion:

 ${\tt "WHEREAS,\ the\ 1960\ Reports\ of\ the\ Missionary\ Diocese\ of\ Honolulu\ have\ been\ duplicated\ and\ sent\ to\ all\ Delegates;\ and}$ 

"WHEREAS, the further presentation of these reports would be repetitious and excessively time consuming; therefore be it

"RESOLVED, that all reports, with the exception of the Treasurer's Report and the report of the Special Committee for the 100th Anniversary Celebration, be accepted by title."

 $\,$  Greetings from the Rev Canon Charles P Gilson, Taipei were read by the President.

Mr Alexander Cameron, St James Church, Papaaloa, Hawaii, was asked to stand. Mr Cameron had presented the Bishop with a check of \$100 for any emergency fund. Mr Cameron's action received a hearty round of applause.

Letter was acknowledged from John Linsley, Overseas Department. stating that this Missionary District will be remembered in prayer February 5th to February 26th in behalf of local efforts toward self-support.

The following Members of the Board of Directors who were present at Convocation, were asked by the President to stand: Messrs Smith, von Holt and Richardson, and The Rev Messrs Wheeler and Linscott.

The next business concerned delegates to the Synod of the Province of the Pacific. This will be held at Trinity Church, San Jose, Galifornia, May 2, 3 and 4, 1961. It was moved by The Rev Norman Alter, and seconded by the Rev Robt Sheeran, that the Chair be authorized to appoint delegates who may be available to attend the meeting.

Fixing the date of next Convocation was the next order of business. This date was set for February 4th, 1962. The Presiding Bishop is expected to be with us with us in Honolulu.

The President asked the Treasurer, Mr Henry F Budd for his report, adding that monies to Taiwan, Guam, and Okinawa are handled through this office.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT

Bishop Kennedy, Clergy, Delegates and Friends:

I have submitted for your consideration a balance sheet and supporting exhibits which reflect the financial position of the Church corporation on December 31, 1960.

Our Diocesan Trust investments, carried at a book value of \$670, 241.00 have a market value of \$1,084,125.00. Trust Endowment Fund Principal was considerably lower than at the same date a year ago. This is due to the withdrawal of two substantial building funds.

With new loan obligations of \$157,687.75 added to the \$630,420.03 owed at the beginning of the year, and repayments of \$135,619.82 during the year, we are now carrying a debt of \$652,487.96 to National Council and local banks. This is being amortized on a systematic repayment schedule with no payments in arrears.

The statement of Lands and Buildings does not include Saint Clement's Parish as it is a separate corporation.

Our Episcopal Construction Fund had principal additions of \$5,120.29 during 1960, bringing the fund up to \$42,547.02. We have outstanding loans of \$32,944.66, leaving a balance on hand of \$9,602.36.

National Council contributed \$108,727.84 for salaries throughout the year. Through increased efforts on the part of local congregations, this aid will be reduced by over \$11,000.00 in 1961. The clergy requested the Diocesan Office to submit a method for the mathematical equilization of salary payments by missions. The new method approved by the Finance Committee enabled us to assign a total of \$36,610.00. While some missions were unable to meet the amount assigned, others volunteered to pay a larger amount, and we now expect to receive \$1,355.00 more than we hoped for.

Our local budget expenditures for 1960 were \$58, 398.00 against an approved budget of \$60, 300.00. With overpayments of \$250.00 on assessments, we ended the year with a surplus of \$2, 151.93.

Assessments and Quotas for 1961 are \$4,050.00 greater than last year. Two thousand dollars of this increase will enable us to meet our increased National Church Program Quota of \$10,000.00, which was the amount assigned to

Honolulu last year, but we accepted only \$8,000.00 as our budget had been adopted prior to receiving any notice of the increase.

In prior years, our Diocesan Budget and the Appropriation from National Council were kept separately. Beginning with 1961, we shall combine these into one budget in order to portray a clearer picture of the amount of money needed for the general operation of the Diocese. The total proposed budget for 1961 is \$239,733.33, an increase of \$24,069.33 over last year.

In addition to the \$8,000.00 paid to National Council for our 1960 Quota, the churches and institutions in the Diocese contributed \$8,756.00 for work outside of the Hawaiian Islands plus the Whit-sunday Offering of \$1,681.89, which was added to our Episcopate Endowment Fund, bringing the balance in that fund up to a little over \$98,000.00. Churches throughout the Diocese have paid \$13,000.00 on assessments for the Church Divinity School of the Pacific Building Fund. This will be credited on quotas for the Episcopal Centennial Advance Program.

Repairs, maintenance and upkeep of our conference center at Mokuleia cost \$5,863.39. This was covered partly by camp fees and donations of \$2,792.00 plus \$531.12 which was the Laymen's Washington's Birthday Offering. This included cost of materials for re-roofing the main dormitory and two other buildings. Also, paint for all buildings and lumber for repairing termite damage to all buildings but the dining hall. This was accomplished through approximately 300 man hours of volunteer labor under the supervision of the Diocesan Laymen and we want to express to them our deep appreciation for this help.

