

MINUTES OF THE SIXTY-SECOND ANNUAL CONVOCATION OF THE MISSIONARY DIOCESE OF HONOLULU

Monday, February 3, 1964

At 8:00 A M the Service of Holy Communion was held in St Andrew's Cathedral, preceding the business meeting of the 62nd Annual Convocation. St Andrew's Priory Choir sang for this service.

Breakfast was served in St Peter's Parish hall.

The Bishop presided, and the meeting was called to order at 9:32 A M, in Tenney Hall. The Rev Kenneth D Perkins read the roll call of the clergy canonically resident in the district. The Roll of Lay Delegates was called by the Rev Joseph Pummill, and a quorum was declared present by the President. In addition to Lay and Clergy delegates, four official delegates were introduced: Mr Arthur Smith - Chancellor, Mr Hugh Shearer - Vice Chancellor, Mr Herman V von Holt - Secretary of the Board of Directors, and Henry F Budd. Treasurer.

A report from the Nominating Committee to the 62nd Convocation of the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu was given by the Rev E Lani Hanchett as follows:

For delegates to the Synod - it was moved that authority be given to the Bishop to appoint these delegates. Motion was seconded and approved.

The remark was made that at the Diocesan level the amount received from the National Church had been reduced from 110,000 to 9,000 per year, which help was applied to missionary salaries.

The Rev William Reeves, Jr from Iolani School, a newly arrived clergyman was introduced to members of Convocation.

Mr Herman von Holt, Secretary of the Board of Directors was introduced. Mr von Holt has held this position since 1932, and for his many years of service to the Church, received an "encouraging" round of applause. Mr von Holt gave his report which will be found in the Journal.

The Rev Paul Wheeler next spoke on Stewardship, and plans for 1964. He also mentioned Wills. His committee will put on a training session, details of which will be announced earlythis spring. Clergy will send persons who will be in charge of fall visitations. He stressed his preference for calling this effort fall visitations rather than Every Member Canvass. These persons, in turn will return to their local missions and parishes and hold training sessions at the local level. The overall program is under the direction of National Council. More material will be forthcoming. For copies of printed material, please contact the Diocesan Office. New clergy, especially, will be contacted very soon concerning this program, and all were urged to call on the Stewardship Committee for guidance.

Sister Evelyn Ancilla, C.T., was asked to give a brief report concerning the Priory. A written report was included in material already provided delegates to Convocation. She spoke of necessary changes in order to meet accrediting requirements; of how the representative from this department had very nice things to say

about the school, but that certain changes must be made (the school is presently accredited, but change must come soon). In the field of administration, an advisory council should be made up of certain business people, members of the Church, and some alumni. There is need for a master plan for a building and replacement program.

The Rev Burton MacLean, Headmaster of Iolani was the next speaker. He stated that it is getting to be more and more of a problem because the cost of education goes up and the school must continue to give the same and better level of education. There are problems of salaries, in addition to need for more and better facilities. Last year Iolani celebrated its Centennial Anniversary. It was a happy year, with a fine academic convocation in the spring of the year. The school is well along with the first step of a building campaign: \$530,000 has been paid up in pledges. The Rev Burton MacLean mentioned that not only Iolani, but St Andrew's Priory, would share in some of the facilities, e.g. gymnasium, track, etc. The second step in the development program will replace certain wooden buildings. including a library in the upper school, and will provide a laboratory for science students. The trend is to place more emphasis on the independent student - the exceptionally bright, and instead of meeting say 5 days a week, this student will meet 4 or even 3 times, and it is most essential that proper facilities such as adequate library be provided. Another planned feature would include an amphitheatre which would include closed TV circuit, and special space for display work.

The Rev John Engelcke of Canterbury House was introduced. Mr Engelcke expressed thanks for the kindness and support of Centerbury House. He particularly mentioned happiness over a recent very successful camp which was held jointly by the Episcopal Church, joined by Methodists and Lutherans. Mr Engelcke asked to be kept informed of the names of students from homes of Episcopalians who might be attending the University.

The Rev E Lani Hanchett asked that parishes and missions and organizations inform him of matters pertaining to the Department of Promotion, and that he be informed and provided with pictures and articles.

The Rev Lani Hanchett then presented the following motions:

- (1) That the minutes of the 62nd Annual Convocation be prepared and submitted to the Ecclesiastical Authority for approval.
- (2) That an expression of appreciation be extended to Mrs Raymond K Hoefener for her voluntary assistance as Recording Secretary of the Convocation and for the many hours she had given in the Diocesan offive prior to Convocation.
- (3) That an expression of appreciation be extended to the Clergy and Cathedral chapter of St Andrew's Cathedral for all that they have done to assist with Convocation, and to the Rector and Vestry of St Peter's Parish for the use of the Parish Hall for the Convocation Breakfast.
- (4) That the 62nd Convocation express appreciation to our guest of the Annual Convocation for the inspiration given to this occasion.

Motions were seconded and approved.

Following the Bishop's benediction, the meeting adjourned at 11:50 AM.

EXCERPTS FROM THE BISHOP'S ANNUAL ADDRESS 1964

UNCHURCHED - CONFIRMATIONS - EVALGELISM

The number of our confirmations in proportion to our communicant strength continues to remain at a lower level than it should -particularly the Confirmation of adults. I fear sometimes that we lack an imaginative and aggressive means of seeking and reaching the unchurched. We cannot expect much growth in Hawaii unless and until our parishes and missions are presenting each year confirmands which approximate 10% of their communicant strength.

Where do we begin to come to grips with the missionary opportunity at home? It is my belief that we must begin with the parish itself, because here we shall confront our basic strengths and weaknesses. If we can increase our strength at the parish level, we shall strengthen our entire line. We must realize that our primary responsibility is the growth and strength of the individual parish life, work and worship.

CLERGY

There were only 4 transfers of active clergy to other diocese in 1963 and we received 9 by ordination and transfers. Our clergy have been loyal to their Bishop, consecrated to their tasks, and above all, devoted to our Lord and His Church. Our clergy need and deserve the support of our laity. No minister of this church can fulfill his task as pastor and priest without knowing that the lay people are behind him.

Often times, when we hear that a priest has failed, I find the laity has also failed. Sometimes differences are over petty concerns, because we have forgotten the one who is, "The Way, the Truth and the Life." It is unfortunate that young clergy cannot serve apprenticeships before accepting full congregational responsibilities. Until such time as this is possible, I urge the new clergy to beware of making hasty changes and innovations and I urge the laity not to judge a new priest hastily by the way the last priest did things.

