At 8:00 AM the Service of Holy Communion was celebrated in St Andrew's Cathedral with Bishop Gray as Celebrant, preceding the business meeting of the 63rd Annual Convocation. St Andrew's Priory Choir sang for this service. Necrology by The Rev C E Blackmon.

Breakfast was served in St Peter's Parish Hall.

The Bishop presided, and the meeting was called to order at 9:30 A M, in Tenney Hall. At this time the Bishop's Annual Address was given.

Next item of business concerned awards for distinguished service. Diocesan Seals were presented to Mrs Leonard (Margaret) Werner, and Raymond K Hoefener. Distinguished Service Crosses were presented to Mrs Charles Y J (Frances) L Afong, Mrs Henry (Katherine) Caldwell, The Rev David P Coon, The Ven Charles T Crane, Mrs Edward T (Mary Lamora) Harrison, and Mr Val Tennent.

The Rev Kenneth D Perkins read the roll call of the clergy canonically resident in the district, and the roll of Lay Delegates was called by The Rev Joseph Pummill. A quorum was delcared present by the President.

The Rev Norman Ault made the following nominations: For Secretary - The Rev Kenneth D Perkins; for Assistant Secretary - The Rev Joseph Pummill, and that if there were no further nominations that a white ballot be cast in their favor. Motion was seconded by the Rev John Engelcke, and the nominations ratified by Convocation.

Motion was made by the Assistant Secretary that Convocation Annual Reports be limited to: The Treasurer's Report, Secretary of The Board of Directors, The Diocesan Council and the General Committee on the Total Ministry, Seabury Hall and Hawaii Loa College. Motion was seconded and approved.

Motion was made by The Rev Mr Pummill that the date for the 1966 Convocation be set for Feb 17 to the 22nd (Thursday through Monday). Motion was seconded and passed.

Next item was the roll call of Lay Delegates by Islands. Each group was asked to stand as they were named.

New clergy and families to come to the Diocese since last Convocation were introduced as follows: Mrs Winona Yoshida, wife of The Rev Thomas Yoshida of Christ Church, Kilauea, Kauai, Chaplain Alister Anderson, US Army, The Rev Stanley M Adams and Mrs Adams from Waikiki Episcopal Chapel, The Rev Charles H Smith and Mrs Smith from Holy Innocents, Maui, The Rev G W Frederick McKinney and Mrs McKinney from Calvary, The Rev James S Nakamura and Mrs Nakamura from St James', Hawaii.

Delegates were asked to stand while the following resolution was read by The Rev E Lani Hanchett:

"In Memoriam:

"We remember before God this day, The Reverend Y Sang Mark, devoted priest, deceased November 20, 1964, after having served the Lord faithfully in this office for

fifty-four years.

"He was born in China and received his theological training at The Church Divinity School of the Pacific, Berkeley, California, and was ordained deacon in June, 1909, and priest in May 1910.

"He served as Rector of St Peter's Church, Honolulu from 1928 to 1952, going into retirement in that year from the active ministry, but continuing to serve in a limited capacity until his death.

"May God rest his soul and Light Perpetual shine upon him.

"THEREFORE, be it resolved that this Convocation give praise and thanksgiving to God for the faithful service of and witness for Christ by The Reverend Y Sang Mark, and offer the earnest hope that he may go from strength to strength in God's nearer Presence.

"FURTHERMORE, be it resolved that a copy of this Resolution be given to his wife as an expression of our sympathy for her, and of our high regard for her departed husband."

Resolution passed unanimously.

While still standing the following resolution was given by The Rev Burton L Linscott:

"WHEREAS, The Venerable James A Walker, on April 22,1964, completed a ministry of 45 years in these Islands, and

"WHEREAS, he served as Archdeacon of the Island of Hawaii from 1930 until his retirement in 1948, and

"WHEREAS, by his devoted efforts as missionary and pastor hundreds of souls were brought to our Lord,

"BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that this 63rd Convocation return thanks to Almighty God for his faithful witness, and that an expression of gratitude and sympathy be extended to his family, and

"BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be presented to his widow and constant co-worker, Marguerite Ada Billam-Walker."

Resolution was approved unanimously.

The Rev Kenneth D Perkins made the next Resolution as follows:

"WHEREAS, St George's Mission, Pearl Harbor, of the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu, has been a mission of this Diocese since 1955, and

"WHEREAS, St George's Mission has been completely self-supporting for the whole year of 1964, and

"WHEREAS, the financial status of this mission is strong and healthy and will enable us as a parish to support a rector, and

"WHEREAS, St George's Mission accedes to the Constitution of the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu and promises obedience to the Canons and conformity to the doctrine, discipline, and worship of the Church, and

"WHEREAS, The Bishop's Committee of this Mission on 14 December 1964 voted to recommend to the congregation of St George's Mission that they apply for status as a parish at the next Convocation, therefore be it

"RESOLVED, that the Bishop of the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu be requested to issue a Certificate of Erection of St George's Mission into a Parish at the next Convocation of the Missionary Diocese, Honolulu, and be it further

"RESOLVED, that this resolution be forwarded to the Bishop for his consideration.

Passed unanimously at the Annual Meeting, St George's Church, Pearl Harbor, 18 January 1965

The resolution was enthusiastically applauded by delegates present, and passed unanimously.

"WHEREAS, St Stephen's In the Fields, Wahiawa, Hawaii, of the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu, has been a mission in this Diocese since 1932, and

"WHEREAS, St Stephen's Mission assumes full responsibility for the stipend of its Vicar and the full pension premium, and

"WHEREAS, the financial status of St Stephen's Mission is strong and healthy and will enable this mission as a parish to support its Rector and.

"WHEREAS, the Bishop's Committee of St Stephen's Mission voted to recommend to the Congregation of St Stephen's that they apply for status as a parish in 1965, and

"WHEREAS, the Congregation does accede to the Constitution and Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States and to those of the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu and promises obedience to the Canons, and conformity to the doctrine, discipline and worship of the Episcopal Church, therefore be it resolved

"THAT the Bishop and the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu be requested to issue a Certificate of Erection of St Stephen's Mission into a Parish of this Missionary Diocese at the next Convocation of the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu, sitting in session, February 27, 1965, and be it further

"RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Bishop for his consideration."

Passed at a meeting held in the nave of St Stephen's Episcopal Church, Wahiawa, Oahu, Hawaii, of which, the members received due notice.

The Rev Stanley M Adams was asked to present a letter to the Bishop wherein the Episcopal Chapel in Waikiki might become an organized mission. The Rev Mr Adams read the following letter:

"Episcopal Chapel in Waikiki, January 25, 1965

The Right Reverend Harry S Kennedy, Bishop of Honolulu, Queen Emma Square, Honolulu, Hawaii

"Dear Bishop Kennedy:

In the five months that the Chapel has been in operation, a congregation of regular communicants has developed sufficiently large enough, in my opinion, for the Chapel to be placed in a mission status. I do believe that with a corporate identity, our mission to the tourists and residents in the Waikiki Area would be more efficiently carried out.

It is therefore requested that THE EPISCOPAL CHAPEL IN WAIKIKI be designated as an Organized Mission of the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu, in accordance with

Section 1, Canon VI of the Canons, Constitution and Charter of the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu.

It is further requested that in accordance with the provisions of Section 4, Canon VI, the following listed persons be designated as the Bishop's Committee to attend to the ordinary business of the Mission. Each has indicated his desire to serve as members of the Committee.