As in the past, the Diocesan Office continues to be responsible for the disbursement of National Council Appropriations totaling almost one hundred fifty thousand dollars for Taiwan, Okinawa, and Guam.

We are grateful to the clergy and their treasurers for their grand cooperation.

We want to express our appreciation to Mr Arthur G Smith, Mr Herman V von Holt and other members of the Board of Directors and the Finance Committee for their legal and financial advice during the past year.

I would appreciate a motion that this Convocation approve the proposed budget for 1961 as submitted.

Mr Wheeler moved that the 1961 Budget be approved as presented. Motion was seconded and carried.

The Rev Claude F Du Teil, Chairman of the 100th Anniversary Celebration Committee was introduced. The Rev Mr Du Teil stated that the plan will include four (4) major interests spread throughout the year - that we really want 1962 to be a year remembered, and hope for a fine program without draining the resources of the Diocese. The first event will be at Convocation time with noted Bishops present - The Presiding Bishop, Bishop Yashiro, the Bishop of the Philippine Independent Church, etc. The second major interest will be around Easter time. Dr Howard Harper Executive Director of the General Division of Laymen's

Work of National Council, has been invited here to lead conferences for laymen and Miss Frances Young, Executive Director of the General Division of Women's Work, will also be a special guest. The Rev Albert Mollegen, D D, from Virginia Theological Seminary, has accepted an invitation to lead clergy conferences over the Labor Day week. Then, later on Bishop Bayne will hold conferences on each of the neighbor islands, and a series of conferences on Oahu.

#### Announcements:

Mrs Florence Judd, who is in the hospital was presented a Distinguished Service Cross by The Bishop the day before.

The Board met nine times during the year for the transaction of the business affairs of the Diocese. On numerous other occasions, members of the Board individually met and counselled with the Bishop and other officers relative to the conduct of the Church's financial and legal affairs. Official authorization was given for the following matters:

- 1. Authorized the purchase of a small parcel of land adjoining the yard of the rectory at the Church of the Good Shepherd.
- 2. Authorized the construction of a parish hall at St John's-by-the-
- 3. Authorized the construction of a parish hall at Holy Trinity.
- 4. Approved Episcopal Construction Fund loan of \$1,275,00 for a new roof at St Stephen's.
- 5. Authorized the refurbishing and renovation of the main house on the Lawrence Estate to be used for a Church vicarage.
- 6. The Board voted to discontinue any further interest charges on Episcopal Construction Fund loans.
- 7. Authorized purchase of 44, 415 Sq Ft of land adjoining the property on which the Church of the Holy Nativity Youth Center is located.
- 8. Authorized the Treasurer to apply the net proceeds from the showing of the motion picture "Day of Triumph" toward the cost of the purchase of a vicarage for St Barnabas' Mission.
- 9. Authorized a loan of up to \$10,000.00 for the Church of the Holy Nativity to help meet the cost of constructing a combined classroom-choir room on the Church property.
- 10. Authorized a loan of \$4,000.00 to be used toward the construction of a new vicarage at Kohala.
- 11. Authorized the signing of a contract with Ward, Dreshman and Reinhardt, a professional fund-raising organization, for the purpose of raising a Diocesan Capital Fund with a goal of

\$375,000.00

- 12. Authorized an Episcopal Construction Fund loan of \$16,000.00 for the construction of a church building on Guam.
- 13. Authorized a loan of up to \$75,000.00 to cover the amount needed to cover the balance of the purchase price of an organ for St Andrew's Cathedral.
- 14. Authorized sale of property at 3330 Keali Street.
- 15. Approved granting of purchase option to Texaco for purchase of present site of Church of the Holy Apostles, Hilo.

## REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

The Department takes pleasure in reporting the following achievements in 1960:

Epiphany Church, Honolulu, has become a parish and will be recognized as such at this Convocation. All Saints Church, Kapaa, Kauai, and St George's Church, Pearl Harbor, have taken on the full support of their clergy - salary and pension.

Our missionary on Guam, The Reverend Grosvenor M Needham, with the assistance of the Navy, has explored the opportunity on the Island of Chi Chi Jima, in the Bonin Islands, for serving our members there.

The Philippine Independent Church has added another priest, the Reverend Jacinto Tabili, to minister to our Filipino people on Hawaii and Maui. He is in residence in Hilo, Hawaii, but holds services in Hilo, Kohala, Paauilo, the Hamakua Coast, on Hawaii, and Lahaina, Warluku and Kula, on Maui.

The Reverend Peyton Craighill, one of our missionaries in Taiwan, has been studying at General Seminary, in New York, so that he may return to Taiwan and join the staff at the Tainan Theological Seminary, where future seminarians of our Church in Taiwan will get their training.

The work on Taiwan was officially organized as The Missionary Diocese of

Taiwan on January 1, 1961, at their first Convocation.

A new mission of St Andrew, Shuri, and work at the University of the Ryukus, Okinawa, has been started with the Reverend Michael Yamamoto as Vicar. St James Mission, Hirara City, Miyako, Okinawa, at the leper colony, is now under the care of the Reverend Peter Shinjo.