COLLEGE WORKER

A college worker was one of our objectives last year. We are pleased that we have the Reverend John P Engelcke full time, serving with the Reverend Morimasa Kaneshiro, as chaplain at Canterbury House, and working on the campus of the University of Hawaii with students and faculty.

May I urge each organization in every congregation to realize that a church which is committed to mission rather than to housekeeping - keeping its own organization going - has a renewal of joy and zest in its commitment to the Gospel of Christ.

20TH ANNIVERSARY FUND

The Bishop is indeed grateful to all who shared in the advance fund gifts, received at the time of his 20th anniversary. The fund now totals 5,589.68, and will be used to help our work on all our islands.

CHURCH CENTERS

Seabury Hall

The death of Mrs K Cooper brought to a close a life that brought great joy to the lives of many through her generosity and concern for others.

Her gift of her estate on the island of Maui to the church for a girl's school, is the fulfillment of a wish she held for many years. The main building will be called Cooper House in her memory. The school will be known as Seabury Hall, after the first American Bishop, Samuel Seabury.

We are indeed grateful to Mrs Cooper for her bequest, and pleased that our Church, by establishing this school, will help fill a great need in our islands.

CHURCH COLLEGE

The Episcopal Church has been invited to share in the establishment of a Christian Liberal Arts College in Hawaii. The Methodists, Congregational and Presbyterian Churches are receiving large grants from their National Headquarters to finance this college. Our Episcopal Church National Council is not in a position to help financially at this time. We have, however, been asked to be one of the sponsoring churches. This is the first time four churches have joined in such an ecumenical endeavor. Mr Harold Castle has given 100 acres of land for the college. It is planned that the opening will be September, 1965.

PRESIDING BISHOP

It is with great heartache that we all learned of the illness of our presiding Bishop - Arthur Lichtenberger. He has announced that unless he has improved in health by April, that he will probably find it necessary to resign at General Convention in October.

Let us keep him in our private prayers constantly, and remember him faithfully at our altars.

EPISCOPALIAN MAGAZINE

It is evident that many of our church people are uninformed as to what the Church is doing, not only in her mission at home and abroad, but how we are meeting modern problems, such as civil rights, church unity, urban and rural needs.

Our church's one national periodical, the Episcopalian, should be in every home, so that all our families may be informed and be able to speak intelligently and forcefully about our Church's programs at home and overseas. Some of our congregations have adopted the parish plan as the practical, and economical way to send the magazine into many homes.

May I commend this parish plan to all congregations as a means of bringing to our people the inspiration and wisdom from the best minds and leadership in our Church? Episcopalians have the right and the duty to know about every facet of the Church's life at home and overseas.

ECAP

Our Episcopal Centennial Advance Program over the past three years has blessed the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu. It has stirred the imaginations and lifted the sights of the members of our church family.

The Advance Fund, although not completed, has been a tremendous success. We are seeing the fruits of that endeavor all around us in the construction of new churches, parish houses and vicarages, as pledges are being paid.

We are thankful that because of what you have given and will give, we are in a much stronger position to do our work for God, by providing better facilities to reach out in new ways and new locations with greater effectiveness.

There is approximately \$184,232.57 still to be paid. I believe our churchmen will see that their payments on their pledges are paid in full. The three year period ends in April, but we will most certainly extend this period so that those in arrears can complete their payments. The Board of Directors has issued a request that an extension of time be given.

Losses by deaths and removals make it imperative that all those in arrears complete their payments to enable us to fulfill our commitments. These obligations are important, and should be treated as a solemn obligation to our Lord and His Church. Christians do not withhold from God what they have promised to God.

We commend St Stephen's and Emmanuel for completing their pledges 100%.

FINANCES

Looking ahead, I believe we can say that our plan must be increased steward-ship of our giving, to help us take care of our parish and diocesan needs, and to advance our work in Hawaii. The next few years will prove this on even a wider scale.

I pay tribute to the host of volunteer workers-men and women-who give generously to the Church. Every Church has them and we need more.

Self-support is uppermost in our minds. This past year we received \$69,838 from the National Church for Missionary salaries. This is quite a drop from the \$110,000 we were once receiving - approximately \$40,000 less than when we started our real self-support campaign. This has been possible because more missions are accepting full self-support - St George's and Holy Apostles being the latest congregations to achieve this goal. We now have 10 congregations completely self-supporting and 30 missions who receive partial aid from missionary sources. The Diocesan Office is now completely self-supporting.

We have talked of the 50 - 50 giving plan, a resolution recommended by General Convention, asking all parishes to consider as a goal one half of their income for local support, and one half for outside purposes, namely diocesan and general church programs. However, I must make this clear, self-supporting parishes and congregations are certainly encouraged to accept this goal, but missions receiving financial aid for missionary salaries have their first obligation to accept more financial responsibility, locally, and thus they are participating in this program by releasing funds from the National Church to be used elsewhere in the world.

Our building fund indebtedness was reduced by \$75,459.78 and new loans amounted to \$49,950. Our Episcopate Endowment Fund was increased by \$94,500 in 1963, due to bequests, ECAP Funds and interest

OBJECTIVES FOR 1964

- 1. We must complete our Episcopal Centennial Advance Program as soon as possible. This must have a <u>number one</u> priority, if we are to meet the commitments we have. Clergy and ECAP Treasurers must lend every effort <u>now</u> to bring this campaign to a close. It means accepting a personal responsibility to call upon all delinquent pledgers to ask for their help. Christians do not withhold from God what they have promised to God.
- 2. The study of the Anglican Congress manifesto, <u>Mutual Responsibility and Interdependence in the body of Christ</u>, should be made a part of the program of each Parish and Mission.
- 3. To keep our people informed of the world-wide program of the church. I urge each congregation to consider "The Episcopalian" magazine parish plan, so that every church home may receive our Church's official publication.
- 4. I have said much about wills and bequests in this address. Let us make 1964 a year when our people are made aware of the obligation and importance of remembering the church in their wills. This must be a continuing program of education, month after month.

