MINUTES OF THE SIXTY-FIFTH ANNUAL CONVOCATION OF THE MISSIONARY DIOCESE OF HONOLULU

Saturday, February 4, 1967

Holy Communion was celebrated at 8:00 a.m. in St Andrew's Cathedral, Bishop Kennedy as Celebrant. Following the service, breakfast was served in St Peter's Parish Hall.

Registrar, the Rev Norman Ault, reported a quorum present, and the Bishop called the meeting to order at 9:30 a.m.

The Rev E Lani Hanchett nominated the Rev Kenneth D Perkins as secretary of the Convocation and the Rev Joseph H Pummill as assistant secretary of the Convocation. Both nominations were unanimously approved.

The Rev Joseph H Pummill moved that the courtesy of the floor be extended to the Rt Rev Thomas H Wright, Bishop of East Carolina, Chairman of the Joint Commission on Mutual Responsibility and Interdependence, and to Mrs Wright; to the Rt Rev Frederick Warnecke, Bishop of Bethlehem, Pennsylvania; to the Rt Rev James W F Carman, Bishop of Oregon, and Mrs Carman; all guests of the Convocation.

The Rev Mr Pummill further moved that the courtesy of the floor be extended to the following licensed clergy for a voice but not a vote: Chaplain Alister C Anderson, the Rev Justo Andres, Chaplain William A Boardman, the Rev Douglass Colbert, the Rev Isaac Gonzales, the Rev Timoteo P Quintero, the Rev George Lee, the Rev William Reeves, Jr, the Rev Jacinto Tabili, the Rev Edward P Townsend.

Further, the Rev Mr Pummill moved the courtesy of the floor with the same limitation be extended to those clergy transferred less than six months prior to Convocation: The Rev Gerald G Gifford, II, Chaplain Arthur A Marsh, Jr, and the Rev R Norris Twitchell. The motion was seconded and passed.

The assistant secretary made the following motions.

The Rev Charles T Crane reported on Mutual Responsibility and Interdependence in the Body of Christ. See report of that committee.

At various points in the order of business, the Bishop, Mr Herman von Holt, and the Rev Mr Crane paid sincere compliment to Mr Henry F Budd, Diocesan Treasurer, for his fine execution of the duties of the office of Treasurer and for the continuing extra time, effort, and attention he applies generously to a number of special concerns and activities throughout the Diocese.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the Honorable Arthur G Smith did enter the Life Eternal on December 23, 1966, and

WHEREAS, he was Diocesan Chancellor for over 51 years, serving so well and so faithfully under four Bishops that he was awarded the Diocesan Distinguished Service Cross in 1949, and

WHEREAS, he was also recognized for his long and excellent service by a Citation in Appreciation presented by the Presiding Bishop at our Sixty-fourth Convocation, and

WHEREAS, he did serve St Andrew's Cathedral as its Senior Warden for many years, and

WHEREAS, he was recognized as an eminently capable attorney; and was a willing servant of the community; and a benefactor and guide to numerous persons, setting a worthy example to all who knew him,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that this Sixty-fifth Convocation of the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu express the sympathy of the Diocese to Mr Smith's survivors and the deep and grateful appreciation of this Diocese for his distinguished and devoted service to us and to our community, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that certified copies of this resolution be given to his wife, Helen Smith, and his daughter, Eva Lefevre, and that this resolution be printed in the Journal of this Convocation.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, Marguerite B Walker did enter into the Larger Life, on February 19, 1966 in Levenshulme, Manchester, England; and

WHEREAS, she did serve her Lord and Church throughout her life in the British and Hawaiian Islands; and

WHEREAS, she did serve faithfully as wife and co-worker with her husband, James Walker, the vicar of the Kohala Missions and Archdeacon of the Island of Hawaii from 1920 until 1950, and in various places throughout the Islands after their retirement; and

WHEREAS, she is particularly remembered by the people in Kohala for her devotion to the worship of God--personally baking the communion bread and growing the flowers for the altar--and for her service to mankind--promoting integration and harmony among all people, given to extraordinary hospitality, welcoming the stranger, and working to provide and maintain final resting places for the dead.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Sixty-fifth Annual Convocation of The Episcopal Church in Hawaii, convening on the 4th day of February, 1967, solemnly recognize her demise and gratefully acknowledge her service;

AND, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the members of the Church Militant here assembled commend Marguerite B Walker to the Church Expectant and Triumphant in the care and keeping of God Almighty by the mercies of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ until we may be reunited with her in Life Everlasting:

AND, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this resolution be given to her son, Donald Billam-Walker, and to other family members, friends and persons designated by him:

AND, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of this Convocation be instructed to record this resolution in the annals of said Convocation.

Both resolutions were unanimously approved.

Bishop Kennedy introduced the new Chancellor of the Diocese, Mr Hugh Shearer, successor to Mr Arthur G Smith.

The Rev W Edwin Bonsey, Jr, presented the following resolution.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Convocation of the Missionary District of Honolulu that Sections 1 and 2, respectively, of Canon XXI of the Missionary District of Honolulu (Bishop and Council) be amended to read as follows:

Section 1

The Bishop shall appoint annually in addition to two ex-officio members (Chancellor, Treasurer), not more than 15 members to constitute with the Bishop a Council with such departments as the Bishop shall deem necessary.

Section 2

The Bishop and Council shall plan and direct the mission of the Church in the Missionary District, and each Department shall perform such duties as may be assigned either by the Bishop or Convocation, or both: such assignments to be of the nature indicated by the name of the Department.

The resolution passed unanimously.

Before presentation of the next three resolutions, reports from the workshops held on each one were presented. Mr Ted Klaus, Church of the Holy Nativity, reported on the resolution on Ecumenism; Mr Harvey Meeker, St Timothy's Church reported on Housing; Mrs. Victor Punua, All Saints Church reported on the Christian family.

The Rev Charles T Crane presented this resolution.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS the M R I document calls for a strengthening of ecumenical relationships and projects, and

WHEREAS the Pacific Urban Program is pledged to planning on an ecumenical basis, and

WHEREAS the multiplicity of denominational churches in many new areas has been wasteful financially, and divisive theologically witnessing to the disunity of the Churches rather than to our one-ness in Christ, and

WHEREAS there are many areas of the Diocese in which the witness of the Church could be strengthened and the material resources of the Church better utilized by a cooperative approach to our ministries, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that each parish and mission of this Diocese examine its relationship with the other Christian bodies represented in its community to see where ministries can be shared, where programs can be combined, and where facilities can be jointly used, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that no new Mission of this Diocese be started until the opportunity for an Ecumenical ministry to the proposed mission area is thoroughly and, where possible, executed, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be sent to the denominational heads of those Churches which, in the mind of the Committee on Missions and Church Extension, might be included in the Ecumenical ministries referred to in this Resolution, and to the Hawaii Council of Churches.

Mr Ted Klaus moved that the resolution be amended by deleting the word "many" in the fourth paragraph; that it be further amended by rewording the sixth paragraph as follows. "BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that those involved in each new mission effort of this Diocese explore the opportunities for an exumenical ministry to the proposed mission area and make use of such opportunities where they promote the Oneness in Christ of those who are there, and"

Amendments were approved in that form and the motion passed as amended.

The Very Rev John J Morrett withdrew a resolution submitted earlier and presented the following resolution.