"WHEREAS, the Rev Jacinto B Tabili, Pastor of the Mission read a motion approved by the Bishop's Committee and the Philippine Independent Church Organization of the Hamakua District to petition the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Missionary Diocese of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands to recognize the mission of the Philippine Independent Church in the Island of Hawaii as an organized mission under the Missionary Diocese; and

"WHEREAS, it was moved, duly seconded and unanimously approved that the Bishop's Committee be given blanket authority to draft, sign and forward a resolution to the Ecclesiastical Authority to petition the same to recognize the mission of the Philippine Independent Church in the Island of Hawaii as an organized mission under the Missionary Diocese; and

"WHEREAS it was further moved, duly seconded and unanimously approved that the Bishop's Committee be given blanket authority to name the mission;

"NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as hereby resolved by the Bishop's Committee to petition the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Missionary Diocese of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands to recognize the mission of the Philippine Independent Church in the Island of Hawaii as an Organized Mission under the Missionary Diocese;

"RESOLVED FURTHER, that the Mission be called The Church of the Resurrection of the Philippine Independent Church; and

"RESOLVED finally, that a copy be furnished to the Ecclesiastical Authority.

The Rev Mr Hanchett further moved that the Delegate to the 46th Synod of the Pacific, to be held in Grace Cathedral, May 4, 5 and 6th be appointed by the Bishop.

Motion was seconded and passed.

The Rev Roger M Melrose gave a brief progress report on Seabury Hall. Mrs Kennard, wife of the Director of Studies, was introduced, and she in turn introduced members of the Seabury Bell Ringers team. The Bell Ringers were most generous with their talents and enthusiastically received by members of Convocation.

Summarized report of the Diocesan Treasurer follows: Received \$79,273 from the National Church to subsidize salaries for Clergy. The Trust Endowment Fund has a total of \$1,090,985. All parishes and missions have paid their Diocesan Assessments for 1964 with St Timothy's overpaying the amount assigned by \$50 and Christ Church, Kona by \$100. Assessments for 1965 are \$95,405, an increase of \$7,355 over last year. Payments on ECAP pledges of \$714,857 amount to \$629,000 which includes a parcel of land worth \$30,000 donated for the fund. A voluntary increase of \$2,500 to the National Church raising the quota from \$11,500 to \$14,000 was recommended. \$16,146.33 has been contributed for work outside of parishes and missions. To this should be added varying sums for the Presiding Bishop's Fund, World Relief, and Civil Rights. A total in all of \$16,987.33 or an increase of almost \$6,000. Total indebtedness as of Dec 31 was \$562,022. Plans for development of Church Property in Emma Square was briefly mentioned. Appreciation was extended to Mr von Holt, Mr Smith, Mr Shearer and members of the Board of Directors for their helpful and gracious assistance.

Mr Budd then moved that the proposed budget for 1965, including the National Church Quota of \$14,000 be adopted as presented. Motion was seconded by The Rev Paul Wheeler and passed.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE HAWAIIAN ISLANDS

Following election at the 1964 Convocation, the Directors met on February 20,1964, and elected the following officers:

The Board met 5 times during the year for the transaction of the business affairs of the Diocese. Highlights of the year's activities included the following:

- 1. Authorized a capital funds campaign to raise a minimum of \$350,000 for new buildings for St Andrew's Priory.
- 2. Authorized the purchase of 57,536 square feet of land in Lihue, Kauai, for a new mission to be named St Michael's and All Angels.
- 3. Approved a master plan for use of church land on Queen Emma Square and the construction of second floor units in the Cluett Apartments with a new Diocesan Center on the street level.
- 4. Accepted with gratitude and appreciation the generous gift of Mrs C Montague Cooke, Jr, to be used for the construction of a chapel at Seabury Hall, Makawao,
- 5. Approved a loan of \$3,466.90 for St Stephen's Mission to complete payment of cost of construction of new educational unit.

- 6. Approved a loan of \$10,000 for St John's School, Guam, for construction of additional classroom facilities.
- 7. Approved a loan of up to \$40,000 for St Michael's and All Angels Mission for construction of a new parish hall.
- 8. Approved the proposed Diocesan Budget for 1965.

EXCERPTS FROM THE BISHOP'S ANNUAL ADDRESS 1965

The Episcopal Church, nationally is certainly conscious of the rapid cultural change. An entirely new approach to our missionary work and witness involving Mutual Responsibility and Interdependence of the Church throughout the world has been developed.

We continue to share in Ecumenical affairs; the Church's role in society has been re-evaluated, field surveys have been made by our Executive Council; field workers have been made available for conferences and institutes to share their findings and suggestions with Dioceses. We have had several conferences this past year, planned and carried through by a team of nationally trained leaders.

We are grateful to the Cathedral and St Mary's Mission for the programs they have developed for Senior Citizens and Golden Age Groups.

Each congregation is faced with the problem of change. Either it will grow and adjust to meet new needs or it will deteriorate. The Church must grow and change with its people's needs. The Gospel must be re-interpreted and made relevant to each new human condition.

I am confident that in every congregation in Hawaii we will meet the challenge of changing conditions to work together in new and exciting ways for God and His Kingdom.

THE CHURCH

Even if the population of our Islands were to stop increasing (and there is no evidence of this) the number of the unchurched people who live in Hawaii would prove an opportunity for continued growth for years to come. Actually there is every indication that many parts of our Diocese are increasing in population and that we must grow rapidly even to keep up with our communities. The Diocese is and has been out negotiating for land in many parts of our Islands, where growth is apparent. We need study and guidance in adjusting our organization to cope with present and projected growth.

We have plans for portable chapels and classrooms that can be set up on a site without delay, when land is available. These plans have proved helpful and satisfactory to the Diocese of Olympia. They can be used by a congregation for several years, until they are able to build a permanent structure. Then they can be moved to another site to serve the same purpose.

I am deeply grateful to the reorganized Bishop and Council on the work of the Total Ministry, where all departments have made real progress this past year, and have exciting plans for the future.

On all Islands there are places where our future planning is involved. To mention a few - Kona, Kaanapali, Lihue, Ewa Beach, Waianae, Hawaii Kai, Urban Development, American Samoa.

We must look at our many works in this Diocese not as isolated actions, or unrelated events, in separate parishes and missions, and not as cogs in a Diocesan machine, but rather as parts of the Church in its wholeness, because our Diocesan Church is likened to the One Great Church which we call the Mystical Body of Christ.

CLERGY

We now have a total of 69 Clergy. Of this number 41 are in Parish work, 7 in School work, 2 Chaplains in the Armed Forces, 5 retired, 6 licensed, 13 non-parochial.

We had two Ordinations to Diaconate, 5 Ordained to the Priesthood, 5 Seminarians, 3 Postulants not in seminary, 5 Sisters of the Transfiguration, and 176 Lay Readers in Hawaii, Midway, Samoa, Kwajelain and Okinawa.

Four new Clergy have been received into the Diocese this past year. The Rev Frederick McKinney came from the Diocese of Olympia; The Rev James Nakamura from the Diocese of California, and two graduates from C.D.S.P. - The Rev Stanley Adams, and The Rev Charles Smith. We are also pleased to have Chaplain Alister C Anderson, U S Army, stationed at Tripler Hospital.

STATISTICS

One of the problems with us, as throughout the whole Church is that of "Drop Outs". That is, the large number of lapsed members. Persons confirmed and then lost for various reasons. Too many of our congregations have large lists of confirmed persons who are not active communicants.

One of the general divisions of our Church made a study of this problem. More than 600 persons were interviewed and most reported that they considered the Church to be primarily a self-help or social outlet. Their interest in the Church stemmed mainly from selfish or social reasons.

More women then men seem to be Church-goers. As for the current "Drop Out" rate of every one of two communicants in the Episcopal Church, the Church's inadequate record-keeping of transfers in a highly mobile population may be responsible.

SELF SUPPORT

We now have an endowment fund that by the end of 1965 will amount to one half million dollars. This fund has grown from \$57,565 ten years ago, due to ECAP, bequests, interest and offerings.

The whole thinking of the Church has changed in recent years concerning endowments. We sincerely hope our Episcopate Endowment will continue to grow through bequests and gifts, but the general feeling in the Church is that we must invest more money in the lives of people by establishing missions and other Church endeavors, rather than in stocks and bonds.