5. Stewardship Training. We often think that because a thing has been said, it has been done. We have talked about various plans and programs of stewardship, but have we followed them? It takes time, we know, but it can only succeed if we have a continuous program of education. Our Stewardship Committee stands ready to serve. Stewardship is more than an every member canvass spasm once a year. It means continuous program of stewardship in every church and in every phase of life in every congregation.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE HAWAIIAN ISLANDS

Following election at the 1963 Convocation, the Directors met on February 25, 1963 and elected the following officers:

The Board met twice during the year for the transaction of the business af-met and counselled with the Bishop and other officers relative to the conduct of the Church's financial and legal affairs. Highlights of the year's activities included the following:

- 1. Authorized construction of six "A" frame units for Camp PECUSA and a two thousand gallon water tank.
- 2. Authorized an interest-free loan to Calvary Mission of \$53,180 from the Episcopal Construction Loan Fund.
- 3. Authorized various allocations of the Episcopal Centennial Advance Pro-
- 4. Authorized construction of a new parish hall at Good Samaritan Mission.
- 5. Authorized construction of a guest cottage at the Bishop's House.
- 6. Authorized purchase of land and construction of a new parish hall and classroom unit for Emmanuel Mission.
- 7. Approved in principal a plan for an apartment house to care for senior citizens under the sponsorship of St Andrew's Cathedral.
- 8. Approved renovation of facilities for the camp and conference center at Kamuela.

THE GENERAL COMMITTEE ON THE TOTAL MINISTRY

The task of the General Committee on Total Ministry is not so much to sponsor its own program of activities and projects, as to foster a growing awareness of the nature of the common ministry of Christian people, Clergy and Laity alike, through the existing program of the various Diocesan Departments.

The Committee works with the Diocesan Departments through the newly organized Diocesan Council, which is composed of all of the Department Chairmen.

In 1963 the Chairman of the Committee worked to help to organize the Council and to help that group to begin to see and to define its tasks. The Council has, to date, set before itself the task of working through the Departments "to train the Church in this Diocese to be that kind of dynamic fellowship in and through which Christian people can be equipped to perform their ministry in and to the world."

The Specific work of the Committee on the Total Ministry towards the fulfilling of that task has been the beginning of plans (1) for an "apprenticeship" program in which our newly ordained Clergy might each receive on-the-job guidance and training during his first years of ordination from an experienced Priest; and (2) for the institution of a yearly Laity Conference for both men and women, to be planned co-operatively by two or more Diocesan Departments in cooperation with the Episcopal Churchwomen and the Laymen, to provide continual training for the Laity for their role as Christians of the World.

The Committee has also begun to purchase and to circulate a small collection of books and pamphlets in which newly emerging thoughts on the Church's work, and especially on the ministry of the Laity, are discussed.

REPORT OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION - 1963

The Department is pleased to report the following achievements for the year 1963:

In Okinawa, the Reverend Edmond L Browning, of All Souls' Church, is spending a year in Kobe, Japan, where he and his wife are studying the Japanese language so that they may return to Okinawa and do a more effective work among these people. In his absence, the Reverend Paul R Savanack, who served in this District for eleven years, and for the past four years in Bucyrus, Ohio, has gone to take his place.

The Church on Guam, St John the Divine, has erected a new educational building to replace the one destroyed by the typhoon.

The work on Chi Chi Jima is progressing under the ministry of the Reverend lsaac Gonzales.

The Bishop has continued to take confirmations for men on Christmas Island, at the request of the Bishop of Polynesia.

Of great importance this rall was the final acquisition of the Mrs Katharine McGrew Cooper estate, at Makawao, Maui, which will become a diocesan college preparatory school for girls. There will be boarding facilities for girls and a limited registration for boy and girl day students. Classes will open in September 1964 for grades 7, 8, 9 and 10. The 11th and 12th grades will be added in succeeding years. A more complete report of this will be made at the business meeting of Convocation.

A new mission, St Michael's, has been opened in Lihue, Kauai, under the guidance of The Ven Charles T Crane. It will make application to be recognized as a mission at this Convocation.

New improvements in the Diocese have been noticeable in many directions, in the construction of new parish halls, churches, etc.

THE FIRST ANNUAL REPORT OF SEABURY HALL, MAKAWAO, MAUI - 1963

Seabury Hall is to be a diocesan college preparatory school at Makawao. Maui. There will be boarding facilities for girls and a limited registration for boy and girl day students.

The 9.35 acres of land with a lovely two story, five bedroom, five bath, five car garage home is the gift of the late Mrs Katharine McGrew Cooper. Her home and grounds have been given to the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu for the purpose of a girls' school.

Classes will open in September 1964 for grades 7, 8, 9, and 10. The 11th and 12th grades will be added in succeeding years.

The Churchmen on Maui have formed a variety of committees to make plans for building dormitory facilities and preparing the main building, Cooper House, for occupancy; gathering, buying, and cataloguing a library; designing and securing source of supply for material and a manufacturer for the girls' uniforms; collecting and outfitting all buildings with suitable furniture and attendant furnishings; and designing a layout and procuring equipment for a kitchen suitable to feed all students and faculty.

Some funds are available through the Episcopal Centennial Advance Program, a legacy, and several generous gifts in order that the physical plant and equipment are ready for use by September. The land and buildings were given to the Church but the school has no endowment.

As soon as a headmaster is chosen, the applicants for faculty and students will be interviewed, testing procedures adopted, board of directors selected and general staff employed.

Students applications are now being received and processed. Academically qualified girls are now being sought from within the Hawaiian Islands, as well as from the mainland and the Trust territories.

There is a need for a college preparatory school which provides for boarding girl students. The Church is equipped and can fill this need. Seabury Hall can take its place alongside the other fine scools in this diocese, which provide sound education amidst a community based on Christian ideals.

The success of this new venture under God will depend upon the support and generosity of the people in the Islands to provide books, furnishings, capital funds, scholarship aid, and their own daughters as students for the school.

REPORT OF ST ANDREW'S PRIORY - 1963

ENROLLMENT

The enrollment is approximately the same as last year's, the very slight difference being due to the comings and goings of daughters of armed forces personnel whose duty stations are changed without regard to the school year. We have no interest in any substantial increase in the enrollment as it is our policy that our students should be personalities to the faculty and administration and not numbers in an I B M system.

GRADUATES

On the 6th of June, 1963 fifty-five girls were graduated. Of these 46 are at present attending college, one is in a school of nursing, and seven are attending business schools. One is staying at home for the present. The above numbers are no criterion for judging the final proportion of those who will go on to college. Many of our graduates after working for two or three years to financa themselves go on to either the University of Hawaii, or to some college on the Mainland. During the 1959 - 1962 academic period two of our graduates received their doctorates; one from Harvard University in Education, and one from Johns Hopkins in chemistry. Information of this type is always a couple of years behind our current report year as it takes sometime for this data to reach us.

