2021 started out with Covid interrupting peoples' lives and the Runs yet again! But it didn't stop the love and caring that so many gave ACCW so that ACCW could continue to share God's love with hands and hearts. Come February and the ability to get vaccinated, the Central Maui Wednesday Runs started again with enthused volunteers! And in July South Maui Kihei Runs were added and continued through the rest of the year despite the Omicron variant circulating.

Christmas Day fell on a Saturday and there was a Special Run complete with candy canes! So many happy faces to see us! "You actually came out on Christmas day for us?" we'd hear. "Absolutely!" was the reply. Expect continued Christmas Day Runs in the future.



A very special thank you goes to Rev Linda and Dr John Decker, the Kahului Hongwanji, and the Wailuku Hongwanji, all who made thousands of PB&J sandwiches this year for ACCW! (70 sandwiches per Run, with 52 Runs = 3,640 sandwiches!). Lots of love and sticky fingers!!

The wonderful Supply Team Angels filled thousands of snack pack bags and hygiene bags too. Not to mention the tireless work they did of sorting in-kind donations! ACCW was blessed with so many clothes and linens - Honua Kai resort gave 75 black, large size bags full of towels and sheets! Good Shepherd Church kindly let ACCW use one of their rental spaces for the overflow, and George Brown made several trips between Lahaina and Wailuku in his truck to get them. The entire Maui community - individuals, businesses, thrift stores, churches, Buddhist Temples, and Maui Humane Society all generously made in-kind and financial donations. Truly, people do care about the unsheltered here and want to help.

Run Leaders and Run Riders spent hours loading the Van and being "boots on the ground" bringing love and compassion to often hungry, frightened, and despairing people. These tireless volunteers understand that those ACCW serves are God's children in desperate need.

The Amala Place "clean up" sent some of our unsheltered friends to try shelter services, but others who did not qualify for entry still struggle to survive on the streets. Maui does not have an emergency shelter and the existing shelters are constrained by admission requirements. Nor is there an allowed encampment, so people are told to "Move on" - over and over again - but where are they to go?



In 2021, A Cup of Cold Water conducted 52 mission Runs and completed 2,770 service contacts with people in need, despite temporary suspensions due to Covid-19.

When we receive items that we cannot use, we share them with other agencies like Ka Hale A Ke Ola, Goodwill, Salvation Army, Trinity Treasures and rummage sales at our churches. ACCW Mission Highlights in 2021

A Cup of Cold Water is driven by the servant spirit-hood of Jesus Christ and it is within this spiritual context that we serve as volunteers, seeking our place with our fellow humans by serving Maui's destitute at their point of need. We desire to experience God through loving service with our neighbors on Maui.

Our Team currently consists of over 35 servants and many friends. All are volunteers. It includes our Board of Directors who are also assigned administrative tasks, Mission Run Leaders, Mission Riders, and a Supply Team which handles intake, sorting, purchasing, organizing, and counting. All these ensure we are mission ready every day, every week, and every month. But in the midst of a pandemic, things change.

Operating in a Pandemic Throughout 2021 Portends a Frightening Trend

The Covid-19 pandemic continues to present real challenges for ACCW. While we are blessed to be a 100% all-volunteer organization (no paid employees), it presented problems as most of our volunteers are retired and in the most vulnerable demographic of the pandemic. To protect our volunteers and the very clients we serve, ACCW reduced the number of Runs from three per week (pre-pandemic) down to one per week for most of the year. In late 2021, a second 'Kihei' Run was added.

With the number of Runs being reduced to a third of those in previous years, the number of people served, and the distribution of goods also declined proportionately in comparison to pre-pandemic statistics.

With the explosion of the number of unsheltered individuals and families, encampments (such as Amala Place) grew in size. The County's sweep of that location placed some individuals into shelters but sent even more scattering across the island. The scattered and more hidden unsheltered population is difficult for ACCW to find and serve, also contributing to lower numbers.

Looking Forward to 2022

ACCW is now part of a coordinated approach to the unsheltered community in Paia, thanks to the policies of the new administration of the Maui Police Department, specifically Chief Pelletier and Deputy Chief Hank. We hope that this coordinated effort will continue to grow so ACCW can serve other areas alongside our allied partners caring for the unsheltered. This coordination is effective in helping the unsheltered community find ways to 'get off the street' and back into society.

The Board of ACCW asks all members of the community for more compassion for the unsheltered with increased donations to charities, like ACCW, that service Maui's neediest.
