CHURCH PENSION FUND ANNOUNCES NEW HEALTH CARE ADVANTAGE PLAN TO TAKE EFFECT JANUARY 1, 2022

Better Plan for Retirees

There he was on this narrow, short, single bed, all 6 feet plus of him. When he saw the questioning look in my eyes he said with that great big grin of his: "I spent my whole life with the Chinese people — and I intend to die with them too!"

And so it's no coincidence that the gospel lesson our dear Gerry chose for today is the story of the good shepherd. Gerry lived the example given to us by Our Lord every day of his life. Good shepherds are gentle, vigilant, and kind, all of which defines our friend Gerry in every aspect of his life.


And a tribute from Heather Mueller

On October 24th, Hawai'i residents will need to include the area code 808 before dialing a phone number. Even devices that utilize telecommunications (e.g., life safety systems, medical monitoring devices, fax machines, etc.) will have to be reprogrammed to include the area code.

The reason: Federal Communications Commission adopted 988 as the new three-digit nationwide number to get in touch with the National Suicide Prevention and Mental Health Crisis

Lifeline. 988 is just a simpler number to remember; It's easy and fast just like 911. So for an important service like a suicide prevention lifeline, the FCC wanted to have a three-digit number for folks to reach them if they need it. In order for 988 to work, all service providers must implement a mandatory 10-digit local dialing.