IMPROVEMENTS

Lack of finances (a euphemism for saying we operate on a deficit) prevented us from attempting any large scale improvements. However, by some minor remodeling the Sisters' former dining room in the Main Building of the school has been made into a private office for the principal. In actuality this is a major improvement although not a major financial outlay. Some necessary adjustments were made in the Faculty House (now the Sisters' Residence) to provide efficient kitchen and dining room facilities there. A smouldering fire, fortunately confined to one set of circuit breakers, called attention to the need for improved wiring in certain areas of the Main Building. This having been done, we feel safe again for another few years.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Religious Education is not just a part but the condition under which our whole curriculum is presented. Our purpose is to provide a community of sound learning within a Christian environment in order to develop in our students a high standard of personal responsibility in every area of life, and one which will abide with them when they have gone out from the Priory. We continue to hold daily school chapel services in the Cathedral for the whole student body, with celebrations of the Holy Communion at noon for the confirmed girls on the major holy days. Religious instruction is given daily in the lower school and several days a week in the upper school on the same academic level as their other subjects. During the course of the school year thirteen girls were baptized and twenty-one were confirmed in St Andrew's Cathedral at regular school chapel services. Others were baptized and confirmed in their parish churches. Eighty percent of the total enrollment is baptized. This is an increase of sixteen percent over last year. Thirty-four percent of those in the upper school, that is, twelve years old and over, are confirmed. This figure varies only slightly from year to year, because we are always graduating confirmed girls and taking in those who are not. Fifty-six percent of the student body claims affiliation with the Episcopal Church. We would like to see all our graduates Christians, and we hope that many of them will be Episcopalians, but it is not our purpose to steal sheep (or lambs) from other Christian folds and pastures.

ACCREDITIZATION

Towards the close of the year we made out a 105 page report to our new accrediting association, THE WESTERN ASSOCIATION OF SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES. Nine copies of this report had to be made (945 pages in all). We hope that 815 Second Avenue does not hear of this and be inspired to ask the same! A committee from the Association has made a formal visit to the school, and we will have their formal report early in the year. As we already know the general tenure of their recommendations some reference to them will be incorporated later in this report.

GENERAL REMARKS

At present our College and Vocational Counciling program under Mrs Carol Dodd is doing a superior job in this area for both the students and their parents. This service was highly commended by the committee from our accrediting association.

In the Comprehensive English Examination sponsored by the National Council of English Teachers taken by selected high school juniors from the various schools Carol Uyehara was one of the two top contestants in Hawaii. Incidentally, the other one was the son of a former Friory teacher who was herself agraduate of the school!

A Letter of Commendation in the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Examination was received by Willow Sekiya of the class of 1964. Marcia Chang of the class of 1963 received an Honorable Mention in the LIVING CHURCH annual essay contest.

In accordance with our policy of encouraging the students to take an active personal responsibility in Church and community the upper school attended the ordination of our chaplain, the Rev Thomas R Heimann, and the school choir sang for

the occasion. The Priory choir joined with the Cathedral choir for the Midnight Service on Christmas, as well as with the Iolani Choir for the service marking Episcopal Education week in November. Community welfare projects are contributed to through the Priory Welfare Fund raised by the school at the beginning of each academic year, as well as by the volunteer service of many of the older students.

BENEF ACTORS

As in past years the local Associates of the Transfiguration contributed to particular areas of need within the school. From the proceeds of the Bread Sale they sponsored they were able todonate \$1200.00 towards the financing of the school annual, KA ALELE; \$500.00 to the school library, and \$300.00 to the school paper, KE KUKUI. The Parent Teachers' Fellowship gave a donation for needed classroom equipment and teaching aids. Smaller benefactions from a variety of sources went into the fund for improvements.

TUITION - NEEDS

Although the tuition for the upper school (grades 7 - 12) was increased by one hundred dollars for the school year 1963-4, we are still operating on a deficit, and in order to pay our highly qualified faculty in even the lower brackets of the standard state scale for teachers we have been using all of our income from tuitions, leaving nothing available for new equipment and improvements. Hence, our deficit. Undoubtedly the tuition will have to be increased further, but this is not going to answer our basic need for a capital improvement fund. Our teachers are doing a creditable job and in many areas a superior one, but both they, the office and cafeteria staffs, and the administration are handicapped by lack of adequate rooms, offices and activity space.

We need an over-all plan for new buildings, and improvement of the existing ones, as well as for the eventual replacement of the present attractive, but inefficient (and unsafe by modern standards) Main Building. This brings us to the need for a capital improvement fund as mentioned in the above paragraph, and urged by our Accrediting Association in their report. Neither of these should be the responsibility of the Administration of the school, as it is also urged by them that the number of Sisters be increased to lessen the burden on the present Sister personnel, and permit in-service training for future administrators of the institution in order to insure the continuation of the school's present high standard and its philosophy.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

To the Bishop, the diocesan treasurer and their secretaries we take this opportunity to convey our deep gratitude for their continued interest, assistance and support. Our appreciation also goes to the Dean and Chapter of St Andrew's Cathedral for their permission to use the Cathedral for our daily school chapel services, and for other Cathedral facilities. We also want to thank the Rector and Vestry of St Peter's Church for their generosity in permitting the use of the church and parish hall for our school functions.

EXCERPTS FROM THE HEADMASTER'S REPORT 1963 10LANI SCHOOL

When September 5, 1963 came and Iolani began its 101st year there were 1,100 boys enrolled from kindergarten through 12th grade - the highest ever. This appears to be our top limit with the present facilities and without raising havoc with the teacher-student ratio which remains a favorable 1-16, though actual class size varies somewhat. The year 1963 spanned the last half of the centennial and the first half of the first year of Iolani's second century.

The Centennial Convocation

The Centennial year was especially celebrated and dignified by the Centennial Convocation in mid-March of 1963. Several hundred of our fellow colleagues in education along with parents and friends joined the faculty and administration in appropriately celebrating the century mark with our special guests: The Rev John Crocker, Headmaster of Groton School, Harold Howe, II, Superintendent of the Scarsdale Schools and Francis Parkman, then President of the National Association of Independent Schools.