The Reverend William Jones, his wife and two small sons are completing a year of language study in Japan before going to Okinawa to join our staff.

Emmanuel Mission, Maunawili, Oahu, has been officially organized and holds services in the Maunawili School with the Reverend Iver J Torgerson, Jr, as Vicar

- 2. The Teacher-Student ratio was reduced to 1-17 and the teacher-coach policy expanded.
  - Faculty salaries were increased by nearly 20%.
- 4. Teachers Insurance Annuity Association program was initiated by the school. Our faculty has a retirement program for the first time - 10% of the premium paid by the school - 5% by the individual.
- 5. The faculty have been given the added perquisite of group insurance at no cost.
- The Hawaii Medical Service Association plan was instituted for the faculty and staff with 75% of the premium paid by the school and 25% by the individual instructor.

#### ENROLLMENT - TUITION - ADMISSIONS - SCHOLARSHIPS

- The present enrollment is 1,002 boys, the highest in the history of 1. the school.
  - Tuition was increased by 40%. 2.
  - Applications for admision for 1961 have increased by 400%.

4. Scholarship aid was increased and 10% of our boys now receive aid. Gifts to our scholarship program total \$14, 247.

#### CURRICULUM

- 1. A major revision of the curriculum was accomplished by the faculty.
- 2. Japanese, Chinese and French were introduced in the 4th grade.
- 3. The 6th grade work was departmentalized.
- 4. A new science course was introduced in the 7th grade.
- 5. World Geography, a new subject, and algebra were added in the 8th grade.
- 6. Chinese and Japanese were added to the offerings in Modern Languages in the Upper School making a total of six languages offered at Iolani.
- 7. A new Special Services Department under the direction of Mrs Howard Donnell was established for audio-visual work, developmental reading and coaching for public speaking.
  - 8. A new Audio-Visual Lecture Room was completed.
  - 9. A new Language Laboratory with Caliphone equipment was installed.
- 10. The Guidance Department was increased with the addition of a new counsellor for the 7th, 8th and 9th grade boys.
- 11. New full-time instructors for music and physical education were appointed for the Lower School.

#### TESTING CENTER

1. Iolani was designated by Educational Testing Service of Princeton, New Jersey as the Center for the Secondary School Admissions Test. Similar to the College Entrance Board Tests, Iolani will use this test for its own admission program in 1961 (grades, 7-12).

#### ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF OUR BOYS

- 1. All eighty-seven graduates of the Class of 1960 entered college.
- 2. Iolani had 3 1/2 times more National Merit Scholarship Semi-Finalists, proportionately, than any other school in Hawaii.
- 3. Iolani boys organized and conducted the Annual Conference for the Student Government Association of the high schools of the State.
- 4. The editors of the school paper organized and conducted the annual conference of the school newspapers in the State.
- 5. According to the 1961 fall testing program, 75% of our boys rank in the top quarter of the nation in verbal and mathematical skills.

#### ALUMNI AND PUBLIC RELATIONS

- 1. The new Office of Information was organized under the direction of Mr James H Pott with responsibilities in the areas of public relations, alumni relations and school development.
  - 2. A new School Catalogue was published.
- 3. A new Iolani Bulletin with a circulation of over 2,000 is now being published four times a year, keeping our parents, alumni and friends informed on all the important happenings at school.
- $4.\ \ A$  new Alumni Directory has been created with nearly 1,400, names on the mailing list.

#### FIRST ANNUAL GIVING PROGRAM

1. The First Annual Giving Program was established by our Parents and Alumni and is nearly half-way in attaining its goal of \$34,000, toward the new gymnasium.

The success of the year's work has come from the completely enthusiastic cooperation of our Board of Governors, Parents, Boys, Faculty and Staff, for which the Headmaster is profoundly grateful.

#### REPORT OF ST ANDREW'S PRIORY - 1960

#### ENROLLMENT

Our enrollment continues to increase. We set six hundred as our top limit because the lack of classrooms, recreation area and lunchroom facilities make it expedient that we do not go above that number. All our efforts to the contrary, however, we have ended up with fifteen students enrolled over our top limit!

#### GRADUATES

On June 7, 1960 forty-nine girls were graduated. Forty-six of these are continuing their education, and three of them are now employed. Although a large percentage of our graduates go on to the university or into nurses' training, those who major in the business subjects have no difficulty in finding employment upon graduating from the Priory.

#### AWARDS AND RECOGNITIONS

Two girls in the present senior class achieved recognition during the spring

semester. Caroline Ward won first prize in THE LIVING CHURCH essay contest; and along with Noreen Kawamura received a Letter of Commendation in the NATIONAL MERIT SCHOLARSHIP QUALIFYING TEST.

The KA ALELE, the Priory yearbook, was given a first place rating by THE NATIONAL SCHOLASTIC PRESS ASSOCIATION.

#### RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

The daily chapel services in the Cathedral with the use of the Prayer Book, regular classes of religious instruction taught on a par with their other subjects, and training of the choir in the music of the Church continue as vital parts of school life for all our students. The Chaplain supplements his duties of teaching and conducting the chapel services with individual counselling. Very few parish clergy contact as many of their parishioners in a week either in groups or individually as the Priory chaplain does the members of his congregation of 656 children, young people and adults. During 1960,23 girls were prepared and presented to the Bishop for Confirmation at School Chapel services. Sixty-two percent of the student body has been baptized and twenty-nine percent has been confirmed. This percentage varies very little over the years, no matter what method or combination of methods we use. A more enlightening statistic is that fifty-six percent of the present senior class are confirmed members of the Episcopal Church, and seventy-eight percent of them are baptized Christians. Many of these confirmed girls are active in their parish churches, and two of them are organists.

#### IMPROVEMENTS

During this past year \$16,572.72 has been spent on improvements and alterations to classrooms. This includes the erection of booths and the installations of equipment to set up the first language laboratory in the state. Several other schools have since followed our good example in this respect. Another major improvement was the enlargement and modernization of our art department. We have been told by a number of persons, unofficially, that we now have the best school art room in the state. Other improvements were in the area of floor covering, and items of equipment.

#### GENERAL REMARKS

After a lapse of several years German has been restored to the school curriculum and Spanish has been added. With the installation of the language laboratory which facilitates the learning of a foreign language and speech techniques in our own we are stressing those skills that are necessary to world-wide communication and understanding.

Lest concern for our fellow men and awareness of the needs of others be undeveloped because of too much emphasis on the academic side of school life we encourage and support the students in all areas of useful service. Listed are some of the major enterprises that come under this classification and in which the school as a whole, or groups within the school have contributed time, effort and money.

The St Andrew's Priory Welfare Fund (from this definite quotas are earmarked for the various community welfare enterprises)

The choir sang at one of the Convocation services and again at the Christmas Eve service at the Pearl Harbor Navy Chapel

One of the school groups decorated the Cathedral for Thanksgiving with fruit and vegetables donated from the entire school. Traditionally the

food used this way is taken to Shriners' Hospital afterwards.

Groups of individual students regularly prepare the Chronicle for mailing; and assist in similar preparation of other materials in the Diocesan Office as the need arises.

Classes prepared attractively decorated food baskets for a number of families for Christmas.

Various of the clubs and classes have sent CARE packages; and have worked for the Volunteer Service Bureau.

A substantial sum of money was collected to assist the family of one of the students whose home and possessions had been destroyed by fire.

Several of the girls worked as Junior Aides in the local hospitals.

The Priory is now clear of debt for the first time in several years, but it is not that reason alone that brings us to the consideration of our next building projects. It is imperative that we have in the near future new classrooms for our Intermediate grades. We optimistically hope that a second floor can be added to Sellon Hall. We are still holding on to our dream of a small chapel for the school as our slowly growing fund for it continues to witness.

#### BENEFACTORS

The Honolulu chapter of the Associates of the Transfiguration have continued to support generously the scholarship fund that they maintain. The Parent Teacher Fellowship of the school gave numerous items of equipment not provided for in the school budget in addition to giving a slide projector in the name of the class of 1960. It is not our policy to depend on the PTF for large financial contributions to the school. Our emphasis is on "fellowship" as indicated in the name, and the mutual growth in understanding and appreciation between the parents, teachers and administration.

#### CANTERBURY HOUSE

The year 1960 was a successful one at Canterbury House. We have attempted to work out a program for the students who appear at Canterbury House and also one to attract those who do not regularly attend. The chaplain's main emphasis during this year has been that Canterbury House and its facilities, its chapel and its chaplain, are for all Episcopal students on campus and not just the few who regularly come by.

We have held semi-monthly meetings of Canterbury Club. These usually were

supper meetings with a supper cooked by a committee of the students. The rest of the evening consisted of the necessary business of the organization, a program of a speaker, a panel or a movie, and Evening Prayer.

The officers of Canterbury Club for the 1960-61 year are Judith Ching, President; Susan Lau, Vice-President; Nancy Penington, Corresponding Secretary; Janet Ichioka, Recording Secretary; and Robert Lee, Treasurer.

A study program was initiated at the beginning of the year. Some of our students met at Canterbury House with some students from the Wesley Foundation (Methodist) for a Bible study group led by the chaplain of Canterbury House. And a few of our students also met regularly for a few months for a study of the basic doctrines of the Church.

Celebrations of the Holy Communion were held each week of the school year on Wednesdays at 7:15 A Mand Fridays at 8:15 A M. These were quite well attended by students and occasional faculty members. During Lent there were also noon services led by students on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

Canterbury Club caroled at various hospitals and old folks' homes during the week before Christmas. They also, earlier in the year, sponsored a party for teen-aged mentally retarded children, playing games with them, dancing with them, and providing the entertainment and refreshments for the party.

For the first time in a long time Canterbury House saw its members graduates of a number of high schools: Priory, Iolani, Kamehameha, Punahou, Roosevelt, Hawaii Mission Academy, and some Mainland high schools. This has made for a much richer meeting of students than previously, though there is still a great deal to be done in this area.