Two congregations will become self-supporting at this Convocation. We congratulate St Stephen's, Wahiawa, and St George's, Pearl Harbor, their Vicars, The Rev Howard Kishpaugh and The Rev Kenneth Perkins.

We now have 13 self-supporting congregations. Missions are paying \$42,518 toward salaries. Last year we reduced our askings from New York to \$78,500. However, the increased missionary salaries this year will naturally increase what we receive from The National Church. This increase will make our askings for 1965 amount to \$95,000. We pay locally on all salaries, \$123,000.

Diocesan assessments for support of the work in Hawaii amount to \$95,405. This is an increase of \$67,000 in ten years.

All congregations are to be commended for paying their assessments in full.

We are paying only \$11,500 on our National Council Quota, which is a voluntary figure since being overseas we are not given any definite quota. However, to be fair to the Whole Church we should be carrying more of the Missionary load. I hope that by

next General Convention we will be able to raise our quota to at least \$20,000. We have been the recipients of aid from the parishes and missions of the American Church for 63 years. This year we have promised to pay \$14,000 to our National Church.

ECAP

So many of our people have been generous and most faithful to ECAP. I suspect that almost all of those present come within this category. But we do have a substantial number of unpaid pledges. The Clergy and treasurers have been wonderful about this and there are 15 congregations that have paid their ECAP in full and others are continuing faithfully to pay their pledges, with every intention of completing their pledges.

INSTITUTIONS

We now have 18 Nursery, Parochial and Diocesan Schools. Iolani, The Priory and Hawaii Preparatory Academy are proving to be quality schools with high academic standards. Their graduates each year are accepted by our country's finest universities and colleges. Iolani has an enrollment of 1,111, St Andrew's Priory 551, and Hawaii Preparatory Academy 215 - Boarding and Day School students.

Iolani is in the midst of a Development Program to raise one million dollars for a Library, Learning Center, Upper and Lower School Buildings.

St Andrew's Priory completed a successful expansion program amounting to approximately \$425,000. This will enable them to build a combination Auditorium-Gymnasium, Class Rooms and Student Center. The Diocese joins with the Sisters in expressing our deep gratitude to all those who worked so diligently for the success of this endeavor.

Hawaii Preparatory Academy is completing a new Library, a gift to the school. Plans are also underway to build a chapel and gymnasium.

Seabury Hall, our boarding school for girls on Maui opened in September with 50 students. After years of planning, this gift of Mrs K M Cooper has found a place in the academic life of our Islands that is proving to be a school of quality education. A dormitory for 60 girls has been completed, 5 class rooms established, and a chapel, the gift of Mrs C M Cooke, is on the planning boards of the architect.

URBAN GROWTH

The amazing growth of our cities, or, as it is termed "Urbanization" of our culture, and the rapidity of urban growth is astounding.

The whole world's population is growing by more then one hundred thousand per day. This would double the world's population by the year 2,000. In other words, a statistician tells us that in the next 35 years we shall see a population increase of three billion persons which is a greater increase in those few years than the world experienced in all the years since the birth of Jesus Christ to this day.

These vast numbers are concentrating in Urban Areas. Cities on every continent promise to be more densely populated.

The human problems caused by packing people together are well known. "Urbanization affects man in all his relations to his fellow men." Slums, urban renewal, uprooted people, cultural conflicts, social disintegration, impersonal economic forces, and new social tensions and injustices are only a few of the fruits of rapid urban growth.

But the churches to whom this Gospel has been entrusted usually find their least effective work is their work in the cities. We are aware, on one hand, that modern man everywhere is becoming an urbanized creature, and on the other hand, our weakest impact is on the urban man.

City congregations are ministering to a different work than they were a generation ago. They are often losing people who move to the suburbs, they are often losing financial support in varying degrees, since new members who come in are usually not able to give as much as those who move out, they know that a radically new ministry is expected of them, but are not sure what it is.

Dean Morrett is Chairman of this committee that will plan our strategy. I beg all of you to become informed about the dynamics of these rapid social movements and about the Church's mission in the midst of them, and I beseech you to give yourselves to a relevant ministry of thought and prayer and action in this urban culture in every way you can.

MISSIONS & MINISTRY

The team ministry on Kauai has been a real blessing to our work. Archdeacon Crane and The Rev Thomas Yoshida are serving All Saints' Parish, Kapaa, Christ Church, Kilauea, St Thomas' Chapel, Hanalei, and now the new mission of St Michael and All Angels, Lihue, where construction is under way.

St Peter's Parish has accepted responsibility for St John's-by-the-Sea, and Holy Cross, as parochial missions. The Rector, E Lani Hanchett, with The Rev Victor Krulak, and The Rev Thomas Heimann, have assumed oversight and administration of these congregations.

A new type of ministry has started in Waikiki. The Rev Stanley Adams is in charge of the Waikiki Episcopal Chapel in the Reef Towers Hotel. He will minister to tourists in this hotel and apartment house area. Mr Roy Kelley, owner of the Reef Towers, has graciously made this large suite available for our Chapel. The congregation from St Alban's has moved to this new chapel.

MRI

General Convention approved the program of Mutual Responsibility and Interdependence in the Body of Christ. This will be the main theme of the Church for many years ahead.

Although the words are very familiar to many since the Anglican Congress of 1963, none of us has yet comprehended the great impact of these words for our lives, for literally it means a new way of life, a new concept of ourselves as Christians.

This is not new. It is as old as Christianity, but it is for us now an awakened consciousness of the magnitude and importance of little things.

But it goes on. What change will this make in our parish life! How freely have we received God's Grace, Mercy and Love, through the lives of our fellow parishioners. We are bound up in the bundle of life with all of them. Where is the balance of your giving and your receiving?

When we extend this to the ends of the earth it gets hard, because it is difficult to personalize Fiji, Liberia, or Hongkong, unless we have been there and have personal contact there. But we do have responsibility for them as they have for us. We must

stretch our horizons and our hearts and souls as well.

Perhaps it would be interesting for you to know what we in Hawaii have done for MRI and what we are now doing. We have unconsciously been practicing mutual responsibility, as both a giving and receiving Church.

Although we are doing these things, I must warn you that much more is expected of us as we move forward in Mutual Responsibility and Interdependence in the Body of Christ.

THE DIOCESAN COUNCIL AND THE GENERAL COMMITTEE ON THE TOTAL MINISTRY

The chief task of the Diocesan Council has been to draw together the thinking of the Diocesan Departments to the point where the Council itself can begin to function as a unit in defining the direction and overall purpose of the Diocesan Program, with the Departments acting as the chief resource areas for the development of that Program. Noticeable progress has been made in 1964, which has resulted recently in the drawing up of the Diocesan Objectives for 1965 (copy attached) to be presented to the 1965 Convocation for final approval.

In writing the objectives the Council has focused upon both long range goals and immediate tasks, which will provide the Departments themselves with some common points from which to work. This gives the possibility for greater co-operation and coordination between the departments and is in itself a significant step in the renewal of the method of our Diocesan Program planning.

The General Committee on the Total Ministry has been a flexible working group of the Diocesan Council with a varying membership taken from within and beyond the membership of the Council. Its tasks likewise have been varied. In 1964 the chairman met with two Parish and two Diocesan Women's meetings to speak on the task of ministering in the modern world. The Chairman was also asked to assist the Department of Christian Education in planning the November Conference on Urbanization, and the January 1965 Leadership Skills Institute.

The major work of the Committee during the year was to look into the possibility of a post-ordination training program for the clergy. Such a program has been found to be desirable, and, in fact, has been requested by several of the clergy. Two possible types of training procedures were recommended by the committee: (1) monthly seminars led by one of the clergy, or another professional person, proficient in the topic discussed; or (2) on-going small group discussions between the clergy with mutual aid given between those within each group. It was decided that for the first year or more the second method of training should be used, and the Oahu clergy have since been assigned, by the Oahu Clericus, to groups which will meet monthly, the clergy on the other Islands already falling into similar groups in their Archdeaconries.