The third and concluding session was held in a special service of commemoration and dedication at St Andrew's Cathedral where we were the guests of the Dean of the Cathedral, John Morrett, and at which time the President of our Board, The Rt Rev Harry S Kennedy, celebrated the Holy Communion, and the Headmaster delivered the Sermon.

Dedication of the Bayard Christopher Dillingham Pool

On Friday, May 17, 1963 a service of dedication of the Bayard Christopher Dillingham pool was held on the pool patio. The pool given by the Walter F Dillingham family and the Dillingham Corporation was named in loving memory of the late Chris Dillingham, Iolani '71, son of Bayard and Carter Dillingham.

The Centennial Class of 1963

The Centennial Class of 1963 were all admitted to college, seventy-one went to mainland colleges and universities and thirty-two to the University of Hawaii. As in the past a number of boys were interested in engineering though most (and this is a change) went into liberal arts programs, which can prepare them for any of the professional schools -- law, divinity, architecture, medicine or graduate work for a Ph D. A few planned to take Business Administration.

The Academic Program

It should be noted that the new academic programs that have been implemented in Iolani over the past several years are now well established. A few have been modified -- some have been elaborated -- all have been criticized and refined by the faculty.

Religion

The curriculum is being reworked by the Department of Religion with a greatly revised emphasis coming up in the content of the Biblical tradition -- the history, literature and poetry of the Bible appropriately taught at the different academic levels below the 11th grade and leading to, in the last two years, the more subtle subject of Ethics and Theology. The hope is that in the future boys will be literate enough in the Hebraic-Christian tradition to be able to think, speak and write about Christianity to appreciate its place in western culture and one day to be able to make a deliberate personal decision about Christian faith.

Chapel and Gymnasium

We have dwelt at some length on the academic side at Iolani. But the activity of the mind depends on the spirit and the body. In these areas we lean heavily on our Chapel and the athletic program. What goes on in a boy's spirit and what he does with his body are matters of utmost significance for his daily well being and ultimate satisfaction. So one can speak of the Chapel and Gym in the same sentence. We can be grateful for the men who preside over these places. They have set for our faculty, and boys alike, standards of spiritual discipline which are rigorous to the point of sweat and tears. Mediocrity of effort in matters of spiritual and physical are non-acceptable to our mentors in Chapel and Gym. They demand of us our finest, and in those demands they remind us outside of the classroom, as our masters and teachers remind us inside, that "mediocrity" is totally unacceptable. We have in Chapel and Gym as well as in the classroom the challenge of excellence.

The Needs and The Costs

Important to Iolani's future as are the facilities of a new Library-Humanities-Science Center and Lower School, still more important are better salaries and more faculty, particularly in English, so that we can reduce the load enough to allow each instructor to be less concerned with quantity and more with quality.

Scholarships

We are grateful to the Alumni Association which is becoming increasingly concerned to help further the educational goals of Iolani. In 1963 the Association gave \$1,000 for current scholarships and in addition turned over to the school the assets of the Father Kenneth Bray Scholarship Endowment in the amount of nearly \$11,500. Here is the beginning of what we expect will one day become a large scholarship endowment. Special gratitude should be given to Roy Chong and the Alumni Board for this act of education foresight.

Gifts for All Purposes in 1963

There were other gifts to Iolani in the course of 1963. For all purposes including payments on buildings pledges, scholarships, annual giving, etc. gifts totaled over \$270,000 for the calendar year 1963. Iolani could not possibly do its job without these generous gifts from parents, corporations, alumni, friends and trusts who care about independent education.

Nineteen hundred and sixty-three has been a banner year in the annals of Iolani. It could not be so but for the capable, intelligent, devoted and tireless work of the administrative officers and faculty. Nor could there be such progress as we experienced this year except for the devoted concern of each individual member of the Board of Governors augmented in mid-year by the addition of Messrs George Fukunaga, Jack Magoon and Charles Wichman.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HAWAII PREPARATORY ACADEMY TO THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE HAWAIIAN ISLANDS JANUARY 10, 1964

This year the Hawaii Preparatory Academy is completely settled on the new campus, with the addition of the fine new Administration Building and five new classroom buildings. Open House was held on Sunday after Thanksgiving with the hope that parents visiting on the island as well as members of our immediate community might see the new buildings and share our pride in them. The Science buildings are very well designed and equipped and we finally have a lecture hall which holds nearly 100 students where we can have our regular movies and talks of all kinds.

Our enrollment remains at the same level as previously, 165 boarding students and 47 day students, which is our full capacity. No further additions to our dormitory space are contemplated at the present as our great effort has been directed toward providing adequate facilities for the numbers we have.

This year has brought a very welcome gift of $3\frac{1}{2}$ tennis courts which are in use almost all of the time, and the completion of the football field. The baseball diamond is getting special attention with the hope that it will be in condition for use this season. Also we are using a small corridor of land next to our boundary for a polo field. We have a small group of very enthusiastic players as well as the regular horseback riding group. This year for the first time we are developing a swimming team.

Our football team won the Big Island Inter-scholastic Federation Champion-ship again this year to the great satisfaction of all concerned. Cn December 22nd the Academy Choir gave a Christmas concert at the Cathedral in Honolulu, notable for the delightful program and the fine quality of the singing.

Our academic progress continues, with more and more honors courses offered in every department. We have 13 of our 37 seniors, and 6 juniors in Advanced Placement courses in English, Latin, Mathematics, French or American History. Six of our seniors won a Certificate of Commendation in the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Tests.

The college admissions program continues to be very gratifying. One of last year's graduates is a Ranking Scholar at Yale (in the top 10%) and is also trying out for crew. Another one of our graduates is a member of the Tutorial Program for tutoring Mexican-American children at Pomona, and has a National Science Foundation grant to assist in studies of motivation. One of our former students graduated from the Univ. of Colorado with a degree in Anthropology; this year one will graduate from Yale Univ. College of Engineering. We have several students at Cornell University. We have two graduates doing very outstanding work at the Air Force Academy, one enrolled in the Master's Degree program in Economics. Another graduate is an electronic technician working for his B S and carrying a regular job working on such projects as the Minute Man, Apollo and Saturn missiles.

The Alumni Association issued its first bulletin in December 1963. The response to the questionnaire which went out with the Bulletin was immediate and has brought us many interesting notes about former students.

The Faculty continues to do a fine outstanding job, with very few changes in personnel. This year Mr Edson P Sheppard is Director of Studies, while Mr Edwin S Van Gorder is Dean of Students. Fr Thomas Kunichika continues as Academy Chaplain and teaches part time in addition to carrying his duties as Vicar at St James in Kamuela. He has been very helpful in many ways above and beyond the scope of his ordinary duties.