The chaplain's work, besides conducting services and helping with the meeting of Canterbury Club (as an organization), has also been counseling any students who come to the college center for help; speaking a few times at classes on campus; working with the other religious groups and advisors on campus; meeting with the advisors of the other religious groups for discussions of our mutual concerns and more particularly to study together the role of Christianity in higher education; and such other things as come up.

We are always eager for more of our parishes and people to become acquainted with Canterbury House, and we welcome any who would come by to visit us.

# REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN HOUSE AND ARMED FORCES CENTER

During the year 1960, the Diocesan House not only underwent some physical changes, but we also began having meetings of organizations which had not met here before.

The outside of the House was painted, and termite-eaten wood replaced. This has added a great deal to the appearance of the House. A Seminary student from Berkeley painted the upstairs rooms. New curtains for the guest apartment and

dormitory rooms were made by the Ladies of the Friendly Friday. Some new chinaware was supplied. Linoleum rugs were laid in the dormitory rooms and in the downstairs kitchen.

Aside from the regular meetings of the Diocesan Women, the Altar Guild, and Clericus, luncheon meetings of the Bishop's various committees are held. One day each month the Chronicle is sent out, with the help of the Priory girls.

The Rev Mr Quintero has held monthly meetings with his congregation. They also have had several parties and breakfasts. The Rev Mr Du Teil has been having an informal luncheon meeting weekly with some of his laymen who are business men in Honolulu. The Rev Mr Pollock and Mrs Pollock have been having a canasta and bridge group. Examinations and interviews for the Hawaii Episcopal Academy are also held here.

The guest apartment was used a great deal during the year to take care of visiting clergy and their families while in transit, and also for the clergy visiting from the other islands.

The dormitory rooms are full every week end, and some young men on leave have taken advantage of the Diocesan House during the week.

At Thanksgiving we had a dinner at midday, and the men were most appreciative. The eighteen pound turkey and all the fixings were gone by noon of the following day.

On Christmas night a buffet supper was served. The men ate in the living room by the light of Christmas candles, and they seemed to enjoy sitting around the Christmas tree which they had helped decorate.

The gift of a large TV to the Service Center at the beginning of the year has given a great deal of pleasure to the men who are staying in the house, and it is usually being watched both day and night.

The Center has a big turnover of guests, but with few exceptions, the men all appreciated the use of the Diocesan House and its facilities. Many of them have said and written that it made all the difference in the world to their tour of service out here.

# REPORT OF LAYMEN'S LEAGUE OF THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN HAWAII - 1960

While 1960 was primarily devoted to maintenance and improvement of the Mokuleia Conference Center our laymen were active in other fields. Your Chairman attended the laymen's training conference in Phoenix in May and subsequently made available the discussion material for "The Life and Mission of the Church" to all of our Keymen. Three training sessions were held in as many churches. Our Washington's Birthday service and breakfast was attended by 200 laymen and an offering of \$600 was taken towards the upkeep of Mokuleia.

The physical plant of the conference center was improved with donations of furniture and with the re-roofing of the dormitory and two other buildings. Termite damage was repaired in all buildings but the dining hall. Some 300 man-hours went into this project.

Volunteers from six of our churches provided transportation to various churches for servicemen for a total of 10 weekends.

Currently underway is a project to plant sprouting coconuts at the conference center in an effort to contain a serious erosion problem.

### REPORT OF THE EPISCOPAL CHURCHWOMEN OF HAWAII

The Episcopal Churchwomen of Hawaii have continued to give faithful and dedicated service to the Church. They have given devoted service to their parishes and missions, - they have participated in diocesan affairs - and through the Diocese have shared in the work of the Church in the nation and in the world.

The Diocesan calendar for 1960 began with the presentation of the inspiring Lenten film, "Day of Triumph" produced by Dr James F Friedrich, at the Kaiser Dome from March 27th through April 3rd. It was sponsored by the Episcopal Church of Hawaii for the benefit of the Missionary Advance Work in the Diocese. The women participated whole-heartedly in this project assisting in the many necessary tasks which helped to make this endeavor a success.

The national supply assignment for 1960 was to provide layettes for St Theodore's Hospital, Sagada - Mt Province - Philippine Republic. During the five Fridays in Lent, beginning with March 11th, the women of the various branches gathered at Davies Hall on the Cathedral grounds to sew and complete 359 infant garments. Along with the sewing a study program was presented on Sagada, Philippine Republic, and Africa. Mrs Timoteo Quintero who had trained as a nurse at St Theodore's Hospital spoke with great feeling about Sagada and the excellent work being done at the hospital. Dr Raymond Johnson, an interne at St Francis Hospital and a native of Cameron, West Africa, told of his life there. Mrs Thomas Crosby, whose father was a missionary to the Union of South Africa gave interesting experiences of her girlhood spent there and of a more recent trip she took to the Union of South Africa. Mrs C P Sidires, wife of a University of Hawaii professor, who had spent a year on the east coast of Africa presented a fascinating description of the area during her stay there. Mrs Ernest Kai concluded the study program with an interesting and stimulating talk on Africa using as illustrations two films, "Africa Tribes" and "Rhythm of Africa."