In 1965 the major concerns of the Council and of the Committee on the Total Ministry will be to implement the Diocesan Objectives and hence to increase both co-operative planning, and aid given to the congregations.

PROPOSED DIOCESAN OBJECTIVES FOR 1965

In order to work as a Diocese with unity, direction, and purpose, we need to be guided by objectives that are commonly recognized and accepted in the Diocese. In working to define some objectives for the Church in the Islands, the Bishop and Diocesan Council have tried to think first in terms of long-range goals towards which it seems desirable for the Church to move in coming years, and then in specific terms of the areas where we need to put our immediate efforts to achieve those goals. The distinction between long-range goals and immediate tasks will be recognizable in the format given below, the sub-sections being our objectives for immediate concentration during 1965.

The setting of these objectives does not intend to restrict the imagination or initiative of the congregations in carrying them out. Nor is each congregation expected to concentrate heavily on each point mentioned. Better to do a few things well than many poorly. However, it will be noted that there is much over-lapping in the objectives.

The Objectives:

- 1. To begin to develop a sense of, and a participation in, a relationship of mutual responsibility with our fellow Churchmen, and fellow Christians, in these Islands, and throughout the world.
 - (a) To study the meaning of the document MRI and to discover its implications for our servanthood as Parishes and Missions, and as a Diocese.
 - (b) A stepped-up program of stewardship education in the congregations, stressing 100% commitment of all that we are and all that we have, teaching tithing as a minimum standard of individual giving to the Church, encouraging greater self-support by missions, and seeking the acceptance of 50-50 Parish giving.
 - (c) The development of more effective inter-parish and Diocesan-wide communications, through cooperative efforts involving clergy and laity.
- 2. The implementation of recommendations contained in the Diocesan Survey Report.
 - (a) The organization of a workshop committee in each Congregation to study the recommendations, to plan the implementation of those considered necessary and feasible, and to initiate continued long-range planning.
 - (b) The strengthening of Confirmation and post-Confirmation instruction to give greater strength and incentive to the newly-confirmed and to re-activate those who have dropped away.
- 3. To study the place and task of the Church in this modern world and to discover more effective ways to meet the present situation, recognizing that our liturgical and theological heritage is not to be replaced, but renewed, through a growing concern for the world.
 - (a) The study of such materials as The Episcopalian, Church in Metropolis, The Hawaiian Church Chronicle, and other resources.
 - (b) Conversations with professional experts (government officials, planners, sociologists, etc.) within and beyond our own membership.
 - (c) The encouragement of inter-Parish and inter-Denominational cooperation and planning to meet the growing needs of our modern world.

REPORT OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION - 1964

The Department is pleased to report to the 63rd Annual Convocation of the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu the following achievements for the year 1964:

At the General Convention, held in St Louis, Missouri, the work in Taiwan was launched on its own with the election of the Rt Rev James C Wong, D D, as the first Bishop of Taiwan. He was installed on January 7, 1965. Our Suffragan Bishop, The Rt Rev Charles P Gilson, is now in Okinawa to give leadership to our missionaries, under the direction of the Bishop.

The Bishop visited American Samoa for confirmations and baptisms. One of our clergy was sent to Kwajalein to take services for our people there, and to have baptisms. We have four lay readers there who are doing a commendable work.

For many years we have wanted to establish a church in Waikiki, to take care of people in that area and the many tourists who come to Hawaii. This fall we were able to conduct services in a chapel that has been made possible through the good offices of Mr Roy Kelley, owner of the Reef Tower Hotel. We have a most attractive chapel on the second floor of this hotel and are having regular services each Sunday morning, under the ministrations of a full time priest.

Two missions will seek parish status at Convocation - St George's Church, Pearl Harbor, and St Stephen's, Wahiawa, making our total of parishes twelve. The Philippine Independent Church on Hawaii is making application at this Convocation to be recognized as a mission, as is the Episcopal Chapel in Waikiki.

New improvements have gone forward during the year in the way of construction, repairs, etc.

REPORT ON THE DIOCESAN STUDY CONDUCTED THROUGH THE DIVISION OF RESEARCH AND FIELD STUDY

In 1962, the General Division of Research and Field Study was requested by the Bishop and Council of the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu to do a Survey of the Diocese. This Survey was begun in 1963, and the reports sent in to the Division as they were received from the various Missions, Parishes and Institutions. A very fine response was made by the people involved and most complete and accurate information was gathered and presented from all but one congregation.

Each Church and Church-related Institution received a form-book appropriate to its activity, and these were completed by various members of each organization. The material was compiled and analyzed by members of the staff of the Division of Research and Field Study and returned to member Churches and Church-related Institutions of the Diocese. A complete copy is on file with the Bishop. In addition to the information compiled for each Church, the returned book includes Community, State, and Diocesan information for past and present, and projections for the future.

At the time of the Survey, members of the Division of Research and Field Study were at work in the Diocese visiting every Church and meeting with its Clergy and Representatives. At the time of the return of the material, a representative met with a gathering of Clergy and Representatives on each Island to review the material and answer any questions concerning results. They also met with the Bishop and a small Committee at that time, as well as a previous meeting with the Bishop alone.

The Diocesan Report is divided into several sections which include:

- 1. Membership and Financial data reported from Journals of Convocation.
- 2. Membership reported from Membership Census Maps prepared by Church members.
- Vital information on the County of Honolulu.
- 4. Report on the Philippine Independent Church in the Missionary Diocese.
- 5. General recommendations.
- 6. Statistical information bearing on each meeting.

It would be well for us to turn our attention briefly to the report itself for a few chosen quotations and observations. This Convocation Report limits itself to the area of recommendations and only refers to statistics to substantiate the report in general.

The Recommendation section opens with a compliment on the substantial gains in strength shown throughout the Diocese, indicating that between 1950 - 1960 it grew in membership at a faster rate than that of the population of the State, and also noting that the Diocese is self-supporting except for a portion of the salaries of the Mission Clergy.

The report notes the outstanding feature of the number of excellent schools affiliated with the Diocese, both parochial and non-parochial. A question was raised as to perhaps the Diocese's needing to move into the field of higher education, even to a seminary, although this latter has been questioned by some Clergy in their response to the report.

EDUCATION

It is indicated that the quality of Christian Education throughout the Diocese is uneven (Sunday Church School) especially that provided for the youngsters. It also notes that Adult Education is in an even less happy condition. A major concern was expressed over the decline of Church School membership.

Recommendation:

- a. More use of the Diocesan Department of Religious Education.
- b. Improved Church (Sunday School)teaching toward a more meaningful experience.
- $c. \;\;$ More uniform day school and parochial aims and goals, at least achieving State Certification.

EVANGELISM

It was noted that efforts generally toward Evangelism, both as to general out-reach to the unchurched, as well as within the local congregation, was less than outstanding. There was a special despair at the efforts in local congregations to "restore the lost," i.e. those who have fallen away from regular attendance.

There was some reference to the disparity of racial make-up of each congregation in relation to the Community, and suggestions that the Church make every person attending that Church for worship fully aware of the welcome that awaits him. A major concern was noted in the generally poor level of Church attendance, with few Churches meeting the general national level of 45 - 50% of Baptized Membership attending regularly.

Recommendation:

- a. Closer cooperation between Clergy and Laity in the task of Mission.
- b. Extra attention given to people living in areas near the church buildings.
- c. Training for systematic Evangelism.
- d. Examine the possibility of adjusting the Church schedule.
- e. Greater Inter-church cooperation (among Episcopal Churches), especially noting the Philippine Independent Church.

While the Church is doing its most effective work in areas where the cost of housing is relatively high, and is at its strongest in the newly developing sections, it is in need of greater effort in areas of high population density.