SUMMER CAMP

In June the Academy will begin its six weeks annual camp, using the full Academy facilities. Gutdoor life is emphasized and extensive use is made of the surrounding mountain country. Riding, swimming, hiking, overnight camping, and tennis on our new courts will be offered. Hikes are taken to Waipio Valley and the summit of Mauna Kea and bus trips will be made to the Volcano as well as other places of interest. We hope to have sailing and boating at Kawaihae Harbor. Mr David Fowler, our varsity football coach as well as a member of our History Department, and Mr Edwin S Van Gorder our Dean of Students and Head of the Mathematics Department will be in charge of the summer camp.

CANTERBURY HOUSE

In 1963 Canterbury House continued to be guided by the approach outlined by the Rev Morimasa Kaneshiro in the last annual report--that is, being the Episcopal Church at the University of Hawaii (Manoa Campus) and East-West Center, rather than merely being a social Canterbury Club.

The four aspects of the program at Canterbury House -- liturgical, pastoral, social, intellectual--are briefly described as follows:

<u>Liturgical</u>. Holy Communion is celebrated in the Canterbury House Chapel weekdays at 7:15 am. Communions at this service vary in number from 11 to 2. The daily December average was 4. There is in addition an evening celebration of the Holy Communion preceding the monthly dinner and meeting. An average of 21 attend this service; an average of 18 make their communions at this time. There are no confirmations or baptisms to report.

<u>Pastoral</u>. Canterbury House has an important place in the pastoral and mission work of the total church. A more-or-less full-time chaplain at Canterbury House provides Episcopal Students with an additional pastor and aspecialized counsellor who is nearby and available. The chaplain in the year past has similarly served several non-Episcopalians.

Social. The organized social program at Canterbury House centers about the monthly gathering held on the second Thursday. The celebration of Holy Communion, a dinner cooked by the students, and a general meeting comprise the evening program. Social activities are chiefly unstructured, depending on student initiative (i e, group attendance at football games, movies, performances by Canterburians, outings, the Christmas carol sing and get-together.) Canterbury House is open daily from 7 AM to 10 FM and provides a place to meet, eat, study, play ping-pong, talk, and relax. The names of 112 students were made known to us by the clergy of the various parishes. Of these, 43 are active in Canterbury House.

<u>Intellectual</u>. The intellectual apostolate has in the main taken the form of discussion with students as questions on matters of faith and ethics arise. As yet there has been no speaker or class-series in the present school year. The chaplain has spoken at the Methodist Foundation, the meeting of the Inter-Varsity Christian Fellowship (twice), and at the fall Faculty-Student Conference.

Canterbury House is pleased and grateful to acknowledge the kind interest of many friends expressed in many gifts: Mr and Mrs Richard Budar (8'xl2' rug), Miss Eleanor Burts and Mrs C M Cooke, Jr (magazines and periodicals), The Rector and Parish of St Clement's (desk, lamp, radio and record player, file cabinet, furniture, and blackboard), Mrs Larry Grant (cushions, 35mm slide projector and screen), Mr and Mrs Don Hill (picture frames), Mrs Gordon Ross (\$100.00), Political Affairs Club, University of Hawaii (furniture), and Mrs Elsie Simpson (TV set).

Thanks are due to the Bishop and the Reverend Messrs: Norman Ault, Paul Wheeler, Victor Krulak, Jr, Guy Piltz, and Thomas Heimann for their kindness in celebrating Holy communion at Canterbury House. Special thanks are due to the Reverend Morimasa Kaneshiro who has so ably continued a work so well begun and has given so freely of his time and experience to Canterbury House. One must mention in gratitude the work of Mr Franklin Chun, Senior Warden, and the continuing cooperation of the parishes and missions of the diocese upon whom Canterbury House necessarily depends.

DIOCESAN HOUSE AND ARMY-NAVY SERVICE CENTER

Our dormitory rooms are all occupied every weekend, unless the service men are on maneuvers on the various islands.

The men who have been staying here in the past year have been using more of the facilities of the House. Most of them cook their meals, read, write letters, play card games and watch the television for hours on end. Several of the men have become interested in singing in the choir or teaching a Sunday School class in one of the churches.

At Thanksgiving and Christmas the men, who did not already have dinner engagements, were invited to dinner with the families of two members of St Andrew's Cathedral. Dinner was not served at the House, but cake, candy, nuts, raisins and cider were at the disposal of the men during the holidays.

We have had a good many visitors staying in the guest apartments during the course of the year. They are used by the clergy from the other islands, and also our clergy going to and from Japan, Guam, Okinawa and Taiwan and to the Mainland. We had a large number of Australian, New Zealand and English guests who enjoyed their stay in the Square.

The usual organizations held their weekly or monthly meetings and lunches, teas and afew dinners were served to various committees or guests of the Cathedral or Diocese.

The only improvements in the House were the installation of an inter-com from the front door to the Hostess' apartment and the painting of the kitchen and pantry and the laying of new linoleum in the Hostess' apartment.

This has been a very gratifying year, and the service men and the guests who used the House seemed especially appreciative of what the Diocese and our National Church have done for them.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF STEWARDSHIP

The Department of Stewardship's major activity in 1963 was the presentation of the Five Basic Principles of Stewardship at training seminars held throughout the diocese. Department members Val Tennent, Henry Budd and Paul Wheeler conducted the training sessions on all of the islands. These sessions were well attended. The theme of the EYC Summer Conference was Stewardship, and the chairman of this department was the conference leader.

One of the most intensive training sessions was held at St Andrew's Cathedral where the men have really taken hold of the ideas presented and the parish is teaching Stewardship principles regularly. Training sessions were held for St Peter's, Epiphany, Holy Nativity and St Clement's combined for a pilot course preparing for the Visitation of Time and Talent.

As a result of the chairman's presentation to the Episcopal Church-Women of a talk called, "What are You Doing with Your Life?" requests from eight churches were received to present it to their congregations. This was done.

The Department purchased an excellent film for Stewardship Education entitled, "Not Mine Alone" and the film strip, "Stewart the Steward". These are available from the diocesan film library. Both the Methodist and United Church of Christ headquarters have good films and film strips that can be rented.

Printed parish leaflets and education flyers were made available for use during the Fall Visitation on Treasury. Mr Budd's office will make these materials available to you at any time.