REVISED RESOLUTION ON HOUSING

WHEREAS various recent studies in the community show that there is serious need for more housing for people in the low and moderate income groups and especially senior citizens, and

WHEREAS sponsorship of privately constructed and managed low rent housing is now possible through special FHA programs allowable for non-profit groups to meet the needs of those of limited income;

BE IT RESOLVED that the Episcopal Church in Hawaii endeavor to help private non-profit organizations that are actively engaged in building and maintaining attractive, safe and sanitary housing in a healthy social environment for people in the low and moderate income groups in the State of Hawaii.

The resolution passed as presented.

The Rev Joseph H Pummill read the following resolution.

RESOLUTION

THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN HAWAII, mindful of the current pressures increasingly detrimental to the unity and well-being of the family

RE-AFFIRMS, and urges all Churchmen seriously to consider, and practice, these marks and characteristics of the Christian family as described by the 1958

Lambeth Conference:

"Such a family -

- (a) Seeks to live by the teaching and example of Jesus Christ;
- (b) Joins in the worship of Almighty God on Sundays in church;
- (c) Joins in common prayer and Bible reading, and grace at meals;
- (d) Is forgiving one to another, and accepts responsibility for one another;
- (e) Shares together in common tasks and recreation;
- (f) Uses abilities, time, possessions responsibly in society;
- (g) Is a good neighbor, hospitable to friend and stranger.

--The Lambeth Conference 1958 Resolution 121

AND CALLS upon the Church and the several churches seriously to reconsider their long-range policies and daily programs to determine whether they unify and support, or fragment and weaken, the family, the basic corporate unit of human society, and to alter these programs and policies, as necessary.

The resolution passed as read.

The Rev E Lani Hanchett presented the following motions.

That the Minutes of the 65th Annual Convocation be prepared and submitted to the Ecclesiastical Authority for approval.

That an expression of appreciation be extended to Mrs Ralph (Frances) Adams for her voluntary assistance as Secretary of the Convocation and for the many hours she has given to the Diocesan Office prior to Convocation. Also to Miss Eloise Lawrence, who has assisted her in many ways.

That an expression of appreciation be extended to the clergy and Cathedral Chapter, as well as to the staff of St Andrew's Cathedral for all they have done to assist with Convocation, and to the Rector and Vestry of St Peter's Church for the use of the Parish Hall for the Convocation Breakfast.

That the 65th Convocation express appreciation to our Guests of the Annual Convocation for the inspiration given to this occasion.

All were seconded and passed.

The Rev E Lani Hanchett made announcements about the Convocation Banquet. The Rev Joseph H Pummill announced the forthcoming programs to be presented in Honolulu by the Rev Ian Mitchell, composer of the American Folk Song Mass. Bishop Kennedy announced the Diocesan Council meeting, Monday, Feb 6, and the reception following the Sunday Convocation service.

Mr Harvey Meeker, Sr Warden of St Timothy's Church, read a resolution of the Bishop's Committee of St Timothy's Mission, calling the Rev Fred G Minuth as rector of St Timothy's, upon erection to parish status.

All present stood for the reading of the Necrology by the Rev J Hollis Maxon followed by Noonday prayers, led by the Rev Mr Maxon.

The meeting adjourned at 12:30 with the Blessing by Bishop Kennedy.

MUTUAL RESPONSIBILITY AND INTERDEPENDENCE IN THE BODY OF CHRIST

THE CALL FOR RENEWAL

Whether we call it renewal, or change, or second reformation, MRI is a demand, sent by the Holy Spirit, for the whole church to study how we are proclaiming Jesus Christ in our generation, to utilize to the maximum our lay and ordained people who have committed their lives to Christ, and to engage in those projects, at home and abroad, that will enable ourselves and others best to perform our ministries.

DIOCESAN RESTRUCTURING

On the diocesan level the Diocesan Council, or the Bishop and Council has become more and more instrumental in coordinating programs, in reviewing departmental activities, and in planning for the future.

The Diocesan Planning Committee, a creature of the Diocesan Council, has been formed to do the long-range planning that must be a part of our Church's life in a time where mistakes can be costly and lost opportunities are irreversible.

The Pacific Urban Program, begun in 1967, is bringing new enthusiasm into many phases of our Diocesan life, and is acting as an agent in the creation of a "new look" in our church life.

EDUCATION

In conjunction with the Department of Christian Education, a Lenten course on Okinawa, our companion diocese, was offered to the Sunday Schools of the various Churches. In this program the children and adults were given an orientation familiarizing them with the people and the parishes on Miyako and Okinawa.

The Clergy and several Vestries have engaged in MRI workshops in which they have studied the resource books and the documents relating to Mutual Responsibility. Our Convocation guest is The Rt Rev Thomas H Wright, who is the chairman of MRI for the whole Church, and we look forward to his inspiration and advice as we learn more of what this program means.

PERSONNEL

Both The Ven William Hio, the former Archdeacon of Okinawa, and The Ven Edmund Browning, the present Archdeacon, visited Hawaii during 1966. They spoke on various occasions and enabled us to gain further first-hand information about Okinawa.

We hope in 1967 to engage in a formal exchange in which the Rev George Hayashi of Hawaii and The Rev Paul Nakamura of Okinawa will trade pulpits during July and August. This project will be largely under the sponsorship of St Peter's Parish.

Moreover, we are continually blessed by the presence of clergy and laity who are here from other parts of the world. The priests and members of the Philippine Independent Church continue to be an important segment of our diocesan life. Our military chaplains bring us the love of other parts of the Church as do hundreds of military families that make up a significant part of our communicant strength.

Numerous community and church projects have been undertaken by the parishes and missions of the Diocese. (See the attached chart.) These are not the end products of MRI, but they are helping the people involved more fully to understand the meaning of sharing and of the importance of the mission of the Church in today's world. It is significant that a number of Churches have undertaken projects beyond Okinawa. This is commendable.

Significant, too, is the large awareness of MRI in the local projects of our various churches. MRI involves not only the church overseas, but our neighbor across the street, too.

CONCLUSION

As all of us become aware of our interdependence and as we reflect this in all of our life and work, we will begin to understand what the ultimate call of MRI is. It is a call to self-sacrifice, to humility, and to love. We Commend those who have seriously embraced MRI, and we urge all who profess our Lord to join them.

The Board met five times during the year for the transaction of the business affairs of the Diocese.

The resignation of the Rev B J Clark was accepted due to his moving to California.

In addition to their formal meetings, members of the Board met and counselled with the Bishop and other officers of the Board relative to the conduct of the Church's financial and legal affairs. Highlights of the year's activities included the following:

- 2 Authorized purchase of land on which St Timothy's Church is situated.
- 3 Authorized a bank loan of up to \$40,000 for the construction of a new StMatthew's Church building.
- 4 Adopted a resolution recommending to the 1966 Convocation that the name of the Church Corporation be changed from THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE HAWAIIAN ISLANDS to THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN HAWAII.
- 5 Authorized renovation and the construction of a new duplex housing unit at Mokuleia.
- 6 Authorized sale of a portion of the former Jaggar Estate on Dowsett Avenue.
- 7 Authorized exchange of certain portion of land between owners of the Wailuku Hotel and Church of the Good Shepherd, Wailuku, Maui.
- 8 Authorized construction of a new faculty unit at Seabuty Hall and renovation of garage for additional classrooms.
- 9 Authorized sale of Wakefield Estate property at Hilo, Hawaii.
- 10 After the Episcopate Endowment Fund reached over a half million dollars, the Board authorized use of income on the fund for Advance Work and Contingencies upon recommendation of the Department of Finance and approved by the Board.

MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

It is a pleasure for the Department to report the following for 1966.

In order to lighten the growing responsibilities of the Bishop, he appointed the Rev Paul M Wheeler, DD, Rector of St Clement's Church, Archdeacon of Oahu.