During the Fridays in Lent some of the various branches served a light lunch to the men and women of all denominations who attended the noonday prayer at St Andrew's Cathedral.

The Lenten Chain of Prayer continued to be a vital part of the Lenten Sewing program. Meditation and prayers were prepared under the direction of the Devotions Chairman for the use of the many women who maintained a continuous chain

of prayer at Parke Memorial Chapel during the Friday mornings in Lent. An inspirational Quiet Morning for the women of the Diocese was held at Parke Memorial Chapel on December 1st, led by the Reverend Shelton Hale Bishop.

997 women gratefully shared in the United Thank Offering, contributing \$5550.12 in 1960. The United Thank Offering Treasurer who has worked so diligently with the branches reported that the women of St Alban's shared in the offering for the first time this year. News was also received that All Soul's Church in Okinawa had their first ingathering in the spring of 1960 - 29 women contributing \$85.23.

The District Altar Guild worked unceasingly to provide the Altar linen needs for the missions and parishes. The chairman and her co-workers averaging 6 in number met every week to sew. The Chairman reported "enthusiasm and industry made up for lack of members, and much work was accomplished ranging from simple linens such as purificators to renovating or making more elaborate embroidered-vestments. These women are doing a tremendous job.

The support of the Church Periodical Club continues to grow. This year contributions were made to the Canon Gilson Book Fund and The National Book Fund, contributions were sent so that two students, one at St Margaret's House and the other at the Church Divinity School of the Pacific were able to purchase a book of his or her choice. An interesting contribution made was "6 pounds of old Christmas Cards" to a mission in Japan to be "remade" for sale, the proceeds of which were to go to the building fund of that mission.

Our Women participated in the World Day of Prayer and World Community Day of the United Church Women of Hawaii. Mrs Henry Caldwell, our Chairman of the United Churchwomen of Hawaii, is the chairman of the State Board of this eccumenical group of women.

Contributions from the women during 1960 were made to Dr Marian Hall, a medical missionary from India, to Holy Trinity Church toward the Grace Ozaki Memorial Fund, St Margaret's House, Church Divinity School of the Pacific and to the Armed Services Y. M. C. A. for their Annual Thanksgiving dinner. A total of \$5535.87 was pledged by the branches and other individuals to the women's "specials" for 1960 which included: the Bishop's Discretionary Fund; Seminary Student Fund; Camp Pecusa; and St Barnabas Mission.

Throughout the year the women have responded to the needs of the community either working together as Branches or as individuals. They have served the hospitals, State institutions, and Armed Forces Y. M. C. A. They participated in The Aging Conference, Detention Home Association and the Conference on Labor Management Relations and the Church. They also assisted in the many National and Community fund drives.

"Dollar for Delegates" a drive to raise funds to send our 5 delegates to the Triennial Meeting which convenes on September 19, 1961 in Detroit, Michigan was started in November 1960. We are hoping to raise \$3500 and have appealed to the women of the Church to give at least \$1.00 toward the fund. We have already received \$1000.00. We adopted the motto "Dollar for Delegates" with the hope that every Episcopal woman will want to personally share in this important task in order that the Episcopal Churchwomen of Hawaii can be assured of full representation at the Triennial Meeting.

The Emphasis on Christian Education through Island-wide meetings was

continued this year. During 1960 we enjoyed the hospitality of St Clement's in January, St Timothy's in May, St Elizabeth's in June, St Andrew's in September, St Christopher's in October and St Barnabas' in November. Each meeting started with a celebration of The Holy Communion at 10:00 o'clock followed by a program which usually lasted an hour. The speakers at these meetings included: a panel of 8 members of the Clergy who spoke on "The Facets of Life as a Seminarian;" Bishop Kennedy who spoke of his annual trip to the Far East in the spring; Mrs Avis Ferguson, who spoke on her experiences and life in Japan; Mrs Frederick Forbes, Representative of the State Legislature and Mr William C Richardson, Chairman of the State Democratic Central Committee who spoke on "Party Policies as Brought out at the National Conventions;" Mr John Martelon, Chairman of the Committee on Alcoholism described the work of the "Hawaii Commission on Alcoholism;" and Mrs Lucile Abreu, a policewoman who spoke on "The Juvenile Delinquent."

The faithful endeavors of the executive board, the gracious participation of the branches, the patience and cooperation of the members of the clergy and the ever-present inspiration and guidance of our Bishop, have stimulated the Episcopal Churchwomen of Hawaii to move forward in all phases of their work in 1960.

It has truly been a rewarding experience and a privilege to serve as president of the Episcopal Churchwomen of Hawaii.

## DIOCESAN DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION 1960 ANNUAL REPORT

Christian Education is basic to the entire task of the Church. Its objective is to confront all people with the declaration of the Good News of Jesus Christ, giving them assistance in bringing to realization the possibilities of the wholeness and fulness of life as expressed in that message, and thus to help each person to find his own place in God's creation now and forever.