Churches that had not already planned their $1963\,\mathrm{Lenten}$ Schedule participated in the Lenten Study of "Key Words for Lent" suggested in the Bishop's Convocation address.

The department is grateful to all who have worked with its members in promoting Stewardship education and training. We welcome your suggestions as to new ideas and means of continuing our program. As new men come into the diocese they will be advised of the department's program and areas wherein we will be of help to them and their people.

DIOCESAN DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The activities of the Department of Christian Education were involved mainly in determining the Christian Education needs of the Diocese, developing the membership of the Department, so that the various areas of the life of the Church were represented, and the formation of committees, each of which is in charge of a special area of concern.

The Department operated in these specific areas during 1963:

- Lenten Materials. Help to promote Church School Offering Materials. Developed a study guide for the Bishop's Book for Lent (in conjunction with the Department of Stewardship.)
- 2. Whitsuntide. A children's service at the Cathedral of St Andrew was held to emphasize the missionary work of the Church throughout the world through exhibits from all of the churches on Gahu and the importance of the children's missionary offering in this work. The Rt Rev H S Kennedy delivered the sermon and The Very Rev J J Morrett and The Rev Richard Kirchhoffer officiated.
- 3. Co-operated with the Honolulu Council of Churches (Christian Education Department) in the planning and execution of a Vacation Bible School workshop, which was held in May at Holy Nativity, and which was open to all denominations. We also worked with the Council in the organizing and presenting of a Sunday School Creative Arts workshop, which was held in September for all denominations at St Andrew's Cathedral. Through the chairman, the Diocese was represented at all meetings of the Council of Churches Department of Education.
- 4. The Film Library was moved from St Andrew's Priory to the Cathedral and a new film catalogue was sent to all of the Churches. Through Mrs Barbara Ennis films and film strips were sent out on request. New film strips were added to the Library.
- 5. Prepared and distributed new Birthday Thank Offering cards. The recipient of this offering is the "House for Children" of St James Mission on Miyako Island.
- 6. Money was raised and four delegates were sent to a Leadership Institute Phase One in the Diocese of California.
- 7. Helped upon request the leaders of the summer camp sessions at Mokuleia.
- Assisted those parishes calling for help in materials, teacher training, and other areas of concern.
- 9. In cooperation with the Department of Camps and Conferences helped organize a Conference for the clergy of the Diocese. The speakers for this three day conference with The Rev Greer Taylor and The Rev John D Zimmerman.

The Department in the coming year has several areas of focus. We will continue to work toward better Leadership Training, better adult education programs in conferences and parish classes, a five year study program for our camps, and along with the Department of Camps and Conferences a new philosophy for camps, conferences and retreats. As in the past, our special area of concern will be in supporting the role of the laity in their ministry.

THE DEPARTMENT OF YOUTH 1963 Report

The Department of Youth had as its members during 1963, the Reverend E Lani Hanchett, Chairman; the Reverend Guy H Piltz, the Reverend Victor Krulak, Mr Winston Ching.

The Summer Camping Program went well this year under the direction of the Reverend Guy H Piltz. All camps operated at capacity and some beyond capacity. 2-two week camps for children began the summer program at the Conference Center at Mokuleia in June and July. This was followed immediately by the JECOH Conference which ran for two weeks. All sessions went very well.

The EYC Episcopal Young Churchmen Conference followed the JECOH'S Junior Episcopal Churchmen of Hawaii at Mokuleia. The theme for the 6 day session was "Christian Stewardship" with the Reverend Dr Paul M Wheeler as the Conference leader.

Summer camps and Conferences were also held at Camp Pecusa, Maui; at the Conference Center at Hanalei, Kauai; and on the island of Hawaii. Each island reports good experiences.

The EYC began their year with the Convocation Banquet in February at the Iolani School Student Center with some 600 young people in attendance. The Reverend William Pollard was the guest speaker. At the conference at St Peter's Church the next day, Miss Lois Lee was elected as State President of the Episcopal Young Churchmen.

The Annual Bishop's Ball was held at Iolani School Student Center in May. It was well attended and enjoyable.

Two Bowling Tournaments, one in the Spring and one in the Fall, provided keen competition for teams from participating churches. Also in the Spring, a basket-ball tournament was sponsored with 8 teams participating.

The annual summer volleyball tournament took place in late July and early August. Most of the Oahu churches entered teams. The championship game was played at the time of the Summer Picnic at the Bishop's Home. In the neighborhood of 300 young people attended.

Our youth have participated well in the program of the Honolulu Council of Churches, being well represented at a weekend conference and other functions.

It has been a good year for the Diocesan Youth.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS.

At the outset I wish to express my appreciation for the work of the Rev Joseph Pummill who assumed responsibility for this department while I was away on a study furlough during parts of 1962 and 1963. Also we recognize with gratitude the many projects of Christian social relations that are done by the diocesan departments of women, men, youth and others, as well as the work of individual parishes and missions. We refer you to other departmental reports for additional information on CSR, and we hope that this department may be of service from the diocesan to individual levels. Below is a report of the work of this department by divisions during 1963:

World Relief and Refugee Resettlement:

The Rev Joseph H Pummill is responsible for the work of this division and has done this work faithfully and well. We have not been able to resettle more Dutch-Indonesian refugees because the immigration dead-line has passed, and we have received no further requests to resettle Cuban refugees. Instead Fr Pummill has been engaged incorrespondence toward the bringing of Chinese immigrants from Hong Kong, but, to date, we have not been successful in completing arrangements for this. We hope that we will be able to bring some families and individuals from Hong Kong in 1964.

Churches and individuals have contributed funds for world relief in the following categories and amounts: For Cuban refugees residing in centers in the U S, mostly in Florida, and for the advancement of Negro Civil Rights, \$2,497.18. The Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief, Thanksgiving Offering, and Share Our Surplus "Trick or Treat" Halloween collections, \$543.75. This department and various churches, individually, participated in the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund, UNICEF, "Trick or Treat" program also at Halloween.

Christian Citizenship:

Our major effort in this division has been in the area of civil rights for the negro. We cooperated with the Honolulu Council of Churches in exerting our influence toward the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1963, S. 1731 and H. R. 7152. A list of "doubtful representatives", suggestions for "Letters for Freedom" and a digest of the bill were sent to all clergy and made available to all church members. We will continue our efforts in this general area.