Archdeacon Wheeler accompanied the Bishop, at the request of Bishop Bayne, of the Overseas Department of the Executive Council, to Suva for the South Pacific Anglican Congress, held May 7th - 18th.

The Bishop visited Kwajalein, Saigon and Thailand, confirming 5 in each place. He also visited American Samoa. Archdeacon Wheeler made two visits to Pago Pago in 1966. We have a priest in Apia, Western Samoa, under the Bishop of Polynesia, taking monthly services in Pago Pago for us. The rest of the services are conducted by Lay Readers. Loyal Lay Readers also conduct Sunday services for our people on Kwajalein. The Rev John P Engelcke, Chaplain at Canterbury House, at the University of Hawaii, made three visits to Kwajalein.

A service of unusual significance took place in September, when the Bishop ordained to the Perpetual Diaconate two men in the leper colony at Airakuen, Okinawa. This is the first such service in the Episcopal Church.

The Executive Council of the Church has loaned the Rev George Lee to us as Director of the Pacific Urban Program, at the request of the Bishop, because of his concern for the Church's ministry in the midst of rapid urbanization in Hawaii and other parts of the Pacific region. His purpose is to develop existing and new resources in Hawaii and the Missionary District of Honolulu as a center of training for the Anglican Communion in the Pacific Region and to invite ecumenical participation wherever possible.

For the first time we have our missionary on Chi Chi Jima, in the Bonin Islands, with us for Convocation. The Rev Isaac Gonzales and his wife have come for Convocation with our new missionaries on Guam, the Rev and Mrs Jordan B Peck, Jr.

On the Island of Hawaii a new mission, St Jude's, has been started by the Ven William R Grosh and the Rev Albert J Collins. This mission will apply for admission

to the District at this Convocation. Services are being held in the Methodist Church. The Rev Robert E Brown, Vicar of Christ Church, Kealakekua, is holding Sunday services in the Hale Halawai Hotel in Kona. Mr and Mrs Walter Ackerman have been working hard to restore the historic church in Puako for services.

Many additions have been made to our schools:

St Andrew's Priory School for girls is observing its 100th year in 1967. The first phase of this observance was the erection of Centennial Hall - the office building and student center. The Bishop dedicated the building and consecrated its new chapel.

Seabury Hall added five classrooms and science laboratories, and an art studio, by erecting a second floor to the former classroom building. The Bishop dedicated it in October. A faculty duplex, each having three bedrooms, bath, kitchen and living room has been erected. The Bishop blessed the new home for the Headmaster, given in memory of Mrs Eleanor Hoyt Dominick.

The Hawaii Preparatory Academy received the gift of a chapel, The Davies Memorial Chapel, from the Theo H Davies family. It was consecrated in November by the Bishop.

Iolani School for boys completed the Library Learning Center Complex and a new ten classroom wing.

Other major additions to Diocesan property have been the new Christian Education building and Vicarage at St Luke's Church and improvements and renovations at the Mokuleia Conference Center.

St Andrew's Cathedral purchased a residence for one of the clergy at a cost of \$44,500.

A new vicarage was erected at Holy Innocents Church, Lahaina, Maui, at a cost of \$20,000.

St Peter's Church, Honolulu, renovated the basement of the Church for youth work at a cost of \$5,000. Holy Nativity Church, Honolulu, installed Sanctuary stained glass windows at a cost of \$5,000 and had other improvements amounting to \$9,150. Christ Memorial Church, Kilauea, Kauai, spent \$1,402 for improvements. St John the Divine, Agana, Guam, made extensive improvements to the chapel, vicarage and grounds. Practically all of the churches have made improvements and renovations.

Seabury Hall added the twelfth grade in September and will graduate its first class in June.

The Ven Edmond L Browning, of Okinawa, visited Hawaii in the interest of our companionship in MRI with Okinawa.

DEPARTMENT OF STEWARDSHIP

With the appointment of the Ven Paul Moore Wheeler to the chairmanship of the Department of Finance, our two departments have been working as more of a unit than separate departments.

We have co-ordinated in the major program sponsored this year when the Rev John S Yaryan conducted two stewardship workshops. The first was held on the 10th of September at the Church of the Good Shepherd, Wailuku, Maui, with churches on Hawaii invited to attend.

The second was held the following weekend at St Clement's Church with churches on Kauai invited to attend.

There was good representation at both meetings and the overall feeling was one of satisfaction.

The theme was THE "WHY" OF STEWARDSHIP and pointed out the CHRISTIAN VIEW OF GOD'S WAY. Detailed items covered included: Giving Potentials, Publicity Planning, Analyzing the Parish, Training of Ministering Families, and the Working of Stewardship Week.

The PROGRAM FOR ON - GOING STEWARDSHIP covered the step-by-step planning for a successful stewardship teaching program for the full year.

The Department felt the loss of Mr Val Tennent who had to resign due to business pressures.

The Ven Paul Moore Wheeler is the other member of the Department of Stewardship.

DIOCESAN DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The Department, through its members, has been involved in various educational efforts throughout this last year. These efforts would include the following:

Youth Division

The Rev Hollis Maxson directed this Department for most of the year and found it necessary in August to resign. Much credit is due him for the many hours that he gave in helping the Oahu Episcopal Young Churchmen's Council. In early January the OEYC held a conference at Mokuleia. This was planned by the youth with the help of Mr Maxson. It was concerned with working on the tensions that exist between what the Church appears to teach and the demands of peer groups. They dealt with such

things as: sex morality, parental authority and relationships in general. Some other activities of this Division that should be noted were the youth picnic held at Bishop Kennedy's home in May. During this event the new Council members were elected. In August a conference on MRI was held for the youth on Maui at Seabury Hall. Thanks are owed to the Rev Robert Brown, Mr and Mrs Shaffer (St Mark's) and also the Rev and Mrs Roger Melrose for the success of this event. A dance was planned and carried through by the Council in December. Its major purpose was the raising of funds to help pay for camping equipment that was sent to Okinawa. Various youth groups in the Churches on Oahu have also contributed or pledged funds to this effort. The Council is now in the process of planning a conference for February at which time the youth and various clergy will examine the question "Is the Church really out of date?" Monthly meetings were held for the Council and a great deal of credit needs to be given to the young people who gave of their time and efforts in these events and programs.

Camps and Conferences

Much work and effort was put into this area of responsibility by the Rev Messrs: Guy Piltz and Richard Chang. Mr Piltz has taken a year's leave of absence and Mr Chang has assumed the directorship. The Department helped in making recommendations for the remodeling of the camps. Three summer sessions were held under the leadership of Mr Chang. The Department trained the counsellors prior to the sessions in a week long session. This was led by the Chairman of the Department and the Rev Guy Piltz and Miss Betsy Christian. The training covered the skills of group work and camping. Mr Chang is, at the present time, working on the summer sessions for 1967 which will possibly include cooperation with the Pacific Urban Program under the direction of the Rev George Lee.

Sunday School

Canon Connell and the Rev Hollis Maxson helped with Teachers' Training at the following parishes or missions: St Clement's, St Elizabeth's, Holy Nativity, and Emmanuel. The Department also assisted various Churches through recommending materials and lending filmstrips. The Diocesan Filmstrip Library's 1966 catalogue was prepared and distributed to all the Churches. Various new strips and tapes have also been added. A new Birthday Thank Offering Card has been developed and is available through the Chairman. The Church on Chi Chi Jima is the object of this offering and the receipts have been sent to the Vicar.