To this end the Diocesan Department worked in 1960 in the following areas:

- (1) Early in the year, at the request of Bishop Kennedy, efforts were begun to select and hire a Diocesan Director of Christian Education. Though some possibilities were discovered no one was able to be secured for the job.
- (2) Supplies and study materials for the 1960 Church School Missionary Offering (Mite Box) were distributed early in the year for use either during Epiphany or Lent. The total C S M O offering for the Diocese was \$3,186.80, which was slightly under that of the previous year.
- (3) In the late spring the Department prepared Christian Education study materials for use in the Diocesan Summer Camp sessions.
- (4) In June the Department Chairman was privileged to attend a Group Life Laboratory sponsored jointly by the National Department and the

Diocese of California. At the same time he took the opportunity to speak at length with the Director of Christian Education in the Diocese of California concerning our own Diocesan program.

- In cooperation with the National Department's "Advance Adult Education Program" the fall clergy conference, September 12-16, under the direction of Dr William Poteat of the Duke University Divinity School, and Miss Carmen Wolff of the National Department, was given to a study of the theology of the Church and its demands upon the clergy and the laity. At the Conference new insights were gained into the nature of the Church and the inter-relationships of clergy and people.
- (6) On Sunday, October 2, the Department sponsored the Children's Annual Pilgrimage to St Andrew's Cathedral. This year the service was held in conjunction with the Birthday Thank Offering. The service, followed by a guided tour of the Cathedral and of the Diocesan grounds, was met with considerable enthusiasm by the children and by the clergy as well.

An attractive birthday card bringing birthday greetings, explained the B T O and its objective for the year, designed by one of the women of St Stephen's, Wahiawa, was printed and distributed to the clergy for general use throughout the year.

- (7) In the fall of the year the Department Chairman met with the Women of Calvary Church, Kaneohe, to speak on the general task of Christian Education, and with the teachers of Holy Trinity Church, Honolulu, at their opening session of teacher training.
- (8) Advent and Christmas Eve family worship materials were distributed in October to all clergy for duplication and distribution to the congregations.

Plans for 1961 include especially (1) the formation of a Diocesan Leadership Training Program to begin especially for those serving as Teachers, Lay Readers, and in other positions of parish responsibility; and (2) the formation of small, informal, study and discussion groups among the clergy.

### THE DEPARTMENT OF YOUTH 1960 REPORT

The department of youth members during 1960 assumed the following positions, The Rev Lani Hanchett, EYC Advisor: The Rev Reginald D Rodriguez, Jecoh Advisor; The Rev Robert Sheeran, Camps; The Rev Roger Melrose, Promotion and Publicity and Mrs William Koch and the chairman as general committee functions.

The Episcopal Young Churchmen of Hawaii enjoyed an active program during 1960. The Diocesan organization of our young people of high school age consists of a State Council and an Oahu Council.

The State Council, with Robert Mumper, Jr as president, directed two major activities, the annual Youth Convocation Banquet and Conference, and the Summer Conference. The first began with the Banquet at the Reef Hotel at which the Rt Rev James Pike, Bishop of California, was speaker. This was followed the next day with a conference at the Episcopal Church Conference Center at Mokuleia. Both were well attended. Nearly 60 young people spent four days at Mokuleia at the Summer Conference in June. The theme of the Conference was "Christian Forgiveness". It was quite successful.

The Oahu Council, with Winston Ching as president, coordinated the program for the youth groups of the Church on Oahu. They began the year promoting the sale of tickets to the "Day of Triumph", a movie on the life of Christ. The next major undertaking was the Bishop's Ball in the Spring. This was held at the Iolani School Cafetorium and was enjoyed and well attended. An interchurch volleyball tournament, an islandwide picnic at the Bishop's home, and an August dance at the Youth Center of Holy Nativity Church provided for a busy summer for the Oahu groups. These activities helped very much to get the youth of the various churches better acquainted with one another.

The State Council meets twice a year and the Oahu Council once each month.

# REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS

Christian Social Relations are the natural, or should we say supernatural, consequence of Christian Faith. "Faith apart from works is dead", for true Christian works are the sacramental "outward and visible signs" of God's love toward mankind. We stand under God's judgment in the face of human need; so we pray that, by the grace of God, our faith and good works will place us among those to whom Christ will say, "Come, O blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you clothed me, I was sick and you visited me, I was in prison and you came to me."

# WORLD RELIEF AND RESETTLEMENT OF REFUGEES The Rev Roger M Melrose

The needs of the destitute, hungry, homeless, and suffering people of the world are continually before us. Through reasons of famine, political unrest and revolution, religious intolerance, and disaster wrought by nature millions of people are in need of help. Various world relief programs are geared to help those in their several plights. The Missionary Diocese of Honolulu participates in three general areas.

1. The clothing drive in the spring of 1960 for the new Missionary District of Taiwan made possible 12,000 pounds of clothes and crating lumber for distribution by the Rev Canon Charles PGilson. He says, ".. It is hard to believe that so much clothing in such excellent condition could have been gathered together for such a project. This is one of the finest things that our people of Hawaii could possibly

have done, and words cannot possibly express our appreciation.." We are indebted to the United Council of Young Churchmen of the Honolulu Council of Churches for their participation in this drive.