Health and Welfare:

Our major work in this division consists of chaplaincy work in the various institutions and hospitals throughout the Islands by a number of clergymen and lay men and women. Several of our people work in cooperation with the Honolulu Council of Churches Institutional Chaplaincy Committee in providing interdenominational worship services, visiting, counseling, and other types of work.

In addition to the above, at least one of our clergymen and some laity are assigned to each hospital and institution in the Islands to bring Holy Communion, pastoral counseling, prayers for healing and other ministrations especially for Episcopalians. Many hospitals and institutions provide files of inmates by religious denomination so we can find our people, but many do not. It is best to contact the chairman of this department or the Bishop's office to make sure that this ministry reaches all of our people.

Community Services:

Many of our churches sponsor, or provide their facilities, for Pre-schools, Day Care Centers, Boy and Girl Scouts, Cubs and Brownies, Alcoholics Anonymous, Alanon, and many other types of community organizations and services. At the Armed Services YMCA our churches take their turns ashosts for the Sunday afternoon "Coffee and Cookie Fellowship" hours and our clergy and laymen have led the "Java Club" Sunday morning devotionals during the month of December, 1963

I want to thank all clergy and laity who have furthered the work of Christian Social Relations in our diocese and throughout the world in 1963. There is a great deal more that can, and should, be done in this area, so we welcome your criticism, suggestions and help in accomplishing our common task. The chairman

would particularly welcome inquiries by clergy or laity who would like to assume leadership of, or work in any of the divisions of this department.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLICITY AND PROMOTION

The Department has attempted to cover the major events in the life of the Episcopal Church in Hawaii during the past year. It would be most helpful if parishes and missions would keep the Department informed about local activities that would have news value.

The Department will be glad to assist any churches or organizations in publicity or promotional work.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE EPISCOPAL CHURCHWOMEN OF HAWAII - 1963

During 1963 the Episcopal Churchwomen of Hawaii have carried on the program of service in the Diocese and the more distant parts of the world, and at all times have attempted to serve the Bishop in every way possible.

The Executive Board held seven regular meetings. I heartily thank Mrs Sam P King, Mrs F Gordon Halstead and Mrs Stanley Carver for presiding during my absence from Hawaii. Mrs King and Mrs Carver have taken care of newspaper publicity throughout the year, and Mrs Halstead has overseen the details of all social affairs.

The Vice Presidents on the neighboring islands have organized joint meetings when a speaker from Honolulu has drawn them together. Miss Margaret Monteiro went to Maui in May, and Dr Wheeler went to Hawaii and to Kauai as a result of his inspiring presentation of "Stewardship" at the 1963 Convocation. Two island-wide meetings were held on Oahu. Miss Rachel Wolff from Madras Christian College in India showed colored slides of the school and the people of India. A gift of a scholarship (\$60) was given her for some child in Madras to attend school for one year. Bishop Kennedy was our popular speaker in October when he told about his trip to Russia. At this time women brought books from their own libraries for Seabury Hall, the new school which will open on Maui next Fall. Church women are asked to donate worthwhile books at any time in order to enrich that library.

The Board voted to discontinue the Mother's Memorial Fund since there is no longer need of it. A gift of \$100 from the Fund was given to Deaconess Sarah Swinburne upon her retirement. The balance was put in the Discretionary Fund to be used, hopefully, for scholarships for church workers.

The resignations of Mrs Sam P King, first vice president; Mrs Carl Pischel, corresponding secretary; and Miss Helen Baird were accepted with regret. The new vice president is Mrs Stanley Carver and Mrs Vern Christensen the new corresponding secretary.

A small group of faithful women have done much on the Altar Guild. During the year they have made and given away to many churches: four burse and veil sets, pulpit hangings, Bible markers, seven fair linens, three credence cloths, nineteen purificators, three lavabo towels, three baptismal towels, two corporals, one surplice, one pall board, one post communion veil and one stole. They have also mended and cared for other pieces.

The Lenten Study based on "The Christian Mission on the Rim of East Asia" was capably handled by Mr S T Lee, Executive Secretary of the Missionary District of Taiwan; Miss Margaret Monteiro, retired lay missionary worker; Bishop Kennedy; the Rev Paul Kim of St Luke's mission; and Mr Ho Ming Cheung, a student at the University of Hawaii. On these Friday mornings of Lent the Devotional Secretary planned a Chain of Prayer in Parke Chapel in which women from all the churches and missions took part. Two hundred and fifty-nine women from thirteen churches on Oahu sewed on layettes which were sent to St Barnabas' Maternity Hospital in Osaka, Japan. Thirteen items each in forty packages were the result. Two similar packages were made by the women of the Kohala Missions on Hawaii and four similar boxes by the Church of Good Shepherd on Maui. A gift of \$25 was sent to St Margaret's House in Berkeley for bed linen and towels for the students.

The 1963 total of United Thank Offering was 55,573. This was an increase of 1,180 over 1962. The number of contributors also increased. The chairman spoke at several churches on Oahu and made a brief trip to Maui and Hawaii.

Mrs Richard Bond, Jr, our representative to the United Church Women, served as secretary of their State Board. She reported a good representation of Episcopal women at their three annual "Big Days".

The women as individuals and through their churches gave \$5,637.82 to the Bishop's Specials: \$3,049.85 to Discretionary Fund, \$1,463.47 to Seminary Students, \$530.50 to Camp Pecusa, \$594 to St Augustine's Mission in Kohala.

The devotion of the women to the church is a constant inspiration, as the work is done quietly day after day with interest and enthusiasm.

We have examined the balance sheet of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands as of December 31, 1963. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

The accounts and records of the church do not reflect the financial position and results of operations of parishes, missions or institutions which conduct the activities of the Protestant Episcopal Church throughout the State of Hawaii. However, certain trusts of these departments are held by the church, and accordingly have been taken into account in the accompanying financial statements.

Inasmuch as title to all real property, except the real property of Iolani School and St. Clement's Church, is vested in the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands, this property is accounted for in the records of the church. However, the carrying value of the real property is not infrequently an estimated amount, not readily subject to accurate determination, intended to represent expenditures made not only by the church but also by missions, parishes and other persons, or, more recently, an amount which represents only those expenditures made from the proceeds of loans from church funds or lending institutions which do not include certain other expenditures made through the treasurer's office or directly by churches and parishes.

In our opinion, the accompanying balance sheet and supporting schedules (Schedules I through III) have been prepared in accordance with established accounting practices of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.