STEWARDSHIP

An over-all poor record of Stewardship is noted with some concern expressed over the low level of extra-parochial giving. The report indicates that the average of the Diocese as a whole for expenditures set aside for Work Outside the Parish for the years 1961 - 1963 has been but 15% with many congregations setting aside less than 5% of their budgets. (One clergyman indicated in his reply, however, that these conclusions may be open to question, particularly in regard to the Assessment and Quota amounts being lumped into "local expenses" thus cutting the reported percentage for Outside Giving by 50%. Other comments in his reply were also significant.)

Recommendation:

- a. A clear call for increased understanding of Christian Stewardship is needed with special consideration to Tithing as a goal.
- b. A reminder of the 50-50 Giving goal set by the 1961 General Convention.

LONG RANGE PLANNING

Following several pages indicating the need for new work to begin, and recommending locations on all Islands, and upon information gathered for other sections of the

report dealing with membership, age factors, economic interests, population trends, and other Church activities not Episcopal, and keeping in mind the need for strengthening existing work, the report asks for a consideration of the establishment of what is called a Long Range Planning Council.

This permanent Council would consist of the Bishop and an Archdeacon from each of the four major Islands, including Oahu which does not have one at this time. The purpose would be that of the consideration of long range strategy.

EPISCOPAL DEVELOPMENT COMMISSIONS

On the Island of Oahu under the direction of the Archdeacon, it is recommended that one or more Episcopal Development Commissions be formed to encourage and stress greater cooperation among Churches, and the wider use of talent available to the Church (specialists in the field of architecture, education, welfare workers, business, promotion, etc.). The attention of Episcopal Development Commissions would be turned to projects primarily for the benefit of the present Churches (joint Education for Evangelism, Teacher Training, improved publicity, cooperation with the Philippine Independent Church, etc.) and to work for the benefit of the entire Church in the Community (co-opt members to work in areas of problems of the aging, public housing, unemployment, and other areas of Community life with which Church members are deeply and regularly involved).

The Clergy have reported that in many instances they, together with their Vestries, Bishop's Committees, or other Committees "read, marked, learned, and inwardly digested" the report with particular reference to their own situation, and are using it as a basis for development of the program for advancement of their congregation. It would seem reasonable to suggest the Bishop and Council continue the same sort of study and action that has already been started as a result of this Survey.

In closing it might be well to present a few general remarks of the Clergy concerning this study. The remarks are compiled from letters received by them and the complete replies will be filed with the Diocesan copy of the Study.

Some 20 Clergy responded to a general request for comments concerning the Survey. The more particular and pointed statements that involve specific aspects of the Study were of interest and should be examined together with further examination and discussion about the Survey. The comments that follow are only a general indication of their attitude.

A very large percentage indicated that the information will be of definite value to them and their congregations. While the material returned was only that which they themselves compiled, the very fact of "having to sit down and do it and then have it before me to see" was of benefit. It was also true that while not much that was new was discovered, it was now going to be possible to involve more people in the study and subsequent action based on the gathered information.

In many instances programs that were recommended by the results are already in actual practice and many others are in the planning stage for the future. In some few instances it was indicated the recommendations may not prove too useful (because of an already recognized need) or even ill advised (because of known local problems), but generally the Survey results met with favorable comment. Some replies mentioned that it was helpful to fall back on a non-personal basis when commending an action and be able to say, "The Survey said this about us." It enabled many to see the whole picture better from a not-so-close-objective position. It might be called the vantage point of "perspective" rather than "point of view." In any event the results will surely give more impetus towards working out problems and facing opportunities.

We are glad the Survey was made; the involvement of more people was good. It is a frank disclosure of our weaknesses and our strengths, and a reminder that "we all need to make greater effort."

ANNUAL REPORT OF SEABURY HALL - 1964

By the time the Convocation convenes, Seabury Hall will be beginning its sixth month of operation as a Diocesan boarding school for girls offering a college preparatory curriculum for secondary school aged students.

By September 21, 1964, the first day of school, a headmaster and teaching staff had been recruited; the garage had been converted to classrooms; the main house (Cooper House) renovated to be used as faculty apartments, refectory, library, chapel, study hall, recreational area and administration office; and a thirty room (sixty girl) dormitory was half built. The fact that the twenty five boarding girls found that there was no room for them in the dormitory on opening day was unable to deter the first day of classes. This first group of boarding students well deserves a medal for their willingness, with happy smiles, to live in the recreational lanai in double bunks until the dorm was ready. The dorm was ready for occupancy on November 1 - a real All Saints' Day.

The staff consists of five full time teachers and four part time instructors. The classes for the first year are in grades seven through ten with the eleventh and twelfth grades being added in 1965 and 1966 respectively. This will give us our first graduating class in 1967. The home residence of our boarders includes the islands of Kauai, Oahu, Molokai, Maui, and Hawaii, the Trust Territories of the Pacific and Rhodesia. Fifty students are in our first student body with twenty five enrolled as day students residing on Maui. Twelve of the day students are boys, so we have a coeducational classroom atmosphere.

The curriculum offered compares with girl's boarding schools nationally. English is offered six hours a week; Latin and French are required, the Yale SMSG math program is in use; creative art and music are part of the curriculum; courses in general science and biology are taken at the proper age level; full course study in geography and history are taught; and sacred studies is taught two hours per week to each class. The eleventh grade curriculum will see the addition of chemistry, intermediate algebra, and continuation of proper courses in English, history, art, music and sacred studies. The Director of Studies is Mr. Spencer Kennard, whose experience as an educator is of unequaled value to Seabury Hall.

The extra-curricular activities now in operation include an already well known English handbell team, a choir of twenty, a newspaper staff of fifteen, a drama group of a dozen, a swim team, and a horseback riding program with five assorted horses.

Through the gifts of interested people scholarships have been available from the start. It is hoped that additional scholarship money may be procured so that financial assistance may always be given to students who need it. Eleven of our fifty students are on the Headmaster's List for honor work in their studies.

Ground was broken on January 23, 1965, for St Paul's Chapel on the campus. This is a gift of Mrs C Montague Cooke, Jr, a long time Maui resident and friend of Aunt

Kate Cooper. The fact that the chapel is the first major gift to Seabury Hall after opening day is significant, as it emphasizes the central part that the Christian Gospel of Salvation in Christ Jesus takes in our community life. The school's building needs, as it expands to include more grades, center around faculty housing on campus, classrooms, especially for science, music and art.

REPORT OF ST ANDREW'S PRIORY - 1964

Highlights of the Priory Expansion Program

The Priory Expansion Program (PEP) officially began on August 18, 1964, and closed on November 8, 1964.

The minimum fund requirement was set at \$325,000.00 to cover the cost of constructing three required buildings. During the campaign the goal was increased to \$395,000.00 to defray such additional costs as renovation of the Priory main building, site preparation, and procurement of gymnasium, cafeteria and classroom equipment.

Architects and engineers are now working on final plans for construction of the second floor to Sellon Hall, the Student Services Center and chapel, and the gymnatorium. Ground breaking ceremonies are anticipated on Ascension Day, May 27, 1965.

St Andrew's Priory Advisory Council

On the recommendation of our Accrediting Association the Priory Advisory Committee was strengthened and enlarged into a council to act as a source of advice and support for the ongoing program of the school.

Enrollment

There was a slight increase in enrollment over the previous school year. The additional classrooms will allow us to have about six hundred students in the school without overcrowding. At present we are using the basement of St Peter's Church for one class, and although we are gaining six classrooms we are losing two for the planned library for the lower school, therefore we must limit the enrollment in order not to prejudice the quality of our education.

Faculty and Administrative Staff

Also on the recommendation of our accrediting association that more adequate class-room supervision be provided, the position of Business Administrator was added to the staff to free the Sister Superior and the Principal of the responsibilities that frustrated

their giving sufficient time to supervisory activities. Mr Edward Hedgecock was appointed by the Priory Advisory Council to this position in which he is ably serving the Priory School and the Sisters.