Consultation and Training

The Rev Fritz Minuth in February acted as a Consultant to St John's-by-the-Sea. Miss Christian helped in a consultation with the women of St Peter's in April. Canon Connell worked with St John's-by-the-Sea on developing a calling program. Various talks were given on Christian Education and MRI by the Chairman at St Elizabeth's, St Peter's, St Clement's; and Holy Nativity during the year. Canon Connell gave a presentation on Christian Education at the Deacon's Orientation sessions in July.

Clergy and Adult Conferences

The first Episcopal School of Theology for clergy of all denominations and laymen was held in early June with an enrollment of over fifty. Drs Massey Shepherd and Frederick Schilling spoke on "Liturgy and the World of God In Our Age." The Rev William Reeves of Iolani and the Rev Delbert Westling were of great assistance in planning and conducting the School. The Rev David Kennedy and the Rev Howard Kishpaugh planned a clergy get-together in October, which allowed the new clergy the opportunity of learning about the Diocese and meeting the other clergy. The Department assisted by the Rev John Engelcke is, at the present time, scheduling a Lenten School for the Laity that will be held at the Priory. A wide range of courses will be offered by various clergy and laymen. The second School of Theology is also being planned for March of this year with the probable leaders being Dr Carroll Simcox and Dr Francis Andersen.

Diocesan and Council of Church Activities

The Chairman, as a member of the Bishop and Council, has been called upon from time to time to help in other areas of Diocesan concern. These would include helping to plan Diocesan workshops at Convocation, working with the MRL Chairman, The Rev Charles Crane, on MRI materials for study programs, and assisting the Rev Dr Robert Rodenmayer on his visit in February.

Various members of the Department have also been involved with the Council of Churches educational work as representatives of the Episcopal Church. These would include the Chairman, who was the Chairman of the Council's Christian Education Department, the Rev Hollis Maxson, and Miss Betsy Christian. Canon Connell and Mr Maxson helped on the development of several Christian Education programs and a conference for youth. Betsy Christian, who was also a member of the Episcopal Churchwomen, was helpful to the United Church Women in the area of leadership.

The Department will hope to be able to continue to carry on as a resource and aid to the Diocese and the various parishes and missions within this jurisdiction in the area of Christian Education. The Department is always willing to help when called upon.

The Department also urges subscription to the official publication of the National Church "The Episcopalian." This, too, should be in the home of each church family.

Weekly paid notices have been published in the two chief Honolulu daily newspapers with information about every church on Oahu. Each church pays for this, the Department merely coordinates the material. Mrs Rose Liu has been handling this.

The Rev Delbert Westling has been added to the Committee and serves as the official Diocesan photographer.

It would be very helpful if parishes and missions would inform the Department about local activities that would have news value. We will be glad to assist churches in publicity or promotional work.

THE DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS

Serving this year on the department were Canon James Long (chairman), the Rev John Engelcke, Mrs Walter Strode, the Rev E Lani Hanchett, Dean John Morrett, the Rev Timoteo Quintero, Mrs Richard Herkner, Mrs George Walker, Mr Henry Pang, Mrs Karl Schwab and the Rev Joseph Pummill who became chairman in June when Canon Long moved to the Diocese of Olympia.

The concerns of the department and its functions remained the same as in the past and therefore need not be included in this report for they appear in past journals. We have made an attempt to keep the concerns of the department before the individual congregations by having a representative in each congregation with CSR as their special concern. It is so easy to overlook the social implications of the Gospel, especially when you're comfortable. Eight congregations of the entire diocese have responded by appointing representatives, the other we are waiting for....

Offerings for the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief (including SOS) for 1966 was \$3,386.83 (1965, \$2,135.14) and for the Church and Race Fund \$1,181.53 (1965, \$1,396.15). The following contributions were made from the department: \$50.00 Catholic Social Services, \$50.00 for Oahu Prison Site Committee and \$25.00 for the Bridging Association.

Resolutions submitted by the department to Convocation and passed are included in the 1966 Journal of Convocation. A resolution on the "Christian Family" was submitted for 1967.

The chairman attended a conference conducted by the Executive Councils CSR Department with the theme: The Changing Role of Christian Social Relations in Our Changing World which was held at Greenwich, Connecticut.

Dean Morrett with his committee on Urban Strategy has been very busy with a study on housing needs for the lower and middle income families in Honolulu, with special attention given to the Kukui Project. This committee has such a large area of concern it no doubt will become a department this year.

THE DIOCESAN COUNCIL

The Diocesan Council met four times during 1966. At its meetings several areas of concern have recurred:

The 1966 Convocation passed three objectives for the Diocese which call for greater understanding of the mission of the Church, and the necessary program changes and utilization of resources in order to fulfill our mission. Follow-through has been a problem. Perhaps the usefulness of the objectives lies not in defining what it is that we should do, but rather in our employing them as checkpoints by which to prove and evaluate our activities and life by the test of mission and service to others, as called for by the MRI document. Specific actions are best defined by such methods as the resolutions on Ecumenical Co-operation, the Family, and Housing, which are to be presented to the 1967 Convocation.

The MRI Committee has worked to develop our Companion relationship with Okinawa. Our concept of that program itself has developed. We have begun to realize

that the Okinawa companionship is only "pre-MRI", which can lead us into a greater realization of the nature of and need for a deeper commitment to the mission of the Church. Recently there has been a greater emphasis on study and on prayers for the Church to balance the emphasis on monetary giving. Finally we have wrestled with how to stress the whole emphasis of MRI in order to weave it into the ongoing life of the Church without degrading MRI into a program of project.

The growth of the Honolulu Council of Churches into the Hawaii Council of Churches, and the development of its Co-operative Planning Division, on which the Bishop and six other persons from the Diocese sit (including our 4 Archdeacons) have brought a number of ecumenical questions to the Council which have lifted its concerns beyond the confines of our own Diocese. Our participation in such programs as the Waikiki Ministry, The Hawaii-Kai Religious Center, and calls for ecumenical ministries on all Islands have called for the definition of a Diocesan policy allowing for deeper, but carefully thought-out participation in such ventures.

The arrival of the Rev George Lee in the Fall of 1966 and the establishment of the Pacific Urban Program has given new impetus to the program of the renewal of the Church in the Diocese. The establishment of the Diocesan Planning Committee as an arm of the Council and the Rev Mr Lee's own abilities will give the opportunity for greater research and staff work to be added to that of the Council.

Several committees of the Diocese, not previously operating of the level of departments, have shown increased activity of considerable value to the Diocese. In particular there have been the MRI Committee, headed by the Rev Charles T Crane (mentioned above), the Committee on Finances, headed by the Ven Paul Wheeler, and the Urban Strategy Committee, headed by the Very Rev John J Morrett. Because of the growing importance of these committees it was felt to be desirable to have them officially represented on the Council by their respective chairmen, hence the proposal for changes in Canon XXI, "Bishop and Council", to be presented to the 1967 Convocation. The openness of the proposed canon, i.e., not listing Departments by name, is also a reflection of the Council's search for the most useful structure of the Council.

During the latter months of 1966 the Council, with the help of the Planning Committee, has been working on the Convocation Workshops for Delegates with the hopes of fostering open and useful discussion and debate at Convocation for better informed participation and voting.

One of the failures of the Council in the past few years has been its inability to establish a useful Post-Ordination Training Program for the clergy. Several different formats have been attempted, none of which has been generally accepted by the clergy of the Diocese. Perhaps a re-assessment of the proposed methods and of the need for continued professional training ought to be made.

In the coming year the Diocesan Council will continue to focus on the renewal of the Church in the Diocese, making every effort to advance it in its many and varied forms.

DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE

The Department, meeting monthly this year, has been studying the financial statements of missions as they reflect proper procedure of Budget Control. In order

that budget control be uniform, the Department has prepared for use in 1967 and thereafter a monthly report form the mission treasurer will complete and send copies to the Chairman of the Department and the Diocesan Treasurer.

The major concern of the Department is that reports and budgets show the portion of income the missions receive from the National Church towards vicars salaries and pensions. Heretofore, this has not been done, with the result the general congregation is not informed. Such a procedure will show the amount of increase needed to be raised locally in order to become self-supporting.

Two major items dealt with during the year were furloughs and Diocesan automobiles. Beginning 1969, we are recommending to the Overseas Department of the Executive Council that the present furlough policy be discontinued. Thereafter, the policy be that at the end of three years transportation to and from the West Coast be granted with a month's vacation, the cost of transportation to be minimum between Hawaii and the West Coast. The question of study leaves will be studied for policy recommendation.

Other than autos needed for Diocesan officials, the Diocese will turn over to the missions all autos. It will be the responsibility of the missions to maintain and provide autos for their clergy.

The Department, at the request of the Overseas Department and in conjunction with their salary proposals for missionary clergy, is working out an increased pay scale. It is planned that the increase will be effective in 1968.

The Urban Strategy Committee asked the Department to support the Kukui Housing Project of the Hawaii Council for Housing Action. The amount of \$500 was granted.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN KEYMAN

The key laymen's group was relatively active during 1966. First al all, we want to express our thanks to Bishop Kennedy, to Archdeacon Wheeler and to Diocesan Treasurer Henry Budd for assistance in our behalf. We also want to add a special thanks to the women of St Luke's Church for the suppers they prepared for our meetings during the year.

Of 23 churches on Oahu that have keymen, approximately 15 keymen were present at each meeting. Work was carried out by committees, and the fine cooperation shown by keymen helped us complete all projects satisfactorily. But the keymen would have liked to do more in helping get the camp at Mokuleia into shape. The clergy outdid us badly.

Fifteen keymen accompanied by Archdeacon Wheeler and Mr Budd made a trip to Kauai in July to inspect the work there. Archdeacon Crane, the Reverend Mr Berger and several men of our church on Kauai drove the group to see all of our churches. The greatest physical need is an expansion of the Hanalei Conference Center.

The annual barbeque was held at Holy Nativity Church's parish hall and more than 250 turned out to honor Bishop and Mrs Kennedy. Keyman John Kim of Holy Nativity Church was chairman and we are indebted to him and his hard working committee for the fine work. He reported a profit of \$70.49 that was placed into the Bishop's Fund for Laymen's Work.

The Bishop's Quiet Half Day for Men was held at St Elizabeth's Church on November 27 with more than 75 men in attendance. Keyman Andrew Seki of St Clement's Church was chairman of this very successful event.

During the year, each keyman was to raise \$25 within his own church in behalf of the Bishop's Fund for Laymen's Work. Keymen of 17 Oahu churches had turned in their donation up to the last meeting on December 8, 1966. They represent St Mary's, St Mark's, St Stephen's, Waikiki Chapel, St Clement's, St Barnabas', St Elizabeth's, Epiphany, St Luke's, St Andrew's, St Christopher's, Holy Trinity, Emmanuel, St Timothy's, Holy Nativity, St Matthew's and Good Samaritan.

Keymen also sponsored the opening night supper for delegates to the 1967 Convocation, February 3, 1967, on the grounds of St Andrew's Priory.

The final project of the year will be the Washington's Birthday corporate communion for men and boys February 22, 1967, at St Andrew's Cathedral followed by breakfast at the Armed Services YMCA. Keyman Richard Ching of St Elizabeth's Church is chairman, and tickets are now being distributed to our churches.

REPORT OF ST ANDREW'S PRIORY

The year 1966, the 99th of the Priory's contribution to the sound education of girls in Hawaii, found the school on firm and solid foundations academically and financially. Some changes were made in the organization of the administration of the school in the interests of sustaining the high quality of education that is imperative to meet the needs of the times in which we are living. Nevertheless the strong sense of family atmosphere still prevails in every area of the school's life, promoting feelings of security reflected in the happy faces characteristic of the schools' personnel: administrative, teaching, student body and classified staff.

Highlights of the Priory Expansion Program (PEP)

At the beginning of 1966 construction work had begun on the student services center building at 224 Queen Emma Square, located between the Diocesan Offices and the Sisters' Residence adjacent to the Priory Main Building. This work was completed during the summer months, and movement of the administrative offices from the Main Building to the first floor was finished prior to the opening of school in September, 1966. The basement was also fully occupied by the school newspaper (Ke Kukui) and the year book (Ka Alele) staffs as well as the school's bookstore.

The student services center was dedicated as "Centennial Hall" on October 1lth, 1966 at 9:00 A.M. in the traditional "Hawaiian blessing" rainstorm that has marked all Priory Expansion Program outdoor services since the original groundbreaking ceremonies held on May 27th, 1965. The heavy rains necessitated holding most of the dedication service in St Andrew's Cathedral with Bishop Harry S Kennedy officiating both there and at the close of the service in the rain. Approximately 100 guests were

present in spite of the inclement weather, and refreshments were served by members of the Ka Alele and Ke Kukui staffs. The members of the Centennial Club (girls of the Class of '67 who have spent all four of their high school years at the Priory) decorated both the interior and exterior of the building with flowers and foliage.

The St Andrew's Priory School Chapel, given by a friend as a thankoffering for the life, example and friendship of Margaret Kean Monteiro, was consecrated as a private chapel by the Rt Rev Harry S Kennedy at a celebration of the Eucharist held at 4:00 p.m., December 6th, 1966. A dominant feature of the chapel is a faceted stained glass window "The Jesse Tree" designed and executed by Erica Karawina of Honolulu, given to the glory of God and as a thankoffering for the life and work of Mother Eva Mary, C. T., foundress of the Community of the Transfiguration, and of Sister Beatrice Martha, C. T., her companion in the foundation of the Community.

Centennial Hall also houses the student infirmary; a large, secure vault; the faculty lounge; a reception room; the Chaplain's study; the reference library of the Sisters of the Transfiguration; and an outstanding, excellently furnished conference room.

During the summer and early fall a completely new elementary school library was established in the Main Building and fully equipped. The upper school library was re-constructed, new lighting fixtures and equipment procured, wall-to-wall carpeting installed and the entire area air-conditioned to provide an attractive and comfortable area for the high school students and faculty to do their reference work and recreational reading.

The student cafeteria serving area was renovated to include a new stainless steel dishwashing and garbage disposal unit, new lighting fixutres, interior re-decoration, a new tile floor, stainless steel serving counter and with a new office for the cafeteria manager built on the adjoining lanai. New tables and chairs were purchased to seat 100 students. A faculty dining room carpeted and outfitted with new modern tables and chairs was made from the former teachers' lounge/reception room. More cafeteria tables and chairs will be procured when seating arrangements are finalized.

All of the above capital improvements have been totally financed through pledges and contributions made to the Priory Expansion Program. The final phase, construction of a gymnasium/auditorium building on the makai side of the campus, will begin on or about April 1, 1967. We anticipate having this structure completed and paid for in time for the opening of school in September, 1967.

Enrollment

We have had an increase in enrollment over last year, chiefly in the upper school (grades 7 - 12) where there is more classroom space to provide for these additional students. However, for the total well-being academic and social of the students we do not intend to go on permitting the enrollment to increase to the point where each girl cannot be known and dealt with as a person.