- 2. The Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief places money at the Presiding Bishop's fingertips for prompt financial help wherever there is a need any place in the world. This offering taken around Thanksgiving time made \$1,860 available to Bishop Lichtenberger from this Diocese. This is about an \$800 increase over last year. The children of the Diocese have generally substituted the pranks of Hallowe'en with the solicitation of funds for Share Our Surplus (SOS) to be used to purchase surplus government stores for world-wide distribution. This year \$539 has been sent from this Diocese for this purpose.
- 3. The third area in which we are helping, beside clothing and money, is to participate in the resettlement of world refugees. An active program has been started. This work is among the Dutch nationals who were forced to leave Indonesia at the time of Indonesian Independence. One family, Mr and Mrs William R E Wolff and sons Richard and Jeffry, has arrived and is settled in Kaneohe under the sponsorship of Calvary. Several other missions and parishes are actively seeking the opportunity to sponsor families to begin a new life in Hawaii.

### CHRISTIAN CITIZENSHIP The Rev Norman C Ault

This Division assisted in two areas of Christian concern by offering information and assistance to our clergy and laity who in turn, wrote, phoned, or personally discussed these matters with legislators:

Education of Mentally Retarded Children: Many of Hawaii's mentally retarded children are being trained and educated only through the voluntary efforts of the Hawaii Association to Help Retarded Children and others who are concerned. The Hawaii Department of Public Instruction has not had sufficient funds to take over this work; so, with the urging and help of the Rev Claude DuTeil, we lend our efforts to the cause. The 1960 Legislature greatly increased the budget for this work and seems to be on the way to taking over entirely.

It is worthy of note that two of Hawaii's Training Centers for Retarded Children use the facilities of St Christopher's and St Clement's and that the Rev Paul M Wheeler was President of HARC in 1960.

The Chaplaincy at Hawaii State Hospital: Due mainly to the efforts of Dr Robert Spencer, now Acting Director of the Hawaii Division of Mental Health, the Rev Seido Ogawa became the first full-time paid Chaplain at Hawaii State Hospital in January, 1960. As soon as the Legislature met an economy move, and some question about religious favoritism, threatened to eliminate the Chaplain's salary. The efforts of our Division along with many others helped to retain the Chaplain in his ministry at HSH.

## HEALTH AND WELFARE The Rev Iver J Torgerson, Jr

One of the important tasks of the Church is it's ministry to the sick. "Not by bread alone" shall men live, not by medicine alone shall they be completely healed. The ministry of the Word and Sacrament mediated through the visitation of the priest supplement the power of medicine to meet the need of the sick.

In order that the ministry might be effective, every hospital in the Honolulu area is visited by a priest of the Church. It is his responsibility to minister to the churchmen who are patients in the institution under his care.

I want to thank the Rev Norman C Ault for his past service and welcome the Rev Reginald D Rodrigues who is taking over the Division of Christian Citizenship.

During 1961 we hope to encourage more activity in World Relief and Refugee Resettlement. The need for clothing and other items around the world is great, and we have requests from many Dutch-Indonesian folk who want to come to Hawaii. We also want to look into the possibility of bringing refugees from Hong Kong. Please let us know if you are interested in this.

We feel that a great deal more can be done in the area of Christian Citizenship. At present we are mobilizing our forces and resources to help in the campaign against the introduction of pari-mutuel gambling and dog racing to Hawaii.

Finally, I want to express sincere appreciation to all the clergy and laity for all that you have done to forward Christian Social Relations in Hawaii and throughout the world.

Net proceeds went toward the purchase of a vicarage for St Barnabas.

Through the fine work of Mrs Zaida Male, of Holst and Male, Inc, in Honolulu, and Chairman of the Diocese for the National Church's Radio and Television Department, a most commendable program "The Search" and "Thought for the Day" has been presented over local radio stations KPOA and KGU. We are grateful for their cooperation in bringing this before the public.

Weekly notices have been published in our local papers giving the hours of Church services.

Weekly services at St Andrew's Cathedral have been broadcast over station KPOA, which takes our Church to all islands and the Pacific.

We have examined the balance sheet of The Protestant Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands, as of December 31, 1960. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

The accounts and records of the church do not reflect the financial position and results of operations of parishes, missions and institutions which conduct the activities of The Protestant Episcopal Church throughout the State of Hawaii. However, certain trusts of these departments are held by the church, and accordingly have been taken into account in the accompanying financial statements.

Inasmuch as title to all real property, except the real property of Iolani School, Hawaiian Episcopal Academy and St. Clement's Church, is vested in The Protestant Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands, this property is accounted for in the records of the church. However, the carrying value of the real property is not infrequently an estimated amount, not readily subject to accurate determination, intended to represent expenditures made not only by the church but also by missions, parishes and other persons, or, more recently, an amount which represents only those expenditures made from the proceeds of loans from church funds or lending institutions which do not include certain other expenditures made through the treasurer's office or directly by churches and parishes.

In our opinion, the accompanying balance sheet and supporting schedules (Schedules I and II) have been prepared in accordance with established accounting practices of The Protestant Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.