Graduates

Fifty girls were graduated on June 5th, 1964. All fifty of them were accepted in schools of higher education. Presently forty-nine are attending colleges and universities here or on the mainland; one is working this year preparatory to entering college in September.

Undergraduates

Sylvia Yee, who had just finished grade 10, attended a summer institute at the University of Hawaii for high school teachers and students from western states, Japan and Hawaii. Instruction was on a Freshman-Sophomore college level. Sylvia received a rating of "excellent". Barbee Godfrey was captain of the team winning third place in a Pony Club regional horse show held at Watsonville, California. Stephanie Berger (grade 10) became Girls' Senior Tennis Champion in the Hawaii High School Group Association Tournament. Stephanie Berger and Nancy Isaacs (just finished 9th grade) were the Honolulu representatives in the National Junior Tennis Tournament in Lake Forrest, Illinois. Even though they did not win on this occasion, they did in several other tournaments on the mainland.

KE KUKUI, our school newspaper, was awarded first place rating in its annual evaluation by Columbia Scholastic Press Association of Columbia University. KA ALELE, the Priory Year Book, was given a second class honor rating by the National Scholastic Association at the University of Minnesota School of Journalism, and a rating (good) by the National Yearbook Association of Memphis, Tennessee.

Priory students both as individuals and in groups continued to take an active part in Church and community service projects and welfare programs.

In the college and vocational counselling area our girls participated in vocational workshops, college sponsored meetings, and those on a high school level both local and state. Our college and vocational counsellor attended a councellors' conference held in San Francisco.

Accreditization

THE WESTERN ASSOCIATION OF SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES granted us a five year period of accreditization through June 30th, 1969. Their recommendations and the authorization of the Bishop and Board of Directors of the Diocese with the concurrence of the Priory's Advisory Council instigated the Priory Expansion Program with its gratifying results.

General Remarks

Two major maintenance jobs were required in the fall of 1964, in addition to a heavier than usual schedule of repairs. The Sisters' Residence was waterproofed with acrylic paint at a cost of \$1200.00, and Restarick Hall and the business education building were re-roofed at a cost of \$720.00 and \$480.00 respectively. The roof of Restarick Hall was guaranteed for 15 years and that on the business education building for 10 years. Two major items of equipment were purchased; one IBM electric typewriter for \$507.00 and one electric spirit duplicator for \$300.00. The latter was a gift from the class of 1964.

Acknowledgments

This report would not be complete, even though it is now overlong, without an expression of appreciation to our Churches whose pledges to the Priory Expansion Program totaling \$130,000.00 inspired this community to come to the support of the Program in a most gratifying way. As the Churches were the pace-setters for the rest of the community, the Cathedral Church of St Andrew with its pledge of \$40,000.00, led the parishes and missions. Because we know that this represents really sacrificial giving from all of you our Mahalo is the more heart-felt. It is impossible to name here all who contributed to the success of PEP by their efforts, concern, prayers, pledges and influence, but as we pray for our benefactors we trust that God is rewarding them beyond anything we can say to them or ask for them.

HAWAII PREPARATORY ACADEMY, KAMUELA, HAWAII REPORT TO THE CONVOCATION - 1965

The Campus

This fiscal year has been a memorable one in that boarding student facilities and educational operations have, for the first time, been concentrated on the one new campus.

The three dormitories on the new campus were first occupied in the fall of 1959, while all classroom work was conducted on the original Academy location, about two miles distant. This dual campus arrangement consumed considerable expense, time, and energy in transporting students back and forth between the two locations.

The new classroom unit, with the Administration Building, was completed for occupancy in time for the beginning of the new school year in September, 1963. This group of single story frame structures consisting of three classroom buildings, two science laboratory and classroom halls, and an administration building, are much appreciated by both faculty and students and are quite adequate for the current enrollment of 215 students, which includes 45 day students.

In addition to the completion of the above new buildings, supporting utilities were provided. These include a new high pressure water main, with adequate fire hydrants; a widened paved road from the Academy entrance to the Upper Dormitory and a fire warning installation consisting of a siren at the school connected to another siren located on the old campus to bring volunteer fire fighters from the town of Waimea, in the event of a fire.

Two championship size tennis courts and a practice half court with a solid wooden backstop, donated by Mr Nick Rutgers of Tahiti in memory of his late mother, were put into use early in the school year. A third regulation tennis court, donated by Mr and Mrs Alexander S. Atherton of Honolulu, was also completed. These three and a half tennis courts have proven to be very popular as well as a valuable addition to our athletic facilities - in spite of a strong cross wind occasionally preventing their full time use.

A contract for the construction of a library was executed in September 1964, with April 1965 designated as the occupancy date. This greatly appreciated gift is a most valuable and needed addition to our educational facilities and will soon provide a facility at least several years in advance of the time when funds from our Building Fund could be made available for a building of this nature.

At Academy expense, we are taking advantage of this new library construction by adding to the building a modern audio-visual language laboratory equipped with the latest sound system, plus a reading room.

A really serious handicap to the normal movement of faculty and students on our new location is the frequent gale-like winds of up to 40 miles an hour that sweep across the bare hillside campus. The remedy, in part, is the planting of windbreak trees in quantity. An appropriation of \$10,000 for this purpose has been approved, but it will be at least five or more years before any sort of wind control can be effected. A most important consideration in the positioning of new structures on the campus is the relationship of the main entrance to these buildings to the prevailing trade winds.

Increasing the Academy's enrollment from its present 165 boarding students and 45 day to 300 boarding and 45 day is a long-range goal. However, the necessity of an increased enrollment for financial reasons may well hasten the decision to expand our facilities.

Scholastic

We continue constantly to work for the highest possible scholastic standards and offerings for our students. I might add that the accreditation committee spoke favorably of our college admissions record and of the record of our graduates in college.

Our curriculum is college preparatory. Every student takes subjects which if successfully passed will meet the requirements of any college in the land. Our graduates are in colleges and universities throughout the United States.

First Half of the Current Year 1964-65

School opened with its usual full enrollment in September. The spirit has been outstanding, and we are much pleased with both our new students and new faculty. I understand, by the way, that a rumor spread during the summer that our admissions were not up to normal and that the enrollment would be down in the fall. This, of course, was entirely untrue. In spite of the increase in tuition and in spite of the largest graduating class in our history, admissions continued to require a waiting list and to keep pace throughout.

Philosophy

From Our Catalogue:

"Though its first aim, as with any good school, is the development of character, it believes that this personal quality develops best from daily association with high demands and standards and with fine and able people. Consequently, it asks much of its

students in both conduct and scholarship; and through the understanding leadership of the headmaster and faculty and through the effective discipline of a sound academic curriculum, it brings to its students those ingredients which character demands."

From a Year Book Message to a Graduating Class:

"Will any word in our vocabulary be of any more significance to you and to your country today than the word <u>Integrity?</u> You have heard it often here and have seen it applied by outstanding members of your own student body and of the faculty.

"Remember that it is more than honesty. It is also responsibility and resolute ruggedness in the face of all temptations, softness, and rationalizations. Only when the strongest parts of your make-up are in charge can you even begin to meet its demands. Yet on it depend your grasp of the real riches of life and the very survival of America's great contributions to man's development and true freedom. When we have enough of it, and only then, we shall find Peace. For only Peace with Character will endure. Can you meet the test?"

Late News Flash

The Cum Laude Society, perhaps the nation's finest Honor Society, at its December meeting granted us a charter for the establishment of a chapter on our campus. This enables us to give very special recognition to our Honor Students in Grades Il and 12.

THE ANNUAL REPORT OF CANTERBURY HOUSE

In 1964 Canterbury House continued to be guided by the approach outlined in the previous annual report -- that is, being the Episcopal Church at the University of Hawaii (Manoa Campus) and East-West Center.