Graduates

Of the 61 girls who graduated from the Priory on June 7th, 1966, 59 of them are now pursuing higher education in colleges and universities in sixteen states and Washington, D. C. as well as those attending the University of Hawaii or other colleges in this state. Two of this class are working this year. This does preclude the chance that they may enter on their college studies in another year or two. Of this class two students, Deborah Jones and Belinda Wong were National Merit Scholars winning substantial scholarship grants. Sylvia Yee, '66, the student body president, was the delegate from the Hawaii Student Council Association to the Williamsburg Student Burgessess in Virginia last February. Betty S M Soo, Class of 1951, is one of five pediatricians in Hawaii to be elected in this year to the American Academy of Pediatrics. Tragedy brought to an untimely close the lives of two of our younger graduates preparing for their careers in Mainland Universities: Both Betsy Bland, class of 1965 and Pamela Ting of the class of 1961 were killed in automobile accidents on the mainland. The former died in September and the latter during the Christmas holidays.

Religious Education

As the Diocesan Girls' School of the Episcopal Church in Hawaii the Priory is dedicated to the belief that, regardless of denomination, Christian education is properly an integral part of the whole educative process.

Since its foundation in 1867 educating and influencing girls to be Christian leaders in their homes and communities has remained the fundamental aim of the school. Parents value the quality of education that results without always identifying the reason for it. Forty percent of the entire enrollment is affiliated with the Episcopal Church. Sixty percentare baptized Christians, slightly over twenty percentare confirmed members of the Episcopal Church. Of the remainder we have 255 girls from families that have no religious affiliation, or none that is meaningful. About eighty percent of the present senior class is baptized. We are concerned over the uncommitted twenty percent who seem to be reflecting the uncertainties that are afflicting the young people in this age of transition from the values accepted in the cultures of their ancestry and find all values questioned by many to whom they look for answers.

Extra-Campus Activities

A vital part of the educational policy of the Priory is to develop in the students

an acute sense of community responsibility. This not only develops good citizenship habits but has the side issue of bringing to the individual students enriched opportunities in a variety of areas. The choir gave its services at Convocation; at the Christmas tea held by the Episcopal Church Women of Oahu; at St Andrew's Cathedral for a Festival Evensong on St Andrew's Day; joined with the Iolani Choir for a service of Evensong and concert of Christmas music; and with the Cathedral Choral Society in presenting Britten's Cantata "St Nicholas". Hui Hauoli, the Hawaiian Club assisted in serving breakfast to Convocation delegates. The Companions of St Andrew decorated the Cathedral for Thanksgiving with donations of fruit, vegetables, and fruit juice from the students. These were later taken to Shriner's Hospital and to the Center for Retarded Children. Helen Liu, Class of '67, is vice president of the state organization of the Pacific and Asian Affairs Council and coordinator of its activities. The Priory won second place in the division of schools and religious organizations for its Aloha Week Float. Individual students have taken part in the University of Hawaii Model United Nations; participated in the Foreign Language Festival; Hawaii Spelling Bee; Hawaii Medical Association Careers Day; St Francis Hospital Work-Experience Day; Scientist for a Day program sponsored by the U.S Navy, and in the Junior Stockholders' Club. In addition there have been the usual inter-school activities in the departments of athletics and speech. This year we have cooperated with McKinley High School in a Driver Education Course. The Priory was host to a Leadership Training Course for local high schools. Sharon Matsuura, '67, was one of 40 high school students selected to take a course in physics at the University of Hawaii during the past summer, and Karen Nikaido, '67, was one of 75 selected for the University's 7th annual Summer Science training program. Her project was in electronics. Also during the summer Charlene Kubo, '68, was one of the eight representatives from this state to the National Y-teen leadership conference held in the state of Washington. The Volunteer Service Bureau reports on the continued good work done by Priory girls in a variety of services. The school facilities have been used on Sunday mornings by overflow classes from St Peter's Church School and by their choir.

Sisters' Extra-School Activities

Two of the Sisters have assisted with the St Mark's Church School. In addition all of the Sisters have either given talks, conducted quiet days, and assumed responsibilities within the professional organizations to which they belong as educators or librarians. We have engaged in a number of ecumenical occasions with Roman Catholic Religious both social and ecclesiastical. A certain amount of counselling of a social welfare nature is brought to us because of our location in the midst of the city and of our availability.

Benefactors

Besides benefitting from the subscribers to the Expansion Program the present student body received very generous assistance from the Associates of the Transfiguration who sponsored on behalf of the student activities and for their support a sale of THE WORLD'S FINEST CHOCOLATE. The net proceeds from this sale came to almost \$10,000.00, permitting scholarship grants and awards totaling \$2,242.55 and leaving a balance of \$7,659.00 to support the activities which the operating budget cannot absorb. This is more than double the amounts raised in the past, and our thanks are due to both the Associates and the good sales talents represented among the students and their parents.

Acknowledgments

We are grateful for our proximity to the Diocesan office and the continued interest of the Bishop and his staff in the Priory; for the regular daily use the Priory stud-

dents and Sisters have of St Andrew's Cathedral, and the occasional and/or emergency use of St Peter's facilities. To the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral, and to the Rector and Vestry of St Peter's we extend our heartfelt thanks. We are especially grateful this year for the invaluable help being given to the Priory by the Rev John P Engelcke in the organizing, cataloging and searching out of the century of historical treasure in the school's archives.

ANNUAL REPORT OF IOLANI SCHOOL

Iolani opened its 103rd year on September 8, 1965 with an enrollment of 1,149 boys, the largest number in the history of the school to that date. A total of 178 boys were granted scholarships in the amount of \$75,780. Thirteen new faculty members were appointed beginning September 1st, while the close of the year saw the retirement of Mrs Marguerite Black, librarian for the Lower School for nine years, and Frederick Raymer, instructor in Latin and French for ten years. Both Mrs Black and Mr Raymer gave loyal service to the school. At the final meeting of the Parent-Teacher Groups in April 1966 both retiring members were honored by the school family and each presented suitable inscribed silver bowls. The Raymers have settled in California, while Mrs Black makes her home in Kailua, Oahu with her daughter and son-in-law.

We had 125 boys graduate in June 1966 and 125 boys were admitted to college, 97 going to 63 mainland colleges and universities and 27 entering the University of Hawaii, one to Maunaolu on Maui. Fifteen boys were awarded college and university scholarships in the amount of \$38,700. Two seniors were National Merit Scholars, seven were National Merit Semi-finalists and seven received National Merit Letters of Commendation.

The year 1965-66 was a year of building at Iolani. The new Lower School of fifteen classrooms, administrative offices, library and remodeled art room was completed in December, 1965. The move from the temporary quarters in the new gym was made over the holidays and the faculty and boys joyfully took over their new quarters in January. The new buildings have added tremendously to the effectiveness of the elementary program of instruction at Iolani.

Throughout the year the Library-Learning Center complex and new ten classroom wing were being constructed to the accompaniment of a fair amount of noise and discomfort to all concerned. Yet the faculty, staff and boys took it all ingood stride, well aware of the promise of completion which blessedly came in August of 1966. These extensive airconditioned units include: 1) a main library with a capacity of 250 students (at any one time) and 30,000 volumes, offices, two special instruction rooms, a faculty study, a listening and microfilm room, conference cubicles, and 75 individual study carrels; 2) a completely equipped rear projection amphitheatre (seating 154) and audiovisual office and work areas; 3) a forty-one station language laboratory with capacity to handle seven channels and a production area for taping; 4) a complete production facility for producing audiovisial aids; 5) four seminar rooms for special classes and, 6) the ten classroom airconditioned wing. These new facilities have immeasurably enhanced the opportunities for learning at Iolani, and give the school plant and equipment as fine as any secondary school.

