I told him "My dad built this place!" He said " he did a good job... nice and dry!"

We chatted for a bit and I gave him some cash... almost lent him my truck \cong ...That is when it felt like dad was with me!

At the time of this visit, Dave expressed considering a move back to Oahu, from Spokane WA. Oahu Clergy & Spouses and Widows were contacted. A dozen folks had expressed interest in connecting, but also expressed COVID cautions, and an outdoor dining possibility, or were not available on the date & time chosen.

From Donor Machiece: Life here is good but I am kept busy. This is a 98% Buddhist country so no direct church work which suits me fine. Since I retired 16 years ago, I haven't preached or celebrated once. To me as I learned from Bishop Spong, retiring means stopping what you are doing and do something else. So I did just that.

I have been working with His Majesty King Norodom Sihamoni on projects to help students from the country - and there are many - who find they can't afford to continue with their university education.

Until the virus situation erupted, I was also speaking three times a year at each of the Universities in Vietnam, Laos Myanmar and also here in Cambodia which meant that I was on a plane to somewhere every month. But that had to stop with the virus restrictions. I hope at some point I can resume that again.

So at age 88 I am still in tip top health which is good. I just can't jump as high as I used to. But I never did much jumping anyway so not

bothered.

Roth and I are hoping to go back to Kauai for a few days to see the folk there, but we have to wait till things improve.