Work and progress in the four aspects of the Canterbury House programs--liturgical, pastoral, social and service, intellectual--are briefly described as follows:

Liturgical. Holy Communion is celebrated in the Canterbury House Chapel on school weekdays at 7:15 am. In 1964 there were 163 services. Weekday attendance varied from 14 to 2. In the fall semester at the monthly corporate communions preceding the monthly dinner and meeting, an average of 37 joined in the celebration, a considerable increase—indeed a doubling—in the average for the previous semester, which was 19.

The Holy Communion was the study topic for one phase of the semester-break camp following the $1964\ \text{fall}$ semester.

Canterbury House is pleased to report one baptism and what it feels is a 50% share in two confirmations.

<u>Pastoral.</u> Canterbury House continues to exercise a place in the pastoral and mission work of the total church. The chaplains provide Episcopal students with an available pastor and a specialized counsellor who is nearby and available to the course of student life. The chaplains, as in years past, have served several non-Episcopalians.

Social and Service. The organized social program at Canterbury House continues to center about monthly gatherings held on second Thursdays. The celebration of Holy

Communion, a dinner cooked and paid for by the students, a general meeting, and (often) a speaker comprise the evening program. Social activities depend chiefly upon student initiative. In the course of the previous year Canterburians and their friends enjoyed: a beach party at Kahana Bay, a movie outing, a draftee's farewell party, a get-together during the summer at the Bishop's, a Hallowe'en party, a Christmas carol sing and get-together, a New Year's Party, an evening of politics at the time of the election, and an Iolani-Priory get-together just before school started.

In the past year Canterbury has participated in the fund drives for World University Service and the United Nations Children's Emergency Fund, in the Campus Clean-up (with the area about the Music Building as our responsibility), and in the Heminway Union Board Talent Show (with a second place award for our efforts.)

Canterbury House is open daily from 6:30 am to 10:30 pm and provides a place to meet, eat, study, play ping-pong, talk and relax. Some fifty-eight students regularly and actively participate in the Canterbury House program.

Intellectual. The intellectual apostolate has in the main taken the form of discussion with students as questions on matters of faith and ethics arise. At the joint Episcopal-Methodist camp in January, 1964, Lutheran Pastor Berquist led an inquiry into new trends in theology, using Bishop Robinson's Honest to God. At the joint Episcopal-Methodist camp following the fall semester 1964, Methodist Pastor David Harada led the study of Christian ethics and ethical decisions.

Speakers of note at Canterbury House have been: the Bishop, speaking to us of his trip to Russia; Fr. Howard Kishpaugh, on Mississippi's racial problem; Rabbi F Pearlmutter, Chaplain, USN, on Nazis, Jews, and Christians--Hochhuth's play The Deputy and the reactions thereto; and Dr John Michel, Director of the University's Counseling and Testing Center, on student problems and how to deal with them.

DIOCESAN HOUSE AND ARMY NAVY SERVICE CENTER

With the beginning of the new year, the Diocesan House and the Army-Navy Service Center still plays an important part in the life of Emma Square. Although my personal life has undergone several changes, the life of the Diocesan House remains the same.

Aside from the local clergy from the other islands and the clergy and their families in the South Pacific going to and from on their leaves, we have had many visitors from National Council, the Mainland and from all parts of the world.

The young people of the Cathedral have a meeting three Sundays of the month; the Bishop's Committee has lunch meetings here, and the Filipino Congregation uses the House for Vestry meetings and Sunday breakfasts. It has been used also for an occasional tea and wedding reception. For two months last year, the Fund Drive for the Priory School had its offices downstairs.

It was a very full and rewarding year.

THE DIOCESAN DEPARTMENT OF STEWARDSHIP

Bishop Kennedy's objectives for 1964 asked for a continuous program of Steward-ship Education Training. This has been our goal and will continue to be the major emphasis of the department.

Training seminars were conducted for the laity of all Churches on Oahu May 23rd, at St Mary's Church on October 19th and November 9th. Each year progress is made with at least two Churches accepting, in total, the education training. In 1964 we commend St Peter's and Holy Trinity for their whole hearted support.

Churches on the neighboring islands who both asked for training seminars and used the Diocesan Program were all the Churches of Kauai under the leadership of the Archdeacon, The Ven Charles Crane, the Kohala Missions of the Big Island and Holy Innocents on Maui. Training sessions were conducted at St John's, Kula, Good Shepherd, Wailuku, Holy Apostles, Hilo and for the Episcopal Church Women of the Big Island.

Promotional literature, visitation calling material, Sunday leaflets, have been printed and are available without cost at Diocesan Headquarters.

Members of the department include the Chairman, The Rev Dr Paul Wheeler, Mr Henry Budd and Mr Val Tennant. It is with deep regret that Val Tennant has had to resign from the department due to the pressure and demands of his business. Few laymen have the insight to understanding Stewardship, and the devotion to letting others know, than Val Tennant. Mahalo and Aloha, we know that in his private and business life he will always be the 100% Steward.

Your department stands ready to help you when called upon. Our 1965 plans call for National Church Leaders to be in the Islands Seminars in July.

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

This report will follow the work that has been done by the Chairman and others in the various divisions of the Department.

Church School

The division of Sunday Schools assisted various missions and parishes in the securing of extra Lenten Materials and various film strips that might be used for children and adults.

Various trips were made by the Chairman during the year to assist with teacher training and the working toward solutions of various school problems, not only on Oahu but also on three of the Neighbor Islands. These included the following:

Two trips to Kauai, one in April, another in September. Some work on Hawaii during June.

Training sessions at St Barnabas' in July.
Training sessions at St Mary's, Calvary, and Holy Spirit in August.

In conjunction with these training sessions special persons were secured for various churches who had training in distinct skills such as art and handicraft.

The Film Strip Library was used extensively by a great number of parishes and missions. Several new film strips were added in the area of the Old Testament and in the life of the Church. No new movies were added and indeed the Department is planning on doing away with all movies because of the expense in maintaining them. The projectors have also been lent out at various times to those churches that are still without this type of equipment.

A great number of the children, teachers, and parents gathered at the Cathedral in May for the annual Mite Box Presentation and Cathedral Visitation. The planning and execution of this program was the responsibility of the Division.

DRE

The Division of DRE's began holding monthly sessions in September under the leadership of Miss Muriel Dang, DRE at Iolani School. The purpose of this group is to help those who are leading Christian Education Programs, to meet regularly and share with one another various problems and solutions that they have discovered. It also acts as a means through which the Department is able to get needed information out on a regular basis.

Leadership

The Chairman of the Department and the Chairman of this division attended a phase two Leadership Skills Institute in January in the Diocese of Olympia. Their particular task was to develop a Leadership Skills Institute here in the Islands, which has just been finished on Maui (January 1965). Miss Betsy Christian, Chairman of the Division, also went to Olympia later in the year and helped staff an Institute. She has also been helpful to one mission that is running an experimental group life lab.

Conferences

This division, under the leadership of the Rev Richard Kirchhoffer has helped develop several conferences and meetings during the past year. Included in this would be the visit of Fr Stevens, OHC during Lent, Canon Webster, Church Missionary Society, in October, assisting with the visit of Canon Perry, Diocese of Sacramento, who came to explain the "Mutual Responsibility" Program. The visit of the Rev Jack Yarayan from the Church Divinity School of the Pacific, and finally the planning of the Clergy-Laity Conference which was held in November under the leadership of the Rev Dr Robert Rodenmayer and the Rev Samuel Van Culin, both from the Executive Council. The latter conference was on the Urbanization of modern cities and the problems that this presents to the city, its citizens, and the Church. From this conference certain recommendations were made to the Bishop by this Department and the Department of Total Ministry which were later acted upon by the Bishop and Council.

Camps

This Division, under the able leadership of the Rev Guy Piltz, assisted by the Rev Victor Krulak, Dean of Camps, has entered into a new philosophy of Camping. This new philosophy was adopted under the recommendations of the Division of Camps and Conferences of the Executive Council. The Rev George Woodgates, who is a member of the aforementioned Division, visited the Islands in June and looked at our facilities on Oahu and Maui. He then met with the Division, and action was begun to reshape the structure and purpose of this Division.