The summer school program (June 20 - July 30, 1966) had a total of 1,099 regis-

In the absence of the headmaster who was on sabbatical leave, the assistant headmaster, the Rev David P Coon, was acting head. He was ably assisted by Roland H Chinatti, director of studies of the Lower School, Bing Fai Lau, business manager, and the other administrative officers. Mr Mac Lean stayed in weekly communication with the school throughout the year. Under physical conditions that were at times made difficult to impossible by the construction Mr Coon led the school in a splendid manner throughout the year. He, with his family, is enjoying a sabbatical year in East Lansing, Michigan where Mr Coon is studying at Michigan State University.

Under the excellent leadership of Kelvin Wong, assisted by the officers of the PTG and a host of volunteer parents, the April 1966 carnival was a huge success, netting \$32,200 for the Building Program. What a great boost.

The year 1965-66 was a fine year in the student annals. Academically and athletically, the class of '66 was talented.

August 1966 saw the return of the MacLeans to all the warmth and aloha of Iolani and by early September brought the completion of the building program. On September 6, 1966 the 104th year of the school commenced with 1,184 boys enrolled -- again a record number for the largest independent church-related school in the country.

For the 1965-66 school year the school operated on a budget of \$1,178,780, with total assets as of June 30, 1966 of \$3,305,724 in plant, equipment, endowment, and operating fund balance.

To Mr Peter Russell, general chairman of the Development Program and Treasurer of the school, to the members of the Development Campaign Executive Committee (including the late Ralph B Johnson, a great friend of the school), to our devoted and able Board of Governors, to our Administrative team, to our faculty, parents and boys of Iolani, goes the credit for a great 103rd year in 1965-66.

ANNUAL REPORT OF SEABURY HALL

This will be a memorable year for Seabury Hall, for our first class of students will graduate and continue their education in institutions of higher learning. Some are already receiving answers from their college applications.

The full offering of grades seven through twelve is in effect now, as one grade each year has been added from the original seven through ten grades when school opened in September, 1964. The staff now consists of fourteen full and part-time teachers and 105 students of whom 63 are resident girls. The Board of Trustees has been enlarged by three to make a total of fourteen. Membership in the Board under the chairmanship of Bishop Kennedy represents a geographical distribution of all the Hawaiian Islands.

The past summer we completed a building program which saw the erection of a faculty duplex and the addition of a second floor to the classroom unit, formerly the garage. We now haveten faculty or staff families in residence on the campus and have

seven standard classrooms, an art studio, and two laboratories for chemistry, physics, and biology instruction. The Board of Trustees has raised all the funds so that there is no indebtedness for the building program completed at year end.

We are currently seeking funds to 1) install a dishwashing unit in the kitchen; 2) equip the kitchen with walk-in refrigeration and freezing units to enlarge our storage capacity and to improve our purchasing power. (We now prepare three hundred meals per day and can no longer be a "household" kitchen.) Thirdly, we hope to prepare two acres of pasture land owned by Haleakala Ranch adjacent to our grounds for a sports field. About 20% of these funds are on hand at the beginning of 1967.

We have been continually blessed with a fine faculty with the minimum of turnover, alert to the academic needs and development of teen-age girls. Our dormitory staff is utterly superb. Mr John Talbot, our new director of studies, has ably undertaken the academic and college counselling and has initiated a program whereby our girls are tutoring local public school students in math and English in grades four through six. We continue to be thankful for the fine housekeeping, yard, kitchen, and office staff who make life so uncomplicated for the teaching staff.

We will seek academic accreditation in the spring of 1967 by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges. The academic goals we have set for ourselves will come under scrutiny through this accrediting process and by the experience of our first graduates in college.

Our library continues to receive primary emphasis of all our efforts. It is entirely staffed by volunteer women of the community. Because of the heavy use of library books this cannot continue much longer, especially as we add books each year. Those of you who know Cooper House know that the 20 x 40 second floor family living room with fireplace and lanai has been used since the school started as our library. Although the quality of a library is measured in the quality and use of the books and not in the number of volumes, it may be helpful to know that in our third year we have in excess of 6,000 volumes. This year as before, our book buying is based upon money raising ventures and contributions of those who know how central to a school the library really is. This has been a most rewarding year for the library, and we continue to say to the faculty that any reference book or library volumes they wish for class use will be provided by the library -- this is a standing offer. Our sources this year have been: a) the Women of the Diocese of Honolulu through the Bishop's Specials; b) the magazines through the Diocesan Church Periodical Club and a sizable gift through the National Book Fund of the CPC; c) a sizable gift in memory of Virginia Baldwin Wells, daughter of Dr and Mrs Will Baldwin, builders of Maunalei; d) a birthday book plan whereby parents are given the opportunity to give to the library a book on the birthdate of their daughter / son student; and e) the fund raising dinner dance for the third year which we call "The Evening at Maunalei." Thus it appears most likely that our successful providing of books and periodicals may soon necessitate the building of a library building!

As a boarding school we recognize our primary responsibility to provide a living environment for our girls which will give them strength to live as disciplined teenagers now and later on as responsible adults who have a habit of caring for others and contributing to the community wherein they live. There is no way to measure the degree of success in this undertaking except to ask parents who have entrusted their daughters to the care of the faculty and staff at Seabury Hall. Our hope is to be faithful to the trust extended to us by the parents and to be faithful to the task God in Christ has given us for the few short years the girls are enrolled.

Seabury Hall is a reality because the people of the diocese and our many friends

volunteers. We intend to try at all times to make Seabury Hall a diocesan school wherein the communicants of the diocese and the school staff know one another. Because of the intensity of relationships and demands of time of boarding school life here, it is easy to slip into isolation from one another and even be aloof. We hope this will not happen and encourage your active concern in our goals and welfare. A sometimes weekly Newsletter goes out from Seabury Hall to keep readers informed of our aspirations, accomplishments, problems, and solutions thereof. You are welcome to be added to this list if you desire. "Ask and you shall receive..." the Newsletter. Your visits to

We try to fill a need in the Islands and Pacific Ocean Area for girls who desire a college preparatory education and for myriads of plausible reasons cannot obtain it locally as well as they might at Seabury Hall. It is our constant aim to recruit good candidates and to provide financial aid for those in need. Because such a boarding school education is expensive (\$2,000 per year in our case, plus assorted extras) we are in constant need of money for financial aid, else we become a school only for those who can afford the full fare. As the adage goes, "These is no problem (at Seabury Hall) that girls and money won't solve.

We are first of all a school; thus we want to do our educating well. By design, we have a college preparatory curriculum, and entering girls must be able to work at this level. We are a Church school; thus live in search of truth under the sovereignty of God in Christ as we worship together. Thirdly, we are a boarding school; thus are prepared with faculty and staff to nurture teen-age girls in a living situation which provides direction, counsel, freedom and responsibility, forgiveness, and judgment, in whatever order is necessary. For these tasks we ask your continued prayer and support.

REPORT OF THE HAWAII PREPARATORY ACADEMY

The Fifteenth Commencement Exercises of the Hawaii Preparatory Academy in June was one mixed with a little sadness, for it marked the beginning of Mrs Marjorie Babcock Robertson's retirement as our administrative assistant. To Mrs Robertson must be ascribed the foresight and faith that led her to devote most of her talent, intellect, and energy to the nurturing of a struggling school from its first years to its present position among the ranking schools of the state.

The forty-two members of the graduating class, their parents, the faculty, members of the Board of Governors, and many of her friends joined Mrs Taylor and myself in honouring Mrs Robertson. At a banquet held on the eve of commencement, Mrs Robertson was presented gifts and momentos which included the comissioning of her portrait for the school. The portrait now hangs in the administration building. She received also, at the hands of the Bishop, the Distinguished Service Cross of the Diocese. And though the Hawaii Preparatory Academy presented her with a momento, the greatest gift of the school will continue with the growth and lasting affection held for her among the innumerable boys with whom she has worked and whom she has guided throughout the years.

We are fortunate that Mrs Robertson has consented to continue her deep interest in our school by acting as a consultant and by resuming a seat on the Board of Governors which she vacated when she began full time work on the campus.

The fall term for 1966-67 began with an enrollment of 230 students; 170 boarders and 60 day scholars. The students come from all the Hawaiian islands, the mainland, and many of the Pacific islands. An excellent faculty maintains highest standards in teaching, and the facilities of the school continue to expand.

In the fall term a milestone in the Academy's short history was reached with the consecration and dedication of the Davies Memorial Chapel. The Chapel, made possible in part by the Davies Family as a memorial to the founder of Theo H Davies and Company, is an architectural masterpiece, and we invite all to come to worship with us when in the Kamuela area.

Nearing completion is our gymnasium. It, too, is outstanding and will provide our students with some of the finest athletic facilities in all these islands.

At convocation time, the Academy should be anticipating an additional building project in the school's dining complex. With the completion of that complex, the school will begin a program a gradual expansion in enrollment in order to provide places for boys who wish to experience of a boarding school.

REPORT OF SAINT JOHN'S EPISCOPAL PREPARATORY ACADEMY

Saint John's Episcopal Preparatory School offers a program ranging from the kindergarten through grade nine. Its philosophy is directed toward a challenging academic program for above average students in a setting conducive to moral and spiritual growth. The school was founded in 1962 and is located on the grounds of the Episcopal Church of St John the Divine, a part of the Honolulu Diocese. During the first year, the school buildings were destroyed by a typhoon and temporary tent classrooms were destroyed by a second typhoon several months later. At the request of Bishop Kennedy, the Executive Council of the Episcopal Church made it possible for a permanent school building to be built with a grant of \$30,000.00 and additional funds raised on Guam. A second permanent building was erected the following year for the junior high with funds raised in the local community. Saint John's School has been supported by many dedicated persons in the community, both organizationally and financially. The community is 97% Roman Catholic which limits the fund raising potential. Funds for school operating expenses and capital improvements are derived solely from tuition or community donations.

The Rev Jordan B Peck, Jr arrived in July 1966 and assumed the responsibilities of Headmaster of the School as well as Vicar of the Church. His wife, Dr Maryly Van Leer Peck is serving as Academic Director of the school. Under their stimulating and capable direction, many improvements have already been made in the academic program, classrooms and grounds. The library has doubled the number of books to approximately 2,000 through purchases from the school comprehensive fees and taking full advantage of grants under the ESEA Title II program entitling private and parochial schools to obtain books from Federal funds. Enrollment in the school has increased to approximately 245 students from every faith and race with a faculty of eleven full-time teachers with US college degrees and teaching certificates.

typhoon-damaged classroom furniture, classroom ceilings and playground development are the most urgent needs. Of the latter, would be included site improvement and preparation, playing fields and courts, showers and restrooms. Additional classroom space for the present number of grades is required so that classes may be added at to provide this additional classroom space and to increase the library space, it is hoped and instruction center, nursing station and additional storage facilities. This would then free the present administrative and library space for classrooms.

Long range planning anticipates the addition of a senior high school program. A land use study is now underway to determine whether additional land would have to be obtained. The need for a senior high school is critical. The Guam Public Schools lost their accreditation last year, and although it is anticipated this may be regained through a different association, many of the problems of the public schools cannot be solved in the foreseeable future. Roman Catholic schools are tremendously overcrowded with and sixty in many classrooms. Guam is also the hub of the Trust Territory area, gram at Saint John's. Such an undertaking, although urgently needed, would require major financial assistance.

Funding for capital improvements and occasional budgetary deficits is obtained by active solicitation of the local business community which has generously supported the school within its economic limits.

Funds to create an endowment, which will insure greater stability in operation and eventually provide for larger needs of the school, are vitally needed and must come with the assistance of sources outside of Guam. The creation of such an endowment is being actively sought, as well as assistance in providing for certain specific needs.

THE ANNUAL REPORT OF CANTERBURY HOUSE

In 1966 Canterbury House continued to be guided by the approach outlined in the previous annual reports --- that is, being the Episcopal Church at the University of Hawaii (Manoa Campus) and East-West Center.

Work and progress in the five aspects of the Canterbury House program -- liturgical, pastoral, social, service, and intellectual -- are briefly described as follows:

Liturgical. In the period January to June 1966, Holy Communion was celebrated in the Canterbury House chapel on school weekdays at 7:15 AM. Communions varied in number from 14 to 2. At the monthly corporate communions before the dinner meeting, an average of 17 joined in the celebration, while an everage of 32 participated in the meeting. Changes in the University's class schedule led to a period of experiment-6:45 AM on school weekdays. Early morning communions have, however, been resumed at grantees have led to the establishment of a Sunday evening communion service at 5:15. In addition, there is an II:45 AM communion service on Thursdays.

Canterbury House is pleased to report four baptisms and five confirmations during the year 1966.

Pastoral. Canterbury House continues to exercise a place in the pastoral and mission work of the total church. The chaplain provides Episcopal students with an additional pastor and a specialized counsellor who is nearby and available to the course of student life. As in years past, Canterbury House has served non-Episcopalians as well.

Social. The organized social program at Canterbury House continues to center about monthly gatherings held on second Wednesdays. The celebration of Holy Communion, a dinner cooked and paid for by the students, a general meeting, and (sometimes) a speaker comprise the evening program. Social activities depend chiefly upon student initiative. In the course of the fall semester, Canterburians and their friends have enjoyed; a Kapiolani Park picnic, a Christmas Eve get-together at the chaplain's, a Hallowe'en party, and group attendance at football games and films.

Service. Canterbury was pleased to host and to assist a fine group of Maui young churchmen and churchwomen in a morning's tour of the University and East-West Center. And with the inspiration and direction of Miss Ruby Kim (Epiphany), a student in social work, Canterbury gathered a holiday provision basket for a Kalihi family of seven.

Intellectual. The intellectual apostolate has in the main taken the form of discussion with students as questions on matters of faith and ethics arise and of assisting students as they prepare papers on religious and related topics. In Lent a course of study was offered on the Gospel according to St Mark. Canterbury has been pleased to have as speakers in the fall semester Dr Walter Char of the University's Counselling and Testing Center and Mr Philip Young, President of the Associated Students of the University of Hawaii.

Canterbury House is pleased to acknowledge and grateful indeed for the kind interest of many friends expressed in gifts in 1966: Mrs L W De Vis-Norton (crystal cruet); St Andrew's Cathedral and Mrs C M Cooke, Jr (magazines); the Diocesan Altar Guild (altar linens); Grace's Lunch Wagon (contribution); Sister Evelyn Ancilla, C T (school desks and grass matting); Gem's Garden Shop (Christmas tree); Mrs Townsend (pins, flowers, materials for the float); Val's Trucking (trucking assistance); and the Rev William Reeves, Jr (high fidelity equipment). Thanks also are due to a splendid Bishop's Committee headed by Mr Delmar Kleckner (Calvary).