The Counsellors were trained for the Oahu Camps from June 23-26 by the Chairman of the Department. Further evaluation sessions were held during and after the camps.

A more extensive report from this Division is attached.

Adult Work

This Division has met once during the year, under the direction of Mrs Phebe Chu. This area of work in the life of the Church is still under examination and plans are being thought through for this year.

The Department has also tried to be of assistance in other ways to not only parishes and missions of the Episcopal Church, but also outside of the Church. Some of these would include assisting, upon request of rectors or vicars, with special programs or needs in the area of Christian Education. Aiding the various Departments of the District, such as working with Christian Social Relations in the development of a program for use in our churches on Urbanization; compiling some materials and suggestions for the Bishop's consideration on Mutual Responsibility and the ordering of Lenten Materials for those churches that wished to work through the District. The Department has also assisted one military chaplain with his camping program.

The Department Chairman has also sat with the Department of Christian Education of the Honolulu Council of Churches and its committee that is planning a Clergy-Laity Seminar in the summer of 1965.

DEPARTMENT OF YOUTH - 1964 REPORT

The Department of Youth had as its members during 1964, the Rev E Lani Hanchett, chairman; the Rev Guy H Piltz and Mr Winston Ching.

The EYC began their year with the Convocation Banquet in February at the Iolani School Student Center with some 400 young people attending. The Rt Rev James W F Carman, Bishop of Oregon, was the speaker. At the conference at the Mokuleia Conference Center the next day, Paul Chock was elected State President of the Episcopal Young Churchmen. Miss Beverley Dew has served as president. The Oahu Council has met regularly throughout the year planning various programs.

A basketball tournament was held at the Holy Nativity Church Youth Center in May with six churches participating.

Two bowling tournaments were sponsored, one in the Spring and one in the Fall, both times with 12 teams participating.

The annual summer volleyball tournament took place in late July and early August. Ten churches entered teams. This was brought to a close with the Summer Picnic at the Bishop's Home. About 250 young people attended.

The Summer Conference was held on Maui at Camp Pecusa in August. Fifty young people attended from Oahu.

Church of the Holy Nativity Youth Center was the scene of the Annual Bishop's Ball. It was a gala and happy occasion.

Our Youth has participated well in the program of the Honolulu Council of Churches.

The Department will be glad to consult with any church in work with young people.

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS

In early summer the present chairman was named by the Bishop to succeed the Ven William R Grosh, on his departure for Hilo, and we owe a great debt of gratitude to him for a growing organization to which the new chairman could come, which included active programs for World Relief and Refugee Resettlement, Health and Welfare, and Community Services under the direction of capable and experienced chairmen.

One of the first steps undertaken in late summer was the expansion of the department to include many more clergy and lay members, to help fulfill the three-fold goal for the department:

- 1. To serve as a means of communication among Parishes and to develop a keener awareness of the need for the Church to be concerned about the world and its great need for the Gospel-in-Action.
- 2. To encourage and support Parish and Inter-Parish programs of Christian action.
- 3. To initiate programs of Christian action on a Diocesan basis where these seem indicated.

The following persons are serving in the department at the present time: The Rev Joseph Pummill, The Rev John Engelcke, The Very Rev John J Morrett, The Rev Lani Hanchett, The Rev John H Chung, Mrs George Walker, Mrs Herman Schwab, The Rev Timoteo Quintero and Mrs Walter Strode.

Since September the department has met on a monthly basis. During the fall the department sponsored a special program for the clergy on Suicide, in which a film of the Public Health Service was shown and Mrs Sylvia Levi, well-known social worker, participated as discussion leader.

Throughout the year the Episcopal Church continued, as in years past, to provide institutional chaplaincy services at hospitals and nursing homes throughout the state, and during the year the Church in the Islands contributed some \$1,750 to the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief. At Thanksgiving the offering to the Share-Our-Surplus program came to more than \$1,600. Funds contributed by our Parishes to assist the Civil Rights program of the Church totaled \$992.

Clergy of the Church also participated in a newly-established program of Church counselling at the Oahu jail.

The department has joined in a community endeavor for the establishment of Family Planning clinics and has participated in preliminary hearing of the subject.

Projects for the future include a projected conference this fall on Alcohol and the Family, the development of a study program in cooperation with the Department of Christian Education on the Church in the Urban World, and the sponsorship of an educational program directed toward the elimination of pornographic literature on our magazine stands.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLICITY AND PROMOTION

We have received very good cooperation from the local press, radio and television stations the past year. As of January 1965, Mr Lee Radner has been engaged by the Diocese as a consultant in this work.

The Hawaiian Church Chronicle has been the work of the Diocesan office. It is the official publication of the Diocese and should be in the home of every church family each month. It is strongly urged that every parish and mission make this a Budget item, not only for church families but for young people away from home or in the armed forces.

The Department also urges subscription to the official publication of the National Church "The Episcopalian". This, too, should be in the home of every church family.

Weekly paid notices have been published in the two chief Honolulu daily newspapers with information about services at every church on Oahu. Each church pays for this, the Department merely coordinates the material.

The Department has attempted to cover the major events in the life of the Episcopal Church in Hawaii during the past year. It would be most helpful if parishes and missions would keep the Department informed about local activities that have news value.

The Department will gladly assist any churches or organizations in publicity or promotional work.

EPISCOPAL CHURCH WOMEN

Between annual meetings of the whole church in Hawaii a Board of 22 officers and secretaries meets monthly with representatives of each parish or mission which has an organized women's group. The Board met eight times. Mrs. Stanley Carver and Mrs George Fleming resigned when they moved from Honolulu. Mrs Charles Afong and Mrs Paul Powers were elected as new Vice President and Secretary.

We had three island-wide meetings for all women. The Rev Edwin Bonsey and the Very Rev John Morrett led a discussion of women's work in large and small churches. The delegates to Triennial brought a report after their return from St Louis. The Bishop and the Rev Claude DuTeil spoke of General Convention. At a later meeting Mr Henry Budd described Diocesan Finance. During Lent we sewed for St Barnabas Hospital in Japan and each week heard a speaker describe some country in the Pacific Ocean area.

Our giving to projects we have supported for many years, and new "specials" suggested by the Bishop totaled \$10,672.88 and the UTO sent to national headquarters was \$5,835.00.

The District Altar Guild made 187 items ranging in size from purificators to surplices. The chairman of Church Periodical Club has sent new and used magazines, books, and newspapers to churches, schools and libraries. Our chairman of Christian Social Relations is working with the Diocesan Committee in studying certain community problems in the solution of which women should have a voice. Material describing

many needs in this field are on the shelves of the Cathedral library. The reports of the presidents show that women are well aware of the opportunities for Christian service and are giving many hours gladly in both church and community.

ACCOUNTANTS' REPORT

The Board of Directors

The Protestant Episcopal Church
in the Hawaiian Islands

We have examined the balance sheet of The Protestant Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands as of December 31, 1964. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

The accounts and records of the Church do not reflect the financial position and results of operations of parishes, missions or institutions which conduct the activities of The Protestant Episcopal Church throughout the State of Hawaii. However, certain trusts of these departments are held by the Church, and accordingly have been taken into account in the accompanying financial statements.

Inasmuch as title to all real property, except the real property of Iolani School and St Clement's Church, is vested in The Protestant Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands this property is accounted for in the records of the Church. However, the carrying value of the real property is not infrequently an estimated amount, not readily subject to accurate determination, intended to represent expenditures made not only by the Church but also by missions, parishes and other persons or, more recently, an amount which represents only those expensitures made from the proceeds of loans from Church funds or lending institutions which do not include certain other expenditures made through the treasurer's office or directly by churches and parishes.

In our opinion, the accompanying balance sheet and supporting schedules (Schedules I through VI) have been prepared in accordance with established accounting practices of The Protestant Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.
